It was then suggested to me that I should look into Wisconsin Academy. Soon after visiting the academy, and after some long talks with my parents, we decided that it would be best for me to attend for my senior year.

Within the first month of attending Wisconsin Academy I finally got an answer from God. I truly realized through the daily worship experiences at Wisconsin Academy, that what I was missing was God. I also realized that instead of putting my own dreams first, I needed to go to God first.

From then on, and even today, I make a daily choice to trust God, and do what He wants.

Wisconsin Begins Mission Work in China

Jacob Anderson and his brother Benjamin of Poy Sippi, Wisconsin, were the first Adventist missionaries to China. Jacob's wife, Emma, had two sisters who decided to go also. Wisconsin Conference agreed to pay the two Thompson sisters' expenses, and in 1901, they were on their way to China.

Emma's sister, Ida, was moved by the needs of the Chinese women and wrote home, "If there were only a small sum of money to be used for the purpose, I certainly should undertake to open a girls' school."

The quick reply came, "Go ahead and open a girls' school. Wisconsin Conference will supply the means required for its maintenance." Ida called her school, "Bethel Girls' School," after her beloved school back in Wisconsin, Bethel Academy. For five years, Bethel Girls' School was totally supported by Wisconsin members.
