Diet, Disease, & Denise

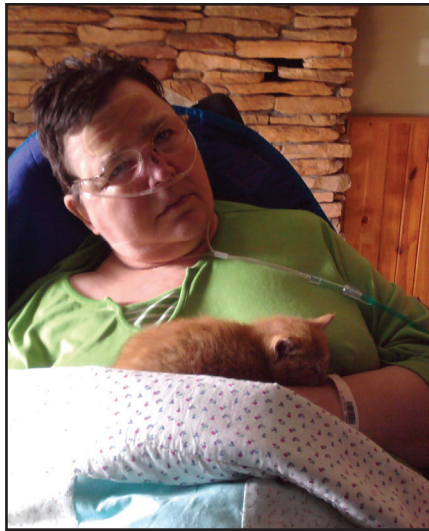
A whole foods plant based diet saved my mom's life. At age 43, my mom, Denise, was put into a nursing home due to complications from Multiple Sclerosis. She remained there for 13 years. She was wheelchair bound, incontinent, on many medications, and her health was declining. In 2011, mom was unresponsive and taken to the emergency room three times. She was having up to 20 seizures a day, followed by unresponsive episodes.

A few months later mom was diagnosed with severe sleep apnea and placed on a bi-pap machine. "I'm not sure how she's still alive," commented the doctor. "She needs to have someone with her 24/7." I began staying in the hospital with mom, leaving only if a nurse or aid were in the room.

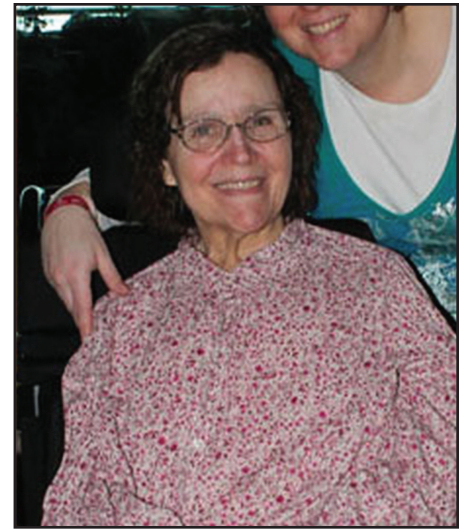
Within four days I was told she had only months to live. I was devastated. I was not ready for her to die. She was so young yet! When the nursing home called saying they could not take my mom back, the hospital staff said I had two options: move mom several hours away to one of two in-state facilities that would accept her level of care, or take her home. I brought her home.

I will not lie and say it was easy. I cried myself to sleep the first month, wondering if I had made the right decision. Mom was bed bound, non-communicative, non-cognitive, incontinent, on two liters of oxygen, a bi-pap machine, pureed food and thickened water. She was obese and had no quality of life. Within a few weeks mom was put on hospice.

My husband and I have a great appreciation for God's original plan for our diet. So, after some careful research into the connection between diet and Multiple Sclerosis, my husband and I determined to make the necessary changes to save mom's life. We began by feeding Mom fresh fruits and vegetables, whole grains, legumes and a

few nuts with fresh water between meals. I would sit in her room feeding her all these brightly colored foods, which she greatly enjoyed.

One morning about six weeks later, I walked into Mom's room and she started telling me about what she was watching on TV. I was amazed! This was communication and memory at work, something we had not seen in years.

Month by month Mom continued to improve: Weight was coming off, no more need for oxygen, the bi-pap went away, medications were eliminated, cognitive ability was coming back, communication skills were returning. She even started feeding herself, and finally no longer needed pureed food or thickened water to keep from choking. When mom was due for hospice recertification six months later, they told us she no longer qualified. Praise the Lord!

It has been five years since we brought mom home to live with us, and we continue to see improvements. She is now a greeter at church and shares her wonderful smiles and love with whomever she meets. Mom has her own ministry now - the ministry of love.

Once we put Mom on a plant-based diet, God worked a miracle, and changes came quickly! Doctors are amazed.

Diet and disease go hand in hand. My mom is living proof.

Forgiveness

I stand in awe at Jesus' words on the cross, "Father, forgive them for they know not what they do." As Jesus hung there He knew their hearts. He had heard their hatred, He had felt their anger, He had seen into their evil hearts. Yet, He pled for their forgiveness. Wow!

Jesus does not offer forgiveness only to those who "don't know what they are doing," but to those who have intentionally walked away from Him, have rebelled, have committed sin on purpose. Let's bask in God's forgiveness, and pass on the gift of forgiveness to others.

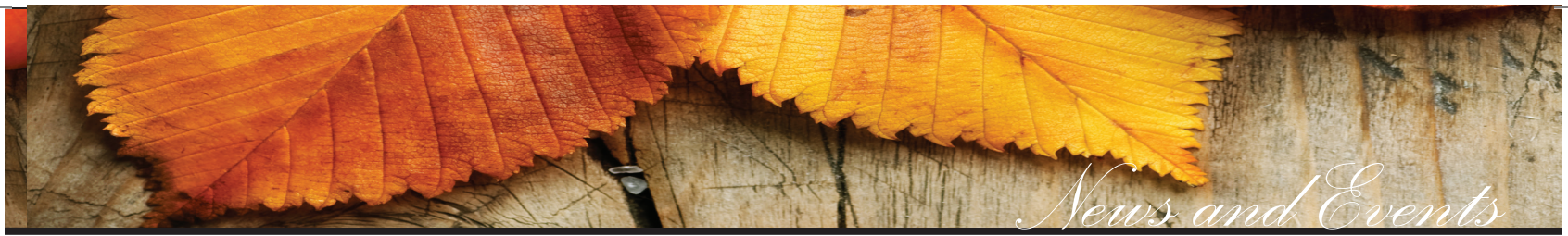

President Mike Edge held the morning service, the Frederic Church Chorale sang, “May All Who Come Behind Us Find Us Faithful,” and building chairman, Mark James, gave a history of the project, revealing many answers to prayer and much evidence of providential guidance. In a responsive style reading, members of the Frederic church rededicated themselves and their church facility to, “worship, prayer and Bible study, selfless service, seeking and saving the lost, building strong families, and being faithful to the mission and teachings of the Seventh-day Adventist Church.”

The weekend also concluded a special 10-days of prayer, in which the church facility had been open to the public for prayer and Bible study 24 hours a day.

FINANCIAL UPDATE

In this special year of evangelism well over 100 meetings or outreach activities have taken place with many more planned before year end. We have appropriated over \$170,000 to the churches in support of these efforts as of August and will most likely top \$200,000 in appropriations by year end. It is exciting to hear the stories and see how God is working all over this Conference. Many seeds are being planted. I would like to thank you for your faithful giving to Wisconsin Budget as well as the tithe that helps make these special opportunities available.

The Wisconsin Academy wastewater project is near completion. Two of the three systems are now in place, and the system should be fully functional by year end. We are also working with the DNR on the closure of the old system. It looks like we are going to come in on budget with this project at around \$350,000 for all costs, including studies and architectural expenditures. While this is a substantial amount of money, it is far less that the almost \$2,000,000 projected at one time. God has certainly blessed us in this process. The benefits of this system to WA will be a huge reduction in maintenance, operating, and labor costs.

The major payment for this new system will be paid by the end of October. We have needed to borrow approximately one half of the cost of the system (\$150,000) with the balance borrowed internally. We have received offerings toward the project through September of \$32,276.90. The mind of man is brought into communion with the mind of God, the finite with the Infinite. The effect of such communion on body and mind and soul is beyond estimate."
