AN INTERVIEW WITH DON LIVESAY

Don Livesay, president of the Lake Union Conference since 2008, is our featured speaker for the second weekend of camp meeting.

Previous to being president for the Lake Union, he served as vice president for the Oregon Conference. Through the years he has also been a pastor, campus chaplain, youth director, and assistant to the president for communication, health/temperance, and stewardship.

He is married to Barbara Livesay, who serves the Lake Union Conference as associate director for Risk Management/HR and as associate director for Early Childhood Education in the Education department. We interviewed Elder Livesay for the Camp Lamp.

CAMP LAMP: *Tell us a little about yourself.*

LIVESAY: I was born in Benton Harbor, MI, but I grew up mainly in southern California. My father was a pastor. I experienced the conversion process as I grew up. My decision to be baptized was very intentional. My father was holding an evangelistic series of meetings. During that time as an 8th grade boy I felt a call to the ministry. It was a very pivotal point in my life. It set my future on track.

I was going to freshman orientation at La Sierra University and Barbara, now my wife, was part of the registration process. We connected during that week, and became casual friends through



that year. She did not come to college an Adventist. During her sophomore year she was baptized. That next summer we were both hired at Pine Springs Ranch. While we were there, we started dating. Today we have two married girls.

CAMP LAMP: *What does a Union president do?*

LIVESAY: Lots of church governance. Being on committees, presidential placements, conference constituency sessions, working with institutions like

Andrews University, Loma Linda University, Adventist Health Systems, Media Center, the North American Division, and the General Conference Executive Committee. There are 49 committees that I serve on. That's a huge part of what I do. There are a fair amount of speaking appointments, as well as writing, and giving direction to our office staff. The union is the cornerstone of governance for the Seventh-day Adventist Church.

CAMP LAMP: *What do you do in your free time?*

LIVESAY: I enjoy woodworking, carpentry, furniture making, and I like light car maintenance. Lately, I've made bookshelves for our house and cedar chests for our daughters.

LIVESAY: *Steps to Christ* by E.G. White and *Be God's Leader* by Henry and Richard Blackaby.
