I could not have known then that I would also be gaining an extraordinary family of faith in the Seventh-day Adventist church. For this year, I was baptized by Pastor Sheldon Bryan at Milwaukee Central SDA Church.

My journey reflects many of the features of a modern Christian seeker, for it has been guided above all by the quality and depth of relationships. There were many precious steps where, in hindsight, I can see God's hand at work. God worked through Ron and Rose Anglin, who were the first people to greet me at Central, and they just never let go! God worked through Nelda Womack, who found a connection with me through the hometown of Merrill that she shared with my grandfather and father. God worked through Pastor Rodney and Pamela Mills, who took the time to show me the Biblical basis of Adventism, and in an amazing surprise, travelled back from Texas to Milwaukee to be present for my baptism. God worked through my in-laws, Karl and Anita Piekarek, who've shown me the strongest marriage I've ever seen. God worked through my wife, Dee, who has a passion that all the kids at Central shall be members of Christ's church...and shall be members of the

remnant who keep the commands of God. And God worked through so many of the other families with whom we are raising our seven-year-old daughter, Delaney--A family of families raising our children together. This year, God worked through Pastor Sheldon Bryan, who ignited an excitement in me by showing me the thoughtful and intellectually rigorous ways that the Adventist church is presenting the eternal truths of the gospel, while simultaneously translating it to the historical moment of today. In him I recognize the wise steward about whom Jesus spoke, the one who can bring forth from his storeroom both the old treasures and the new. There are exciting things happening at Milwaukee Central, and I

know there will be many more baptisms administered through Pastor Sheldon's hands!

Above all, though, what has always been irresistible about this church is the love. The people of God at Central have stood by me and Dee on some of our most joyful days, and they have stood by us on some of our toughest days, as we lost two of our children to a neurological disorder, our dear sons Nicholas and Matthew. As I told the congregation on the day of my baptism, "Most miraculously, you have always loved me as I am...and not merely for what you hoped I might one day be." That is miraculous love. That is

Green Bay Students Hand Out Smiles For Christmas





FINANCIAL UPDATE

t is hard to believe we are already at another year's end. Looking back on 2017 it has had many challenges as any year does. However I believe it is also a good time to reflect on the many blessings that God has provided as well. In a world full of change and fear I am so thankful we have a God who is 100% reliable and never changes.

We have now received the final remittances for 2017. December's tithe came in at 3.71 percent lower than December 2016 tithe. This is as result of a "one time" large tithe gift received in December of last year. I am happy to report that the tithe for all of 2017 increased by 1.52%. This is despite having one less Sabbath and the windfall tithe received in 2016 mentioned above. While a modest gain, we are also experiencing a 2.13% decrease in expenses, the result of an unexpected drop in healthcare costs this year. These are just a few of many blessing witnessed this past year in our conference.

The Wisconsin Budget enjoyed an increase in giving for December of 7.21% However, with the loss coming into December; Wisconsin Budget has ended 2017 with a small decrease of 2.71%. This represents a drop of just over \$8,000 in giving over 2016. Again, we had one less Sabbath and a "windfall" donation that came in for Wisconsin Budget last year as well, making it difficult to maintain the 2016 level.



Center for Student Success

Innovative Learning Center Boosts Student Test Scores

am happy to report preliminary results from our Student Success Program. Still in its first year, this innovative program is already addressing the academic needs of students who are struggling with reading and mathematics.

The hub of this program, the Center for Student Success, is coordinated by its own full-time director, Janine Show, who is doing an exceptional job in this pioneer work. The center is equipped with ten computers and offers instruction in reading using Fast ForWord and instruction in math using ALEKS. Each of these programs individualizes course content and delivery to meet the student's needs as identified through ongoing assessment.

In August, all students were administered MAP placement testing. The results guided the placement of students in classes appropriate for their level. Eighteen were enrolled in Fast Forward and 14 in ALEKS. As the semester progressed, many of these students began to sense improvement in their performance, which has in turn improved their attitudes

toward school and increased their enthusiasm for learning.

In January, all students were again given MAP placement tests. While more data is needed, the initial results are very encouraging. Of the 18 students enrolled in Fast ForWord,12 have improved in their reading levels. And for the 14 students in ALEKS math, 10 have improved.

As individual examples of the progress made, one student improved in reading by 1.6 grade levels, and three students who struggled with math are now ready for Algebra 1.

Student feedback has been very positive. One young lady said, "I really like it, especially the math. It has helped me a lot." Another commented, "I feel I am learning more."

We are very pleased with the progress being made. This is pioneering work, as we are one of only a very few Seventh-day Adventist schools who are running a program of this kind. Please keep our students in your prayers as we work to develop their talents for God's service.
