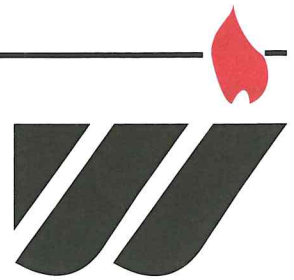

Evangelism moves ahead in 1995

The Wisconsin Conference will continue to launch forward in evangelism and outreach in 1995, says Conference President **Arne Swanson**.

The \$100,000 budgeted for evangelism will go to assist nine Wisconsin churches in **Net '95**—evangelist Mark Finley's Chattanooga-based crusade which will be beamed this month via satellite to every North American church equipped to receive it.

Here in Wisconsin, preparatory meetings for Net '95 began mid-January. Via satellite or videotape, several churches are now hosting the cooking school led by Mrs. Teenie Finley in Chattanooga.

At **Milwaukee Northwest**, **Pastor Steve Cook** reports that about 40 came the first night, with subsequent sessions also well attended.

Pastor **Gaylan Herr** says response has been positive at the **Wisconsin**

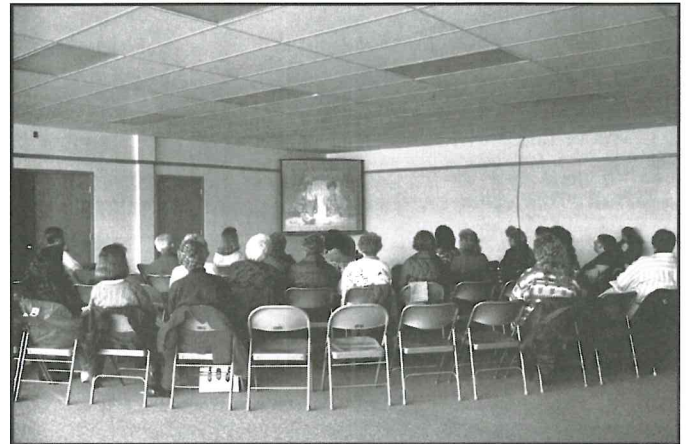
Academy Church.

"The people seem to like being part of something big," he notes.

Along with showing videos of Mrs. Finley's Cooking school, **Fox Valley** is hosting a "Discover Jesus" seminar. It finishes just before Net '95 begins February 18.

Polly Kuehn, a Fish Creek member, teaches a small weight control seminar at **Sturgeon Bay** to mostly nonmembers. These individuals will also be invited to Net '95.

This fall, Wisconsin Conference will sponsor an area-wide crusade in the

Fox Valley Church. It begins in late August and features Lyle Albrecht from the Adventist Media Center.

Meet our new ministerial director

Steve Gallimore joins conference team

Wisconsin's new ministerial director, **Steve Gallimore** and his family, arrived from Florida just in time for Christmas. Steve began his new duties immediately after the holidays—right on schedule according to Wisconsin's Executive Committee, which voted last fall to begin search for a full-time ministerial director in time for the new year.

Elder Gallimore, age 43, says part of his new role is to "offer support and encouragement to the pastors and to the churches." This includes overseeing continuing education for pastors, providing training for lay elders, meeting regularly with pastors, and providing a ministerial resource center.

Most importantly, the ministerial director coordinates evangelism. For 1995, that means managing Wisconsin's participation in the **Net '95** crusade, helping plan the Fox Valley crusade this fall, and assisting with local church efforts.

Conference President **Arne Swanson** sees Steve's arrival as a boon for Wisconsin. Previously the president has shouldered the burden of both his office and that of ministerial director. "We as administrators can't always be there for the pastors," he explains.

Steve's own years of pastoring will help him serve our pastoral field. Prior to coming here, *(continued on page 3)*

Korean group forms

Roughly 15 Korean members have been officially organized as a group in Waukesha. The small band has been meeting each Sabbath for nearly a year in the Waukesha Church. Wisconsin's Executive Committee voted in December to grant the group authorization to organize.

Pastor Gyung-Go Kim, a doctoral student at Andrews, serves as volunteer pastor and evangelist on weekends. Pastor Kim has been meeting with the group on his own for some time. **Dr. Yae Yong Shim** is the group's leader.

"We've taken this first step," says President **Arne Swanson**. "Now hopefully [the group] will grow."

In the Adventist denomination, fledgling groups such as this must first organize as a group, then as a company, and finally as a church. These Korean members hope to do just that.

- Inspire women to reach their full potential in Christ by enabling them to develop their gifts and talents for the upbuilding of family, church, and community.

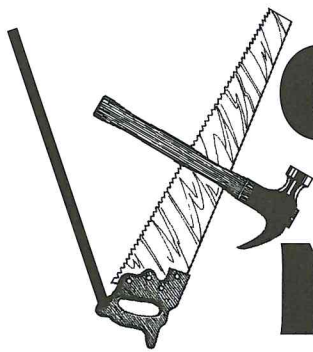

1994 year-end reports

'94 Tithe and missions up, Wisconsin Budget down

With the Lord's blessing, we closed our books for December with gains in several areas. I'm happy to report a **tithe gain of 5.9 percent** over 1993. This strong increase helps us meet the financial challenges that we face. Thank you for your faithfulness.

Wisconsin members also increased their **world mission giving by 3.7 percent**. In many conferences, mission giving seems to be on the decline, but thankfully, Wisconsin members are bucking the trend. I strongly believe our local prosperity is directly related to how we help others.

Many members are taking advantage of the services offered in our Trust Department. Through their wills and

trusts, they are remembering the Lord's work. Thanks to these faithful members, \$140,114 was received in 1994.

Unfortunately, the Wisconsin Budget Offering for 1994 was \$211,520.50—**down 2.9 percent** from 1993. Since most of this offering helps support Wisconsin Academy, this presents a serious challenge.

At year's end, both the Evangelism and Wisconsin Academy funds were overdrawn by a total of \$124,433. To make up for this shortage, an appropriation in this amount was made from Non-operating Funds.

Please prayerfully consider giving two percent of your income regularly to the Wisconsin Budget.

Least favorite food: Green olives.

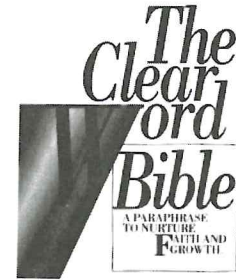
Best part of my day: The very beginning, my devotional time, and the very end, going to sleep.

ABC makes policy changes

Two policy changes have recently occurred in Wisconsin's Adventist Book Center. As of Jan. 8, the ABC is now open every Sunday, 10-4. Previously the store had opened the first Sunday of every month, in addition to its weekend hours.

"We're doing this to accommodate our customers who work all week," said manager **Roy Hunt**.

On Dec. 6, Wisconsin's Executive Committee voted to change the way the ABC handles charge accounts. Beginning Jan. 1, the store no longer accepts personal charges. This includes payroll deductions for conference employees.

"This change does NOT affect church, school, or business accounts," explained Hunt. "Business accounts are considered business, if purchases are for resale or for use in an established, nonprofit institution."

In lieu of payroll deductions, the ABC accepts cash, check, money order, travellers' checks, and Visa, MasterCard, and Discover credit cards. Later this year, American Express will also be accepted.
