“We Have this Hope”

This year camp meeting examines our journey in faith from 1844-1994

IT'S BEEN ONE HUNDRED AND FIFTY YEARS SINCE THE Great Disappointment of 1844, when many sincere Christians believed Jesus would return. This year camp meeting—June 17-25 at Camp Go Seek—reflects on that earnest time with its theme, “We Have this Hope.”

Why remember a disappointment? Good question. Jesus still hasn't come. If those early pioneers who waited on Ascension Rock could see us today, *still here*, their disappointment would undoubtedly be even greater.

Yet there are good reasons both to look back and to look ahead. Wisconsin President Arnold

Swanson explains: “The discovery of the 2300-day prophecy drew our attention to a very great event. . . It was not the time for Christ's second coming, as thought. But it was the time for Christ to begin His ministry in the



Most Holy Place in the heavenly sanctuary—an event which marked the beginning of the final judgment.

“The good news is that the sins of repentant sinners are now being blotted out from heaven's record book, forever. The terrible disappointment led to a unique and timely message— about Jesus and His ministry for us now.

Elder Swanson continues: “In 1844 a worldwide movement miraculously began—a move-

ment proclaiming the good news of the everlasting gospel to all the world in the world's judgment hour.”

Remembering our past can help us better understand who we are and what direction we are headed. It can help us find reasons why Jesus hasn't come yet, and what our part in His coming is to be.

So come to camp meeting! Reaffirm for yourself why “we have this hope.”

As always, camp meeting promises something for everyone. But this year it promises even more—just take a look! (See program schedule, next page for seminar times and adult speaker schedule):

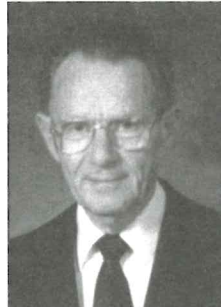
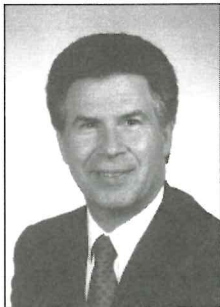
Super seminars!

Treasurer's report

Blessings continue in Wisconsin

Just as the LAMPLETTER went to press, we sent our April report to the Lake Union Conference. It showed a tithe gain of 8.08 percent over the same period last year.

We are very thankful, too, for the 5.5 percent gain in the Wisconsin Budget offering for the four months ending April 30.

When we systematically support Wisconsin Budget, we help fund the following: Wisconsin Academy operation; general evangelism; Youth Educational Scholarship; and the academy, church school, campground and church building and equipment funds. Please join Ruth and me in supporting Wisconsin Budget with 2 percent of income.

A few highlights from our March 31, 1994 financial statement: Pastor and Bible worker

expense, our major expenditure, is slightly under budget, and church school transfers are below budget. Academy operation is about 10 percent over budget through March, but we expect this to level out over the next few months.

Because of its high cost, we are no longer operating a moving van. In April, Montana Conference Transportation bought our semi truck and trailer. They will continue to assist us with moving and transporting ADRA boxes from the conference.

May we each be faithful in handling the resources that the Lord has entrusted to us.

Camp Meeting Guidelines and Rental Provisions

To make camp meeting safe and enjoyable for everyone, please:

1. Park only one vehicle by each campsite.
2. Camp in assigned areas only.
3. Avoid moving personal property during Sabbath hours.
4. Purchase Sabbath meal tickets before sundown Friday at the administration office.
5. Observe modest dress and behavior. Wear shorts and play clothes only during playtime; swimwear only at the beach.
6. Observe speed regulations and handicapped parking areas.
7. Know the location of the First Aid building (just west of the dining hall). Nurse's hours: 8-9 AM; 12:30-1:30 PM; and 6-7:15 PM. Report emergencies to the main office.
8. Parents—pick up your young children within 15 minutes after the close of their programs.
9. Respect the boundaries of Camp Go Seek—help us be good neighbors!
10. Leave pine needle coverings around cabin and camp sites intact to prevent soil erosion.
11. Play pianos/organs only with approval.
12. Remember that the use of radios and TV's is not appropriate on the campgrounds.
13. Respect our rental policy: Any renter shall lose his or her rights to re-rent or remain in any accommodation if: (a) the accommodation is found to be occupied by children or young people without proper chaperonage (as defined by the controlling committee); or (b) the individual is found to be violating any principle of the Seventh-day Adventist Church.
14. Observe our beach rules:
 - A. Beach is closed except at times specified (posted in CAMP LAMP).
 - B. Adults must accompany children 12 years old or younger.
 - C. Swimmers age 12 and over should wear robes to and from the beach. Please wear modest, one-piece swimsuits. Swimwear is restricted to the beach area only.
 - D. NO SWIMMING AFTER 6 PM OR ON SABBATH.

Remember, absolutely no:

- Tobacco, alcohol, or drugs.
- Pets.
- Candles or campfires.
- Selling, soliciting, or promoting of any items or projects.
- Bicycles (except for conference-hired messengers).
- Fishing.
- Weapons of any kind, **including water guns and other water toys.**

• **Camp Work Bee** - Sunny skies and willing hands helped make the work go fast at our third annual Work Bee, May 15-18 at Camp Go Seek. Arne Swanson says a total of more than 150 volunteers, including five grade school groups, helped spruce up the grounds in preparation for camp meeting and summer camp.

Workers showed up early Sunday to tackle the two major jobs: reroofing the dining hall and administration office. The group started at 6:30 AM; by late afternoon nearly every last shingle was in place.

• **Wisconsin Academy Days** - A full weekend featuring the Youth Rally, Pathfinder Fair and Academy Days drew many more students than expected, says WA principal Steve Brown. While this was the first year for 7th graders to participate, Steve

says they accounted for only 25 of the 119 students who came—way up from last year's 70! A survey showed 41 new students plan to enroll next year.

• **Waukesha Health Fair** - Charlotte Hamlin, a 74-year-old cyclist, was one of the special guests at the Health Fair held at the Waukesha Expo Center May 22 and sponsored by the Waukesha church and *Lifestyle Magazine* television program. • **Tornado relief** - Clear Lake Community Services and grade school helped with clean-up after a spring twister hit the town of Prairie Farm.
