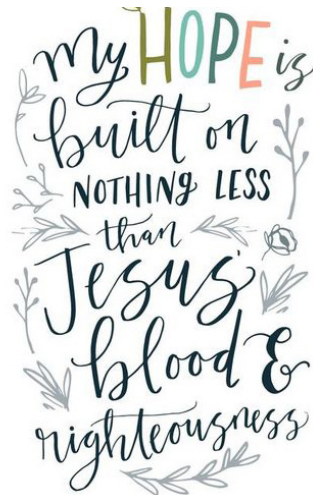

Don and Norene Hasbrook are members of the Wisconsin Academy Church. Don is a retired literature evangelist/maintenance man, and Norene spent 25 years as a CNA in a care facility for the elderly.

“Hello, Jean, how have you been?” greeted Norene with a smile as she enters the Larsen House and sees a friend. Don and Norene Hasbrook are weekly visitors to the Larsen House, a home for the aging and those needing help. They come on Monday’s to visit residents individually, and again on Friday’s to play Bingo, sharing in the activities of their lives.

“We’ve been coming here twice a week for the past 6-8 months,” said Norene. “Our pastor, Jonathan Fetrick, said in his sermon one Sabbath that there is something for every one of us to do for Jesus in our own community.” Don and Norene started praying about what they could do and that week a flyer arrived in the mail announcing a facility was opening in town for people with Alzheimer’s. Right away they visited the local Larsen Home and told the activity director they wanted to come and regularly visit residents who could use a friend. “I’ve never had anyone ask to do something like this before,” said the activity director. “This is wonderful.”

Don heads down the hall with his cane to find his friend Don who is confined to a wheelchair. They soon warm to each others company, talking of children, travels, careers and gardening with knowing smiles and chuckles interspersed. The visit ended with a prayer of thanks by Don to the Lord for the time to visit, and that He is coming soon to take us to heaven.

Norene sits comfortably on the bedside of Jean, who talked of when she went to college and of her former career as a performing figure skater. Norene tells Jean how she and Don married and after Bible studies gave their hearts to the Lord and decided to be baptized

into the Seventh-day Adventist church. “Do you have a pastor that comes to visit you,” asked Norene? “No, but I’d like that,” answered Jean. “I do believe in the Lord.” Norene always ends her visit asking if she can pray, and most residents readily agree.

“We come here to visit and make people’s lives just a little bit more pleasant.” Said Norene on leaving the building. “I always bring a devotional book and if time allows I read one to whoever I’m visiting. I’m thankful I can do this, even though I’m hobbling around.”
