AN INTERVIEW WITH JIM NIX

"Jesus is coming." That is the message of Elder James Nix, the director of the Ellen White Estate. Raised in an Adventist family and attending Adventist schools, Nix developed his interest in Adventist history while a student at Newbury Park Academy. His roommate, who worked in the school library, brought him old books on Adventist history.

While in college, a week-of-prayer speaker mentioned that Alma McKibbin, a teacher then in her nineties, had known Ellen White and other Adventist pioneers. Nix asked for her address and went to visit her. This began Nix's pursuit of speaking with those who had known Ellen White personally. From there, he went to Elmhaven, California, and talked to Mrs. Jacques, the granddaughter of Ellen White. She referred Nix to her mother, daughter-in-law of Ellen White. His next visit was to Washington, D.C. to make a recording with Arthur White from the Ellen White Estate.

With knowledge of Ellen White accumulated from oral histories, Nix was a natural choice when Loma Linda was looking for someone to start the Heritage Room at Loma Linda University in 1972. In 1976, he convinced the White Estate to open an office in Loma Linda, where he was the director until 1993. From there, he moved on to the White Estate in Washington, D.C. as the



associate director, becoming the director in 2000.

The Ellen White Estate was developed to fulfill a request in Ellen White's will. She left her unpublished manuscripts and letters to a committee of five trustees, now expanded to fifteen. Their purpose is to protect the original manuscripts of Ellen White's writings, provide and produce compilations of her writings, and translate the writings into other languages. About sixty years ago the White Estate also began providing tours to historical

Adventist sites. They also promote the preservation of Adventist history in the various divisions around the world. As the director of the Ellen White Estate, Nix visits the Ellen White Estate Research Centers in each division.

One challenge Elder Nix faces on a regular basis is making Adventist history relevant. Through sharing Adventist history, he hopes to connect the lives of Adventist pioneers to Adventists today. He wants to spark an interest so Adventists will read and learn more about our heritage.

Above all, he shares the message that Jesus is coming. "When He comes is His choice," says Nix. "I don't worry about the timing anymore. That's His business. But Jesus is coming!"

She's here at camp meeting again this year, sitting in the meetings, making quilts. What an inspiration!

Primaries Help Disaster Victims

At 3:30pm on Tuesday, children in the Primary division sorted items that will be packed into Personal Care Kits and Personal Activity and Learning (PAL) kits to be distributed to victims of recent disasters.

Over ninety 7 to 9-year-olds swarmed across the front end of the Primary tent where the sorting took place. Leaders handed washcloths, hand lotion, packs of pencils, and other donated items to teams of Primaries, who found boxes labeled with matching names and simple drawings.

"We're getting stuff to people who don't have any," said David, a Primary, as he carefully dropped a box of Crest into a cardboard box marked "Toothpaste." "It's challenging because you have to put things in the right boxes," added Teigan, another Primary, "and there are a lot of kids. But it's fun."

"They did a great job," said Pastor Jenniffer Ogden, Primary division leader, after the event. "They sorted through four tables of donations. That's a lot. What really strikes me, is their passion to help others and their willingness to give. They're so excited to run a bar of soap to a box."

"If we get kids involved at a young age, hopefully they will stay involved later in life," added Floyd Brock, Community Services director for the Wisconsin Conference.

The washcloths, travel tissues, soap, shampoo, pencils, rulers, notebooks, toys, etc. were do-

nated by church members across Wisconsin. Several people have already volunteered to drive the completed kits to distribution points in Joplin, MO, and Apison, TN.

"Having a project is a way to make Community Services real to people," says Alice Garrett, one of the project leaders. "People have brought lots of stuff. They're really excited to be a part of something to help others."

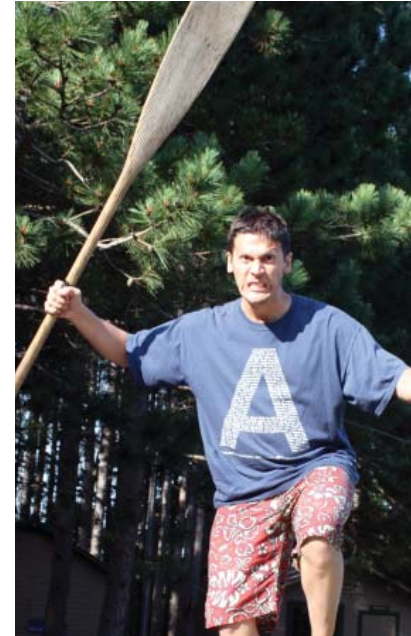
