It was a hit! The one lady was almost speechless. She was so happy to have found a way to "open the Bible." Later she said, "Since coming to these studies my husband and I have discussed the Bible more than all the other 40 years of our marriage." She reads her Bible every day now.

Both ladies embraced the Sabbath, state of the dead, baptism, and are excited about the Second Coming. There wasn't anything these ladies didn't agree with, however, they did not want to be baptized into the Adventist church. My job was done. I planted the seeds and the Holy Spirit will do the rest.

This past summer while pruning my bushes a woman stopped while walking her dog and said, "Aren't you the woman who had a Bible study going on last year? My heart skipped a beat, yes, I was the one, and I plan on doing it again. She smiled and said she does Bible studies as well and told me she thought it was so cool how I put a sign in my front yard.

This experience of Lay Ministry really gave me a voice and the encouragement I needed to follow through with a dream of being more involved in God's work. I put it off for years thinking I couldn't do it, but "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." Philippians 4:13.

That verse means more to me than ever before. I've always thought of myself as a good follower but never a leader. However, these past two years has proven that God can make me a leader. I feel so much more bold and willing to do His work. Never say never! God has a plan.

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The Gift Heaven is Waiting to Bestow

When I was in academy part of my daily job was to keep seven lawn mowers in running condition so the mowing crew could keep the campus mowed and looking sharp. Our academy registrar asked me one day to fix his personal lawnmower. He told me that no matter how hard he pulled the rope the mower just wouldn't start.

I checked the fuel and oil. Everything looked good. And then I noticed it. The spark plug wire was disconnected. I attached it and the mower started with ease.

Could there be a lesson about our evangelistic efforts in the registrar's mower?

When Jesus was giving final instructions to His disciples before His ascension He shared with them the key to effective witnessing. *"But you shall receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you shall be witnesses to Me in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth."* Acts 1:8.

We put the time and effort in. We send out the advertising, and yet our efforts often have little effect. But we must make sure we take advantage of the promise Jesus gave us, that He would give us the gift of the Holy Spirit.

Ellen White in the book, *Christ Object Lessons* page 328, says, *"It is the absence of the Spirit that makes the gospel ministry so powerless. Learning, talents, eloquence, every natural or acquired endowment, may be possessed; but without the presence of the Spirit of God, no heart will be touched, no sinner won to Christ."*

Sound discouraging? She continues: *"On the other hand, if they are connected to Christ, if the gifts of the Spirit are theirs, the poorest and most ignorant of His disciples will have a power that will tell upon the hearts. God makes them the channel for the outworking of the highest influence in the universe."* COL 328

If we want to be effective witnesses for Christ it is imperative that we ask for, and receive, the Holy Spirit.

Evangelism page 701 says, *"The descent of the Holy Spirit upon the church is looked forward to as in the future; but it is the privilege of the church to have it now. Seek for it, pray for it, believe for it. We must have it, and Heaven is waiting to bestow it."*

As you consider your witness to your neighbor, work associate, or classmate, take time to make that vital connection with the power and presence of the Holy Spirit. He will work in and through us, if we just ask.

The Lord has blessed our school over the past ten years. We have grown from 28 students ten years ago to 184 this past year, with 207 students currently registered for this coming school year.

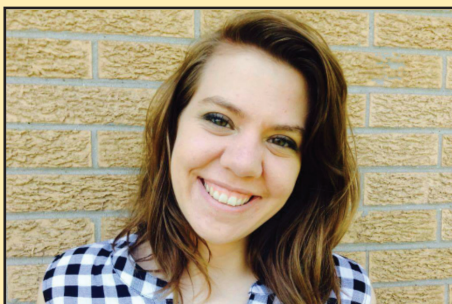

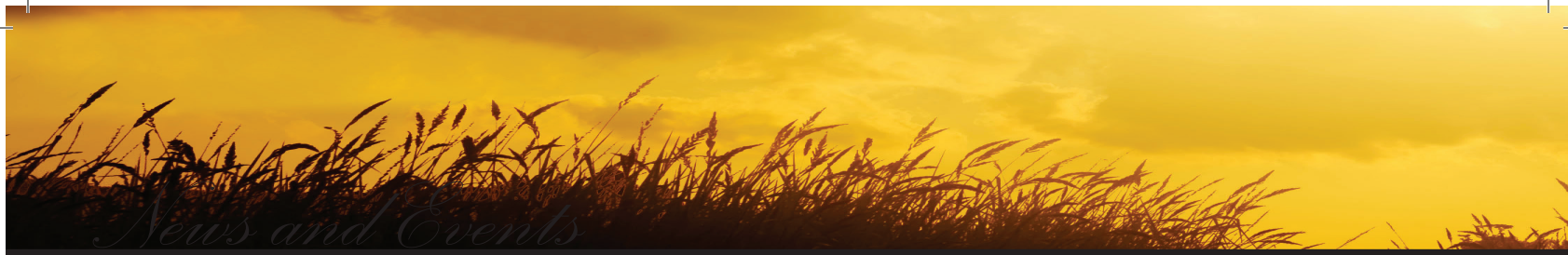
"When I was little I didn't like school. It was hard and I didn't get it. Then one year it really hit me that school was amazing. I think that was when I decided I wanted to help kids

FINANCIAL UPDATE

At a special constituency of the Wisconsin Conference, held Sunday of camp meeting, a recommendation by the Executive Committee was voted to replace the wastewater treatment system at Wisconsin Academy. This is necessary as our current system is not only worn out but can no longer meet new requirements as established by the DNR. Our operating permit for the old system will not be renewed and the current operation of the system is very costly in terms of operation and time spent on testing and maintenance.

The cost of the new system itself is \$277,000. Total cost with necessary repairs and decommissioning of the old system is projected at a little under \$500,000. Previous estimates for this project have ranged from \$1,250,000 to \$2,000,000. We believe God has blessed us with this plan to take care of the wastewater needs at Wisconsin Academy.

The plans for the new system have been approved and construction is to start immediately. We hope to finish the project by the end of this year. To keep borrowing to a minimum, the Executive Committee voted a challenge to our constituency. The constituents voted to accepted the challenge to raise \$150,000 by year end. We are asking that you help us reach this goal. We are off to a good start as we have received pledges in excess of \$20,000 as of July. Donations may be given by simply writing WA Wastewater on a tithe envelope and turning it in through your local church. Donations may also be sent straight to Wisconsin Conference Office.

With all of us working together, this project can be paid for with little or no borrowing and without too large a burden on anyone. Thank you for your consideration and support.

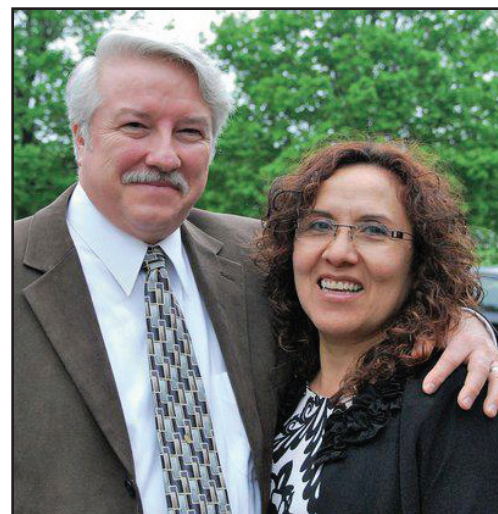


Willyta Wamak New Girls' Dean
