Combined Health and Reaping Meetings

In October, 2011, the Rhinelander and Tomahawk churches jointly held simultaneous reaping and health meetings for three weeks.

Pastor Chuck Kohley led out one night a week in a program called, Super Foods of the Bible. Ancient Bible health secrets were presented and delicious vegetarian cuisine was served as guests mingled and got acquainted.

At the same time, Elder James Fox, evangelism coordinator for the Wisconsin conference, held reaping meetings four nights a week reviewing Biblical beliefs that church members had already been introducing to their friends.

Throughout the three weeks, 15-20 interests attended. At the close of the meetings, five were baptized. Their stories are amazing:

- One lady had taken Adventist Bible studies with a church member over 20 years ago. Six months before the meetings, she again began studying the Bible with another church member. Now she is attending church again.
- Another lady had been having Bible studies with a member and attending church for many months. She made her decision for Jesus.
- Listening to Doug Bachelor on 3ABN radio, another lady became convinced Saturday was the Sabbath. She had met a church member while out walking and was surprised to discover he was an Adventist. He invited her to church. She got involved in Super Foods of the Bible and the fellowship of the church. On the closing Sabbath of the meetings, she sealed her decision for Jesus in baptism.
- Five others are preparing for baptism
- Another five are very interested.

They all had something in common—they were friends with Adventist people and had been taking Bible studies when the meetings began. They were in relationship with contagious Christians.

The face of evangelism is changing in Wisconsin. Church members are becoming key players in God's work of seeking and saving the lost. The Rhinelander and Tomahawk Churches each expended less than \$1,000 on these meetings.

Reaching Teens and Young Adults

Evangelizing 18-35 year-olds is difficult. My concern as I minister to this group is that we as a church use a vernacular only familiar to the Judeo/Christian mind. Most teenagers and young adults today have no comprehension of, or familiarity with, the meta-narrative of the Bible. So what should we do? Simple, speak their language.

The Bible message can be summerized as follows:

- 1. What Jesus has done for you
- 2. What Jesus is doing for you now
- 3. What we have done
- 4. What we are doing
- 5. What we should be doing

As we learn to highlight these simple concepts in today's language, others will better understand us.

In any evangelistic effort, we must speak the language of our audience and go where they are. That is what the apostle Paul was trying to do among the Greeks in Athens. We can't wait for this generation to simply walk into our churches.

Let's find a blending of our incredible Seventhday Adventist message with innovative ways to witness. We need to be able to do this without fear that our innovation will be rejected by the congregation we are trying to bring new members to.

In Words of Encouragement to Workers in the Home Missionary Field p. 23-24, Mrs. White says:

"Speak and act to the glory of God. Say 'In thought, word and deed I will be a blessing to those I meet. I will let light shine forth.' Enter into conversation with the people. Become familiar with their experience... Take with you into their homes the sunshine of heaven. Outside of the truth, there is little enough of this sunshine now in the world. As you seek to become acquainted with those who have no knowledge of the truth, as you strive to speak words in season, remember that you are God's helping hand, and that He will teach you to speak words which will cause light to shine into darkened minds. Doors will open for the work of soul-saving."

Over one hundred years ago, God told us exactly what we need to do: infiltrate the spaces this generation calls "home," and share the reason why they haven't found "home" yet.

As we continue our work on closing the books for 2011, it's a good time to look back and see how the Lord has blessed our conference. As you may be aware, 2011 was a difficult budget year, largely because we experienced a tithe loss in 2010. Pay reductions, and other economies, were implemented in order to balance the budget. While the final results for 2011 are still being tabulated, here are some results from 2011 that we can share with you.

Tithe for 2011 was up by 3.27%. This represents an increase of just over \$207,000. A big thank you for your faithfulness to the Lord in the very difficult economy we are all experiencing.

Last year about this time, a special appeal was made for the Wisconsin Budget to help with funding needed for Wisconsin Academy. A faith goal of \$320,000 was set. This represents an increase of over 34% (\$83,000) of what was received last year. I am happy to report that this year ended with \$341,340 for Wisconsin Budget. This represents a (43.8%) \$104,014 increase over last year. Thank you for your part in making this goal a reality.

We are very excited about what is happening at Wisconsin Academy. Your continued support of Wisconsin Budget for 2012 is critical as we maintain the essential support needed this year by Wisconsin Academy. May God continue to bless and honor your faithfulness to Him in 2012 as we look forward to His soon return.
