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Susan's Miracle



We all sat staring at the smoke and steam boiling up at us from under the hood. What were we going to do now? It was to be my first camp meeting experience and it seemed to be ending before it began.

But let me back up a bit. When I was a high school student in Taiwan, I very much wanted to learn English. Our foreign teacher from Wisconsin invited every one of his 900 students to speak with him one-on-one to improve their conversational English. I spent 10-15 minutes every day practicing my English with him during his office hours. When his parents came to visit him, I invited them to share a typical Taiwanese breakfast and they in turn graciously offered for me to come and visit them sometime in Wisconsin. I did not realize the offer was just them being polite, but I did very much want to visit America.

Several years later, I tracked that foreign teacher down and reminded him of his parent's offer. He called his parents and, because I was one of the few students that took him up on his offer of extra help, he recommended me to visit. That summer I spent two months with the family.

My family is Buddhist, and I was somewhat confused with my host family's religion. My host mother told me that I needed to learn about Christianity in order to fully understand English because it was often referenced in literature and daily life. She gave me the 10 volume Bible Story set to read and I could ask her any questions I might have on anything I read. I fell in love with Jesus by the time I finished the books. I wanted to be baptized but my host mom said I needed to talk to my mother back home and that I needed to see how I felt after my first year at my Buddhist college.

But before I left, the family was preparing to go to something called camp meeting. I wasn't sure about the camping part, but I was willing to try new things. We spent the better part of the day loading up the van, and when I was sure it was so full we wouldn't even fit, we somehow all squeezed in. My host father started the van and we were off, but not very far. Less than a mile down the road, the steam and smoke started pouring out of the engine cavity. We stopped and just stared.

We quickly drove back home and sat in the driveway wondering what to do next. My host father checked all the hoses and none were bad, so he refilled the radiator and

We are obligated to follow state and local health codes regarding recreational camping facilities. Below are some reminders as you plan for this summer.

- 1. All gray and black water must be dumped at a designated dump station or a drain. Dumping on the ground is illegal.
- 2. All camper units and RVs must have a label/symbol on them that shows a nationally recognized testing laboratory or agency approved of the structure.
- 3. Minimum space between camper unit to camper unit is 10 feet. A tent on the same site does not have to maintain that distance. No sites are to have two campers/RVs on them.

Please plan with these regulations in mind.

would like to highlight three items in this brief article as we head into 2016.

First, I am very encouraged by all the evangelism going on and planned for 2016. As of this date we have over 191 meetings approved all around the state. We have committed over \$200,000 to assist our churches in this effort. May God add the blessing of the presence of the Holy Spirit to these initiatives.

Second, tithe income through March is down by 1.8% over this same time period last year. Wisconsin Budget is showing a small loss as well, down by 2.73%.

Third, we have received good news on the Wisconsin Academy wastewater treatment project. We have had a proposal drawn up that essentially puts academy houses on their own wastewater treatment systems and the academy on its own. This proposal has been accepted and permits granted to build this proposal. The good news is that this can be built for far less than all the other proposals that have been considered. While final numbers will be forthcoming it looks as if this entire project could come in around \$500,000. This is far less than the near \$2,000,000 the other options were estimated at. We will be working out the details. We hope to have solid numbers and design by summer. Our plan is to share the final proposal to be voted by the executive committee via a special constituency meeting to be held the Sunday of camp meeting for final approval.

Please keep this project in your prayers as we look to take care of this issue that has been facing us for many years.

Mission Project to the Philippines Makes Lasting Impact

ast Wednesday night, if you had stopped by the principal's office at Wisconsin Academy, you would have seen students laughing and crying as they talked over the telephone to new friends they made on the other side of the world. It's been several weeks now since the 32 students and staff returned from our two-week mission project to the Philippines, but the people of the little village of Marcilla on the island of Busuanga will always be in our hearts.

After months of fundraising, letter-writing, prayer meetings, and answered prayers, our journey began - 18 hours in airplanes, 15 hours on a ferry, and 2 hours on a jeepney.

Once in Marcilla, one of our main projects was building a church. Most days, we worked with community members to build the walls and grade the floor. Grading the floor meant breaking up and hauling tons of dirt. When we left, the walls were ready for stucco and the building was ready for its roof. The church should be finished in May, and we look forward to seeing pictures.

We also held a free medical clinic which served over 600 people. Medical care is scarce and very expensive for the people in Marcilla. Dentists pulled teeth while students held patients' heads and cleaned instruments. Other students ran a dispensery for the doctor who saw patients all day.

Every night, before and during the evangelistic meetings, students led a VBS. By the end of the series, over 80 kids were attending. We grew very close to the children and it was hard to say goodbye when we left.

By God's grace, 51 people were baptized at the close of the meetings, including one of our students. More have been baptized since. This more than doubled the small congregation in Marcilla who will be meeting in the soon-to-be-finished church buildling.

We're back now, but the work is not finished. We've raised money to buy a boat for a fisherman who lost his livelihood to follow Jesus. We're now raising money for two others who desparately need surgery. We pray that through such experiences, Wisconsin Academy students will be fit to serve God wherever He calls them - across the street or around the world.
