Forerunner of Camp Meetings In 1867 leaders wondered, would people be willing to camp for a week for a general meeting of all believers? Elders Andrews and Blanchard decided to give it a try, and Elder Sanborn offered his cow pasture east of Janesville.

The REVIEW notice read, "See to it that the enemy does not cheat you out of attending this gathering of the saints...We expect to pitch a large tent... and would like to see forty tents around it. Eight yards of factory will make a tent fifteen feet long, nine feet wide, with a wall six feet high...Such a tent will not cost more than \$16."

The first camp meeting experiment ever, opened September 17, 1867. Twelve families pitched tents, while others stayed in nearby homes. Uriah Smith and James and Ellen White were the visiting speakers, gathering a crowd of 1,200 on Sunday. Years later Elder W. C. White labeled this Wisconsin camp meeting "the forerunner of camp meetings."
