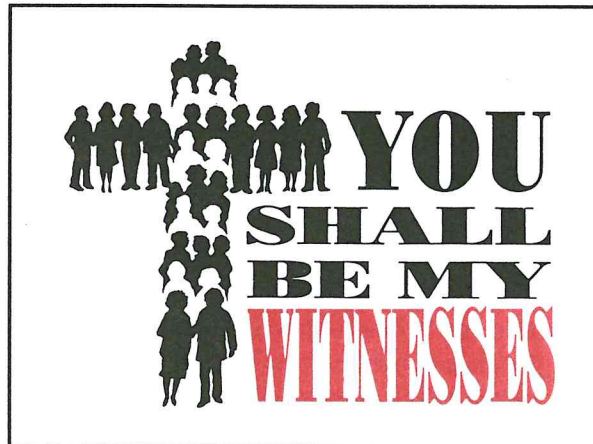


WA puts "the Good News in shoes" for 93-94

"I wish academies were like that when my kids were in school." That was one parent's comment after hearing about the new school year at Wisconsin Academy. While outreach has always been an important part of life at WA, this year the school has placed an even greater emphasis on evangelism, according to Principal Steve Brown.

Academy chaplain/Bible teacher Neil Richmund calls the program "Putting the Good News in Shoes."

"We want to give students a chance to put theory into practice," Richmund explains. To do that, two Fridays a month are devoted to community service--one week for freshmen and seniors, the next for sophomores and juniors. For a three-



hour time period, classes are cancelled, and students and staff work together in the community.

The first Friday, several student groups, each accompanied by two staff members, set out on their missions. Two groups went to Columbus nursing homes, where they will regularly volunteer. Four students

worked at Petersen Elementary as teacher assistants. Preparing trim for a new paint job at an elderly woman's home was the job for eleven students. Finally, ten students took a survey of town trees.

Tree survey? Yes. At the request of the city of Columbus, students recorded the species and condition of downtown trees, and measured the width of each tree trunk.

Richmund feels this type of outreach is especially important. "We're trying to build up a rapport [with the community]," he says. In planning the year's projects, Columbus Mayor Joe Marks met with Richmund and the outreach committee.

How do students feel about a school that teaches service as well as

Milwaukee crusades reap results

Fifty-five baptisms, the forming of a new Lake Region Conference church, and the return of several former Adventists have resulted from Milwaukee area crusades held this summer. Sponsored by the Wisconsin, Lake Region, and Lake Union Conferences, crusades will continue this fall as part of a major evangelistic push in the city.

At the Waukesha Church, 28 believers accepted Christ in a special baptism Sept. 11, reports Pastor Duane Brown. The baptisms follow a

series held at the Waukesha Expo by Evangelist Leo Schreven. "We have an equal number of interests!" Brown exclaims.

Wisconsin Conference Evangelist Bernard Williams also conducted meetings July 9-Aug. 21 for Lake Region's Milwaukee Sharon Church.

While some described the tent site as "hot and mosquitoey," attendance was strong. "We could not have had a better speaker than Evangelist Williams," says Pastor Alfonzo Greene, Jr.

The pastor reports 27 baptisms, with two more planned.

According to Greene, as a result of these meetings, a new Lake Region church will be formed.

Near Kenosha, Auldwin Humphrey's ten-night crusade opened August 6 at the University of Wisconsin-Parkside's Community Arts Theater. "Lifestyle 2000" featured special health presentations, musical programs, skits, and Bible preaching.

What's new in Wisconsin schools

The Wisconsin school year opened with two new SDA schools and significant renovations in several others.

Serving the Portage district is the new Pine View School in Wisconsin Dells. According to Education

Superintendent Herb Wrate, 17 students are now enrolled.

Six students attend the new Fox Valley School located in Neenah. Helene Riggs is both principal and teacher.

After operating for 26 years in just one room, the Rice Lake School has a new home, reports Pastor Norm Yoder. "The dreaming, planning, fund raising and construction of the new building has been in process for nearly five years," he says.

Located behind the church, the new facility includes a gym, two classrooms, kitchen, offices, and bathroom showers.

With funds from the Columbus Church and private donations, Petersen Elementary School was able to make several improvements both inside and out. Renovations include newly paved parking lots; an outdoor basketball court; a new furnace and duct work; a new ceiling, wall coverings, and extra insulation in the gym.

Columbus Pastor Gaylan Herr says the entire project cost about \$22,000.

Some say the food tastes better in Wisconsin Academy's newly remodeled cafeteria. Donations from the Committee of 100 and others made new carpet, windows, serving units, and drywall possible.

The academy chapel also received a badly needed facelift when pews, new flooring and drapes were installed this summer. The Columbus Church raised funds for the roughly \$48,000 project.

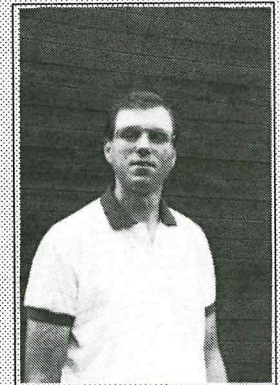
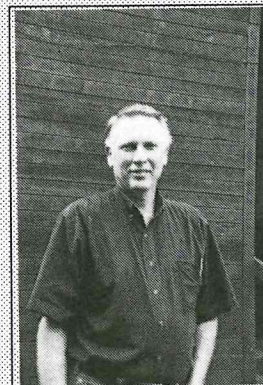
However, Brown says he's excited about the strong spiritual atmosphere pervading the campus.

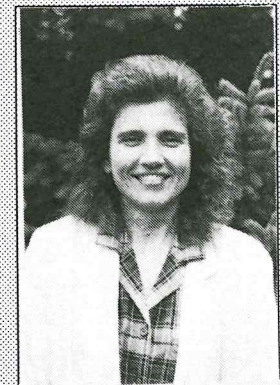

Prisoner finds SDA Church on his own

A call from the chaplain at the Green Bay Correctional Institution recently led Pastor Marvin Clark to meet Dennis, an inmate who, without realizing it, discovered Adventist truths on his own.

"He had been studying the Bible three hours a day for two years," Clark said in a recent phone interview. "Using only a King James Bible and Strong's Concordance, and without any Christian upbringing, this man developed his own theology."

Dennis then went to Chaplain Paul Emmel and outlined his beliefs. "Do you know of a church that believes the way I do?" he asked.

"You have described the Seventh-day Adventist Church perfectly!" Emmel told him. The chaplain immediately contacted Pastor Clark, who now studies with Dennis weekly.

"I'm amazed at how much he knows," Clark said. "He has a knowledge of Scripture which would put many of us to shame."

Youth Educational Scholarship Pilot Program

Last year, 33 Youth Educational Scholarships (Y.E.S.) were awarded to students who otherwise would not have been able to attend Wisconsin Academy. In order to receive a Y.E.S. scholarship, a student must meet the criteria below:

1. Maintain passing grades.
2. Cooperate fully with work/study program (students over 16 work in industry).
3. Uphold school standards and rules.

In addition, the recipient's parents must show a definite financial need and make regular monthly payments on their financial commitment.

It takes \$50-\$60,000 to cover one year's Y.E.S. funds. To do this, the 1993-94 pilot program asks families and individuals to consider donating \$100 or more per year to the annual Y.E.S. fund.

This annual fund will be used for Y.E.S. scholarships only; it does **not** replace the need for sponsors. Individual sponsors will still be needed for some individual students.

"What do you mean?"

"Well, I don't quite know how to explain it - but I have been watching you fellows and you're so fair in your repair estimates and so honest in your work. I notice you don't smoke or swear - and you never lose your tempers when things go wrong. I keep wondering why."

"Well, I guess maybe it's because we're Christians."

"Christians," laughed the big man, "I'm a Christian; I belong to the biggest church in town - but I'm not like you."

It was another day. The insurance man had dropped by and was standing - watching. One of the men asked him, "Would you like to take some Bible studies?" "I think I would," was the quiet reply. As a result, the man, his wife, and his son became members of the mechanic's church.

As I thought about these two stories, I thought about those of us who are members of the Seventh-day Adventist Church. What influence do we have on our children, other church members, and new members, in the way we use the finances God has entrusted to us?*

Do we support the church with our tithes and offerings or do we send them to some other organization and then complain because the Conference does not do all we think it should?

Do we want to have all the money needed for Evangelism, Wisconsin Academy, Church and School Buildings, Worthy Students and other projects funded by Wisconsin Budget Offerings. And do we want it so much that every month we give 2% of our income to Wisconsin Budget? Do we encourage others to do the same?

We appreciate all of you who give 2% and also those who give less. Let us all give sacrificially, and our God who sees in secret shall reward us openly. Perhaps someone will ask us what is the secret of our success and we can share that it is the blessing of our God.

literature evangelists distributed 24,000 flyers inviting people to attend. Opening night drew a crowd of 550, says district Pastor David Scofield.

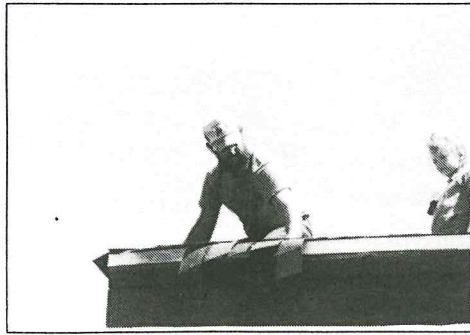
On Thursday night, seven student LE's took part in a musical presentation.
