Hope For Wisconsin Reports

Hope for Wisconsin was the official name for the largest evangelistic outreach in recent memory by the Adventist Church in Wisconsin. Internally, the meetings were known as "Operation Noah" or "Milwaukee Storm". What we now know is that over 50 meetings. some by professional evangelists, some by pastors and lay leaders, were conducted in Southeast Wisconsin in the late summer and early autumn of 2009. And the results are fantastic! We will publish approximate totals in the 1st issue of 2010 as the reports are turned in.

Initial Reports:

Waukesha and Watertown: Evangelists Patti Cohen and Richard Habenicht: Pastor John Glass reports"We have 13 committed to be baptized at Waukesha; the spirit in the church is very good. We have 1 so far in Watertown; she isn't sure whether by *profession of faith* or *baptism* yet. In Watertown tonight, there were 20 with 5 guests that are attending as well. The church is also experiencing a renewal."

Spanish Campaigns: Evangelist Evelio Miranda reports, "Last Sabbath, October 17, I finished my third Evangelistic Campaign, Green Bay Spanish, Milwaukee Central and Sheboygan Spanish Church, Praise be the Lord! In Green Bay, 8 new members were baptized and 5 more are getting ready to do so.

Milwaukee Central Hispanic already had 28 baptisms in the Hope for Wisconsin Evangelistic campaign - new visitors came and enjoyed the meetings and many of them are now in a process of getting Bible studies. After the end of the meetings, two more were baptized.

In Sheboygan Spanish we had an average of 16 visitors and up to 26 and 33 some nights. At the end of the meetings, 8 were baptized and 7 more are in preparation.

Maranatha Spanish in Greenfield: Evangelist Armando Camacho reports: "The "Hope for Wisconsin" crusade at the Maranatha Spanish Church in Greenfield is now officially completed. Today was a high Sabbath as we witnessed 7 individuals baptized!

Fort Atkinson/Oakland: Evangelist Bill Ochs had 35 in attendance with 10 non-SDA's. He reports: "We're having good meetings in Oakland. We have 8 good interests coming - The members are supporting. They're great folks. I have had 5, (7 if you count the young people coming) consistent interests since night number 3. Three individuals have indicated they want to be baptized. I am claiming our Heavenly Father's promise that He will do exceedingly abundantly above all we could ever ask or imagine. We finish this weekend and I'm planning a baptism November 7."

Milwaukee NW: Evangelist Dennis Ross Jr.:Pastor Adam Case reports, "We baptized 21 people today, or will have by the time the day is over. We had 17 first time baptisms, 3 rebaptisms, and then tonight we will be baptizing one more first timer. So 21 in all for today. . . . We closed out last night in Milwaukee and had a great day. All told we baptized 30 people during the series. Four of those were rebaptisms. We had a growth

President's Message

The reports at the recent North American Division made me proud to be a Seventh-day Adventist. Here are some of the reasons why:

- The Hope Channel is now on the Direct TV satellite network increasing their viewership three fold.
- The Women's Ministries of the North American Division is leading out in an initiative called, "End it Now" seeking one million signatures throughout the world to present to the United Nation calling for an end to violence against women.
- 2009 has a greater baptismal growth rate than any year since 1915—about 15%. Wisconsin is a part of this evangelistic initiative in seeing over 300 baptisms to date!

A strong initiative called Mission Lifegard calls on churches throughout the Division to

help save youth and young adults from drowning in the secular culture that they live in each day. In their rescue of youth, churches need to involve them in mission and service so they find purpose in the churches where they are members.

- A new film is being released to the public early in 2010 called, "The Adventists" by Martin Doblmeier. It will make you proud to view Adventists through the eyes of this movie producer. Featuring largely the Adventist contributions in health, Mr Doblmeier displays Adventists with respect and esteem.
- The Adventist church is concerned about its children. The new emphasis "Kids in Discipleship" helps both parents and their children to be discipled in a Christ centered, service orientated life.
- New churches are being planted in various cultures and people groups. One emphasis is called "Simple Church" which is a house church movement. In cities, many young adults don't like the formalities of a regular church but enjoy the intimacy of a home. Thus house churches are starting to flourish.
- Wisconsin has established about 20 new church groups in the past seven years. Studies are taking
 place to enhance this emphasis to fulfill the commission of Christ to take the gospel to everyone everywhere (Matt 28: 19-20 and Acts 1:8). Ellen White also advocates that Adventists should have a presence in every community (6T 24). God would be honored if an Adventist presence was established in
 every community and people group in Wisconsin. This may be through new church plants, small
 groups or Adventist families moving to a new area!

World events indicate that we live amid end-time events. It also is evident the Holy Spirit is doing a special work among Adventists—His people chosen to give an end-time message to the world.

It is truly a great time to be an Adventist Christian.

Hope for Wisconsin has been the theme of this year's evangelistic outreach in our state. Over one hundred evangelistic outreaches have been planned and many of these have now taken place.

The greatest concentration of evangelism has been during the month of October in the Milwaukee area where over 20 evangelistic meetings took place. Final results are not yet recorded but it appears that over 100 baptisms have already taken place as a result of these meetings with as many as one hundred more in preparation for baptism.

How thrilling it was to visit various evangelistic sites and witness people learning about Jesus and His message for this hour. For many it was their first opportunity to hear the message and others have come previously but God spoke to them anew. Throughout North America this has been the best year in evangelism in over 150 years as far as the percentage of growth over the previous year—15%. We praise God not so much for the statistic as for the people it represents. These new people are now a part of God's family to engage in ministry to save people for eternity. This is the most important work on the planet!

We have the privilege of engaging in evangelism every day. We don't need to wait for an evangelistic meeting. It may be sharing a tract, giving a testimony, presenting a Bible Study, or leading a small group. All of this is outreach for God's Kingdom. Some call it "evangeliving". Let's continue the evangelistic thrust of this year into 2010 and make God proud of his people in Wisconsin!

Elder and Mrs. Corkum have chosen to retire. Elder Corkum dropped some hints last year at Camp Meeting. It is now official. The retirement paperwork has been submitted for review with the North American Division. Don't think for a minute that the Corkum's will be withdrawing from ministry. They will just be doing ministry somewhere else and for someone else, most likely as volunteers in the Lord's army. Many of us will be sad to see them step aside, yet the work will go forward under new leadership.

While we hate to see the Corkums leave the Wisconsin Conference, plans must be set into motion that will allow for a smooth transition for the office of President once their retirement dates arrive. The Conference Executive Committee has been made aware of the transition process. In the next few paragraphs, I will outline that process for you as constituents of this great conference.

Just like the North American Division, we will be following the steps outlined in our own Wisconsin Conference Constitution as far as the process is concerned for a "Presidential" replacement. Because of the timing of the Corkum's retirement, the constitution dictates that a new President be located and hired prior to the upcoming constituency session. The new President will be "located" according to a specific process outlined in the constitution as well. Prior to the last constituency session, each church submitted names of individuals who would be willing to serve on the Standing Nominating Committee. Those names were placed onto ballots, and those individuals who were elected to serve this guadrennium will be the ones asked to meet with the Conference Executive Committee to begin the search process for our next Conference President. Those meetings will take place on the dates outlined below. Reminder letters have already been sent to the individuals voted in at the last session. If any of those elected persons have moved away, the Executive Committee has the authority to fill those vacancies with unelected names from the prior session that were submitted for the same region of the conference.

On Wednesday, January 6, 2010, the President of the Lake Union Conference, Elder Don Livesay, will be calling together the members of the Conference Executive Committee as well as the members of the Conference Standing Nominating Committee for the express purpose of beginning the search process. Elder Livesay will be the Chairperson for each of the meetings held by this search group. Two meetings have already been scheduled by Elder Livesay, with a third meeting placed on the calendar just in case it is needed. The second meeting will be held on January 24, 2010 while the third is scheduled to be held February 17, 2010.

Elder Livesay views this search process as a very, very serious one. He will be leading the search group through a couple of hours of Bible Study, in order to get the group in tune with the Holy Spirit's leading. The group will then transition into a segment where Elder Livesay will lead in a discussion of what a leader ought to be, and what qualities a good leader will possess.

The group will then consider the qualities they would like their new Conference President to possess. Elder Livesay will assist the group as they discuss each name that has been submitted and measure them against the criteria that will have been formulated through the group's discussion. With lots of prayerful thought, ballots will be cast and three or four names will rise to the top of the list.

The individuals whose names appear on the short list will then go through a process of reference checking. The Lake Union Conference Officers' will certainly lead out in this portion of the process. However, they will welcome assistance from members of either of the search group committees.

By the time the search group meets for the second time, the Holy Spirit will have led them to their final choice for president. Once that choice has been voted by the search group, that individual will be contacted and asked to consider a call to the Wisconsin Conference of Seventh-day Adventists.

If the first person contacted declines the call, the search group will move to other names on the short list. The second individual will be contacted, etc... and the process will be repeated. We solicit your prayers now and throughout this search process.

When the search process has been completed, and a new president has accepted our call, you can be assured that the Holy Spirit will have led every step of the way and the Lord will have provided the best person possible to guide the conference in the future. A future that is bright and filled with promise and hope! A future that Heaven will bless!

God of the Impossible - Hope for Wisconsin

We serve a God of the Impossible **and** the unusual.

The church in North America is growing at a rate of 2% - it would be easy to suggest that a growth rate of 10% or more was not possible. When the churches in my district took on the challenge of growing, I was excited and a little apprehensive. My prayers were something like this, "Dear God, I know there is likely nothing I can do to make these churches grow, and I don't know how you are going to make them grow, but please use us to reach your community, your people, your children."

We were praying to see our churches grow and by 10% or more. We wanted to see our sanctuaries bulging with new friends and family members.

We began preparing for Hope For Wisconsin. We did our best to get ready for what God was going to do. Our major emphasis was the city-wide meetings that took place during the month of October. Evangelists and bible workers came in from across the country. Advertising like South Eastern Wisconsin has never seen before blanketed the city. We were prepared for "standing room only" at our meetings.

Opening night arrived. The evangelist was dressed and ready, the registration table was nicely decorated. The projector was shining our logo on the screen. It was time for Hope For Wisconsin to begin.

After our prayers for a large harvest, thousands of dollars of advertising, and big plans, something disappointing happened instead of standing room only, the sanctuaries were less than half full, maybe even only a quarter full.

At the end of the first week, attendance remained steady but low. I remember praying to God, "Lord we've done everything we can, and yet the numbers aren't here. Our friends, family, and neighbors just didn't come." I didn't know if we were going to reach our growth goal for the year, but I knew at this point that if we did, it really was going to be a miracle.

- From our advertising, we were expecting a minimum of 120 visitors (closer to 300) on opening night
- On opening night we had about 55 visitors in my district

Evangelists will tell you that it is

reasonable to baptize approximately 10% of those attending on opening night. For my district that would be about 5.5 people who we should expect to baptize. That is far short of the 32 that my district has as their growth goal. Many hearts were heavy.

I can't explain what happened next. Sermons were preached, people were loved, and most of all the Holy Spirit was working. As of the writing of this article, we have had 35 baptisms as a result of Hope For Wisconsin. There are more who have decided for baptism this coming Sabbath. Baptism totals for the year in my district are currently at 41 and look like they will be over 45 for the year. I am astounded at what God has done. We prayed for an impossible goal.

If you would have asked me three or four weeks ago if it was achievable I would have told you, that I couldn't see a way that it could be fulfilled. I am so amazed at what God has done. Not only did God *use* us to **reach** our goal, but He **surpassed** it. Our district needed 32 baptisms to see 10% growth, instead we are going to have about 45 new members which will be over 12% growth.

I am thankful for the work of my church leaders. I appreciate the help and support of the congregations. My wife will attest to the fact that I also put in some long hours. But this was made possible by God's blessing. I couldn't have done this, we couldn't have accomplished this, only to God be the glory. I praise God.

My New Beginning- near blindness lead to perfect sight

I had many injuries while growing up but I was devastated when I burned my eyes. My work involved a new technology using intense ultra violet rays. Though I wore safety glasses, my eyes were burned, literally peeling and shedding layers while trying to heal. I didn't know for some time whether this damage would be permanent.

Prior to burning my eyes, I was on a journey getting to know Jesus by reading the Bible and praying. Once I burned my eyes, I was no longer able to read the Bible. During my recovery, I suffered from intense sensitivity to light, which forced me to rest in a dark, cave-like environment. I was limited to listening to Christian programs and praying to become closer to God. Although I had praved before. I had never praved like this, with my whole body, soul, and spirit. I became so close to Jesus that it seemed we were one. and then little by little I received my evesight back. I was then blessed with seeing things much closer visually and spiritually than before. I knew I wanted to go deeper into God's work for Him.

Constituency Session Countdown

In the next few weeks, a familiar process will begin again within the Wisconsin Conference of Seventhday Adventists, a process that has taken place thirty-three times before. Have you figured out what the process is? Yes, you are correct!

On October 3, 2010, the Wisconsin Conference of Seventh-day Adventists will be conducting their 34th Constituency Session. The session will be held at the Wisconsin Academy chapel in Columbus. We will begin at 9:30 AM with a devotional and prayer.

The process (a lengthy one) leading up to the session will take place much as before with a slight twist. The twist comes from the

fact that we will actually have two processes running simultaneously. The first process will be the normal selection routine for committee candidates who will be elected at the session in October of 2010 to serve for the next quadrennium.

At the same time a second process will be taking place also. We will be meeting with the Standing Nominating and Executive Committee members elected during the last session in 2006 as we begin the process for selecting a new Conference President. (See article on page three regarding the search process.) With the Lord's blessing, this second process should be concluded by March or April of 2010.

Let's talk about the first process a little more in detail. By the end of December 2009, letters will have been sent out to the churches outlining their responsibilities in selecting members who are willing to serve not only as delegates to the session but also who are willing to serve on the various committees that function as part of the conference governance between sessions. The selections from each local church will then be returned to the conference office from which a delegate list will be compiled.

Around the 29th of March, the conference will begin a series of town-hall meetings in various locations throughout the conference. Please watch future issues of the Lamp Letter to find out the time and location of the meeting nearest to you. All church members are welcome to attend. However, the meetings are usually geared towards informing the *delegates* of the items they will be asked to vote on during the October session. Bulletin announcements will be prepared and distrib-

uted in plenty of time to announce these town-hall style meetings also.

Standing Nominating Committee members elected in 2006 will be receiving a letter around the end of June 2010 announcing the August 15, 2010 meeting of that Committee. When they meet on August 15 with Elder Don Livesay, President of the Lake Union Conference and Chairperson for that meeting, the group will gather together for the express purpose of nominating Conference Officers and Directors who will serve for the next guadrennium. The conference office will be sending out a reminder letter to each Standing Nominating Committee member who was voted to serve back in 2006.

Delegates to the session, elected by their respective local church, will be sent packets of information on or before August 30, 2010. The packet will contain seven or eight important documents. These documents will need to be reviewed by each delegate prior to attending the Constituency Session on October 3, 2010. Those documents might include:

- A copy of the minutes from the last meeting held in 2006
- B) A copy of the most recent Financial Statement for the Conference
- C) A copy of the current Conference and Corporation Bylaws (we are not anticipating any changes to them)
- D) The Session agenda
- E) A delegate registration form

While this list is not exhaustive, it

gives you an idea of what you could expect to receive if you where chosen as a delegate from your church.

The goal of each of us at the conference office is to make sure each constituent and.

more importantly, each delegate is informed about the decisions we will be asking the delegates to make. You can't vote intelligently if you do not know what the issues are! The town-hall meetings will be the forum where that vital information will be shared.

Yes, the October Constituency Session will be a time when the church conducts its business. But, we will also be celebrating what God has done for us and through us during this last quadrennium and outlining plans for the next one, plans that will drive us to our knees - plans that will involve each one of us reaching out to our neighbors across the street and to our friends around the world.
