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How MUCH does it cost?

You have probably asked this very question many times in your life. Sometimes the answer can be quick and straight forward. Sometimes the answer can be elusive or hard to discern. And sometimes, we may never know what the cost will be, or has been in the past.

Let's take a specific question and answer it as simply as possible. I suspect this question is one that many have contemplated, yet are uncertain of the answer.

Okay, Okay, you are saying! What is the question?

The question is this. How much does it cost to educate a student at Wisconsin Academy (WA) for a year?

The quick answer is \$??,???.00 for the 2008-2009 school year. The hard to discern answer is a little more involved. But, I will do my best to satisfy your curiosity.

The Wisconsin Conference, led by many of your forefathers,

decided that the cost of Christian education was a sacrifice they were willing to make to ensure their children received the best education possible. Through planning and a lot of prayer, Wisconsin

Academy opened its doors in the year 1947. Many changes have taken place over the years at Wisconsin Academy. Faculty have come and gone. The work experience has definitely changed. And more classes are being required (and perhaps less work <u>allowed</u>) due to state policy changes and/or governmental influence.

However, the educational experience offered is very similar to what it was decades ago. An experience that offers a student the chance to mingle with their peers buoyed up in an atmosphere filled with Christian teachers and fellow Christian students. An experience that allows them to be... teenagers!

Currently, we have 89 students (See Sidebar) attending Wisconsin Academy. Each student comes from a different background, with different upbringing, with different skill levels, and a different expectation as to what life is all about. The academy staff tries their best to meld all of that with the academic offerings into an educational program that meets the needs of as many of our students as possible.

The present operating expense for Wisconsin Academy

is \$2,206,000 annually. I can see many of you have gotten your calculators out of the drawer, (blown off the dust), and are dividing \$2,206,000 by 89 students. The average is \$24,786.52 per year. That's what it costs to educate my student for a year at Wisconsin Academy,

you ask? Yes and No. Yes, that is the average. No, there is more to the story.

The Wisconsin Conference strongly believes in Christian education, so strongly in fact that an annual subsidy to Wisconsin Academy is provided in a couple of different ways. First, a direct subsidy is provided to WA in the amount of \$453,600.00 annually. Some years it is more.

Second, the Wisconsin Conference provides an additional subsidy to Wisconsin Academy in the amount of \$50,000.00. This subsidy is given in the form of Worthy Student funding and is distributed based on an individual family's need.

Many of you may be asking, "What does that do to the price of an educational experience for my student at

May the Lord help us to have the eyes of Christ as we seek to reach out for Him always—especially as we focus on the year of evangelism 2009.

A Few Words from the Secretary -- Treasurer

Challenges, What Challenges?

I don't have to tell you that our world is experiencing more than its usual share of challenges. You can see it all around us. In the midst of all this, God still wants us to remember that He is in control. Even though the United States just elected a new President, God is still sitting on His throne overseeing the inner-workings of this entire world.

Recent developments in the financial sector have given each of us a chance to reflect on God's challenge in Matthew 6:20 where He says "But lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust doth corrupt, and where thieves do not break through nor steal". Notice the little word "nor". It is bad enough if the thieves break through. It is something entirely different if they are able to "steal"! Don't permit the <u>thief</u> to steal from you!

The financial situation we find our country in has also affected our churches and the conference operation as well. Total conference tithe is currently showing a decrease of 1.48% compared to last year at the end of September. That decrease is causing some challenges for the conference operations as well. Currently the conference is experiencing a decrease to our operating net assets of \$245,110 through the end of September. By the time you read this, we will have completed the October church remittance process. We hope the percentage will swing the other way as a result of each of the churches sending in their remittances, especially those that have late remittances to submit. A substantial tithe influx for December would have a great impact on our operating results for 2008 and on our budget for 2009. Times are tough!

Historically, for the past 12 years, the growth rate for local church ministry funds has mirrored the rate of tithe growth. If the percentage of tithe decrease holds true for offerings kept at the local church level, then several of our churches are probably challenged also, especially those churches supporting an elementary school. Times are tough!

The conference is currently going through the process of building its budget for 2009. The current budget printout for 2009 indicates we would be out of balance by \$595,963.00. The budget is structured anticipating NO cost of living increase for the employees. Yet costs continue to rise. Times are tough!

Because of conference operating structure, many expenses (liability and property insurance, etc) are paid for by the conference and then billed out to churches or schools on a prorated basis. The current global financial situation has placed some entities behind in their reimbursement to the conference for these expenses. This has caused a cash shortage for the conference Operating Fund. Luckily, we have been able to borrow internally from our Plant Fund. However, with the turn in the economy, we are unable (at this time) to repay those funds back to the Plant Fund that were borrowed. This could put us in a challenging position once we get closer to starting the Girl's Dormitory. Why you ask? Because, the money we have borrowed represents a majority of the funds anticipated to be left over after the Boy's dormitory is completed and was earmarked for assistance with the Girl's Dormitory project. Times are tough!

Progress on the new Boy's dormitory at Wisconsin Academy is continuing daily. All of our sub-trade contractors are doing their best to complete the project by the first of the year. Recently, there have been employees from six of the rough-in sub-trades all working on the project at the same time, on the same day. It is a real beehive of activity. Please visit www.wisacad.org for pictures taken throughout the construction process. The pictures were last updated on November 3. By the time you read this, there will probably be more up-to-date pictures posted. We do have the structure completely roofed at this time. Weather delays could set us back a few days on outside work. But inside work continues to progress nicely. Pray for good weather!

In spite of all our challenges and tough times, God still hovers over each one of us. He sees each of our individual challenges and our corporate needs. He desperately wishes we would turn these challenges over to Him and allow Him to create opportunities. Golden opportunities that show God has a special answer for each of our challenges.

Have you let Him solve your greatest challenge - yet? Let Him do it – TODAY! Tough times are coming to an end! HE'S PROMISED!

Doing Church Well in a "Bad" Economy

Since August, the airwaves have been dominated by "bad" economic news. Whether we talk about Wall Street or Main Street, jobs are being lost and retirements are being jeopardized. People are hurting!

This usually implies that the Church will soon be hurting, too. Thank you, dear reader, for your faithfulness during

trying economic times! But when your income goes down, so does the tithe and offering you return from that income go down.

You might imagine that this is a gloomy article filled with dire warnings for the next fiscal year – far from it! God is still in charge and he has given us hope during these trying times. What is the basis of our hope?

1. People are more open to the Advent

Message during times of trouble – Laodiceans (Revelation 3:14-20) tend to be rich, increased in goods, and very complacent because of their prosperity. The Holy Spirit is touching people right now with their deep need for Jesus.

2. God has promised to *bless His people with material prosperity* when they are faithful! (Mal. 3:10 NIV) "Bring the whole tithe into the storehouse, that there may be food in my house. Test me in this," says the LORD Almighty, " and see if I will not throw open the floodgates of heaven and pour out so much blessing that you will not have room enough for it." Can we really afford not to be faithful in tithe in times like these?

3. We are preparing a great number of harvesters! In 2009, every district in the state is planning public evangelistic meetings. We have pastors, lay pastors, ShareHim boot camp graduates, Conference office workers, and professional evangelists all doing meetings in 2009. Jesus said we should pray for courage for the harvesters and more of them. (Luke 10:2 NCV) "There are a great many people to harvest, but there are only a few workers. So pray to God, who owns the harvest, that he will send more workers to help gather his harvest."

4. 2009 is just like 33 AD! The parallels are striking:

- a. The disciples of Jesus were fearful and timid.
- **b.** There was jealousy among the disciples as they jockeyed for position and influence.
- c. The common people felt a deep need for Christ and His blessing in their lives. It was the fullness of time (Gal. 4:4 KJV) "But when the fullness of the time was come, God sent forth his Son, made of a woman, made under the law," with God preparing the way for the first Coming of Jesus. He is now preparing the way for the second Coming of His Son.
- d. The disciples had no big donors -they could not afford mass media communications, employing Bible workers and assistants, or using multi-media technology. They felt inadequate to seize the opportunity that God had arranged for them.
- e. The Holy Spirit came upon the disciples in 33 AD as they tarried in Jerusalem in prayer and fellowship and everything changed. The Holy Spirit is ready to come upon His people today as we pray and humbly ask to be used of Him.

In the light of trouble in the economy, how do you see the Church in 2009? Is the *glass half empty* and draining fast or *half full* and gaining every day? Let's unite with Jesus and one another in making 2009 the greatest year for Christ and His Church.

Summer Camp 2008

A tired camp counselor sits around the room at staff worship. When it came time for prayer requests she requested that we pray for a certain girl in her unit whose parents are getting divorced. Another counselor shares that for the first time she was able lead a timid camper to pray out loud in the unit prayer. A

boy's counselor asks that we pray for God to give him patience with a certain camper who shows no interest in working together with others in his unit.

Every morning this summer, all the staff gathered at the beginning of the day to pray for one another and to re-commit themselves to leading each camper to Jesus.

Does it pay off? A resounding yes! Of the

335 campers who attended this summer, 133 made a commitment to love and serve Jesus. Ninety-three made a re-commitment, and 48 requested Bible studies to prepare for baptism.

Many of our campers come from SDA or other Christian homes. Some come with little background in Christianity, coming from Muslim, Animist, or nonreligious homes.

This year, because of the popularity of Family Camp, we added a second week, and it too filled up. "I am a different person" a family camper exclaimed to a relative,





after his week at Family Camp this summer. This summer our theme

was "Run the Race" based on the Bible passage in Hebrews 12:1, 2. In addition to all our regular activities we featured the Olympic look, and highlighted "Heroes of Faith" who throughout history have shown faithfulness in sometimes very trying conditions. Please

pray that God will guide each camper to be faithful to Jesus who has called us to "run with patience the race set before us looking unto Jesus the author and finisher of our faith."

Historical figures at Wisconsin Academy indicate a flat or downward enrollment slope over the years. Now, I will admit families are having fewer children than before. But how do you account for the fact that there are scores of academy-age students not attending Wisconsin Academy at the present time. Many fear that academy is not affordable. I would like to suggest that if more parents sent their students to Wisconsin Academy, the operating costs could be spread over a larger enrollment thereby reducing costs to the point where Christian Education would be affordable for every student.

Many constituents around the conference still believe that Christian education is vital to the development of a child. As you consider what you have just read, please remember one thing.

> "Christian Education is not expensive, IT IS... PRICELESS"!
