Friends You Can Count On



Some customers at the Circle of Friends Mission Thrift Shop in downtown Elkhorn have found bargains. Others have discovered something priceless.

Six years ago, Florence Schacht of Delavan SDA Church was browsing at a St. Vincent de Paul thrift store. As she visited with the ladies who staffed the store, she listened with interest as they described how their store raised money to support their local Catholic church school. “Why can’t we Adventists do this?” Florence asked herself, and heard God telling her, “Do it!”

First, Florence found a church friend, Shirley Mason, to share her dream. They found a 900-square-foot store front for rent. But how was she to get the money? Florence describes what happened: “My husband and I decided to sell a piece of land and within two days it sold for \$33,000; 10% above listing price! That gave us the rent money. Then we cleaned out our house of everything we figured we didn’t need and put it in the store for sale. We heard the Delavan K-Mart had closed, and they gave us all the shelves we wanted for free. At church a lady donated a cash register and pricing guns. God just gave us everything we needed to get started!” At 5:00 a.m. each garbage day, Florence could be seen driving up and down the Elkhorn streets scouting for old discarded furniture left at the curb. With some fixing up, chairs, tables, and other furniture were ready for sale at what they decided to call “Circle of Friends Mission Thrift Shop.”

The store opened in November of 2004. Florence remembers her first customer: “This man came in and said he was just released from prison, and had a job interview lined up, but didn’t have dress clothes for the interview. He didn’t have any money. He said he would pay us back when he got a job. I had hoped for a sale, but told him if he found the clothes he needed they were better on his back than on our rack! He left with a shirt. The next time we saw him he was ecstatic! He had gotten the job, and insisted on paying for what we had given him. We refused. He turned out to be a carpenter by trade, and has come back many times through the years to help us when we needed some work done. He’s paid us many times over for that 50 cent shirt we gave him!”

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The Suitcase

Several years ago our son, Greg, went as a student missionary to the remote village of Paruima in Guyana, South America. He spent his last few days in the United States planning for his departure. I remember him laying things out on the floor that he felt were essential to take. It would be a two-hour plane flight (or four-month hike) from the nearest road or store, with no second chance to get needed items. For several days the collection of carefully arranged items changed as he added and removed things trying to guess his every need for the entire year. Then the day came. He packed the items into the suitcase and headed out. Whatever was in the suitcase would provide for his needs; whatever was left behind could not be later retrieved.

As we cross the threshold of the new year, we have an opportunity to evaluate ourselves. What are we packing into our lives? What are we leaving behind? If you were a suitcase, what would the contents in your life reveal about your priorities? Here are some essentials I'm making sure get packed into my life:

1. Connection with Jesus. I have found that daily connecting with Jesus through reading and prayer is vital. This year I am committing to reading through my Bible again and I invite you to join me. Many Bible reading plans are available. Other excellent devotional books include *The Desire of Ages* and *The Great Controversy*. A smaller, but also inspiring book is *40 Days: Prayers and Devotions to Prepare for the Second Coming* by Dennis Smith.

2. Generosity. God shows his love by giving. In my desire to imitate Him, He gives me opportunities to give as He does. This year, in addition to returning 10% of our income as tithe, Juanita and I have decided to increase our commitment, giving more than last year to the Wisconsin Budget. We're also continuing to give to local church offerings and other needs as opportunities arise.

3. Service. This year Juanita and I are looking for more tangible ways to serve, not only on the job, but at home, in our neighborhood and among friends. For Jesus, service was more than words, it was His way of life, touching others in a meaningful way.

These are a few of my priorities. What are yours? Like a suitcase, only so much can be packed into a life before something falls out. I encourage you to spend a few quiet moments here at the beginning of the year to think about your priorities. Maybe you'd like to write them out and post them on your refrigerator as a reminder. Maybe you'd like to develop priorities together as a family. *"Let us examine our ways and test them, and let us return to the Lord" Lam. 3:40.* What's in your suitcase?

"Every day you should learn something new from the Scriptures. Search them as for hid treasures, for they contain the words of eternal life. Pray for wisdom and understanding to comprehend these holy writings. If you would do this, you would find new glories in the Word of God; you would feel that you had received new and precious light on subjects connected with the truth, and the Scriptures would be constantly receiving a new value in your estimation."

As more customers came, things started to sell. When the store got enough money, we bought a phone. When we had a little more, we put up some signs." Soon it became clear that God was abundantly blessing the efforts of Florence and Shirley. Within six months, the tiny storefront became so crowded with merchandise and enthusiastic customers that a larger facility was needed. Florence found another location four times as large and, soon, it too was bustling with blessings.



The shop always earns enough to pay expenses, tithe store profits, send money to the local Adventist school, Wisconsin Academy, several local Christian schools, and Hope Inc., a non-profit organization that assists low-income families. What remains is given to assist a variety of community and church programs.

People in need are regularly sent to Florence from Social Services, local churches, schools, and even medical clinics. "We require a letter of recommendation on letterhead from the sending organization," says Flo, "and then we give them what they need for free. The community loves this. Most months the value of what we give away is more than the value of what we sell!" When supplies were needed for Katrina, Flo sent them everything in the store, then prayed for God to fill it again. Within a week the store was filled with all new stuff from a single donation. This happened three times in a matter of months! "If we know of a need, we do not withhold." stated Flo, "The more we give away, the more God gives!"

The mission of Circle of Friends was formed to meet the basic physical, spiritual and social needs of the people, using the ministry of Jesus Christ as its model: "The Saviour mingled with men as one who desired their good. He showed His sympathy for them, ministered to their needs, and won their confidence. Then He bade them 'Follow Me.'" MH 143


As the enterprise expanded, Florence began praying for help. She wanted to work with a staff of Adventist volunteers but, despite earnest prayers, none came; it seemed God had another answer. A network of business and community friends developed, and soon volunteers from all over the county began streaming in -- community leaders, unemployed, senior citizens, folks from the Christian League for the Handicapped, and even people on prison release or assigned community service.

Today, one to four people a day are assigned by the county judge to do community service at Circle of Friends. Ironically, the county judge, Judge Kennedy, is a loyal fan and volunteer at the resale shop. Often he finds himself sorting clothes right beside a guy he sentenced to do community service there. Flo has heard guys say, "Hey, judge, why did you give me so much time?" Kennedy will respond, "Well, I pray before I give

a sentence, I look at all the facts, and do what I feel is best for you and best for society." The relationship dynamics are incredible.

A few months ago, Claude Neault, a long-time member of the Delavan SDA Church, decided to become involved at Circle of Friends. Almost overnight, Claude became known as "Pastor Claude." Now, almost daily, Claude meanders around the store, making conversation and discovering divine appointments. His first day in the shop a lady overheard him comment about us living near the end of time and said, "Claude, tell me more about this. Help me!" Claude said, "I'd never held a Bible study with someone in my life, but I opened my Bible and read through texts I had highlighted." They studied together many times. Often other people noticed and asked to join them. "God's Spirit is in this store," says Claude. "It's not just a place to buy things, it's a place to come for help! I tell people, 'You're not here by accident. The Holy Spirit directed you here.' This store is set up for one thing, winning souls for the kingdom."

The ministry of Circle of Friends doesn't just extend to its patrons, but to its volunteers as well. Many have come back to volunteer after doing community service time, or being on parole, and have attended church with Claude and Flo. On Thursday evenings after the store closes, Flo has a prayer meeting in the store for anyone interested; usually 10-12 people come. They read the Bible, share prayer requests and pray for requests customers place in a can by the register throughout the week. "We become their family," says Flo, "and their church family if they don't have one."



God is still opening doors of opportunity for the Circle of Friends. Recently a local pastor friend donated an empty house on 6 acres to Circle of Friends. "I would love to see it developed into a house for men released from prison who need to be retrained and acclimated back into society." Flo said. Then, just this fall, the Federal Bureau of Indian Affairs asked if Circle of Friends would be a regular supplier to its clearinghouse. She sent them 900 boxes of toys, shoes, clothes and bedding, and is praying God will lead in this new contact.

What began as a dream planted in Florence Schacht's heart has grown into a dynamic, thriving ministry. After six years, Circle of Friends continues to be a lighthouse of hope, bringing the presence of Jesus into ordinary lives through loving service.

Frequently Asked Questions About Conference Finances

Why is the church always asking for money?

When the Seventh-day Adventist church calls its members to return a faithful tithe and give offerings it is echoing the call of God found throughout the Bible. God, the owner of all, and the giver of all good gifts, knows that giving brings joy, not just to the recipient, but also to the giver. The greatest happiness we can experience is in the act of giving. God wants to share His joy with us. God calls his people to return ten percent of their increase to Him in recognition of His ownership of all. This is the tithe. He also provides us opportunities to exercise generosity by giving offerings to support His work locally and around the world. God does not need our money; we need His special blessings when we give. The Seventh-day Adventist Church continues to remind its members of God's call to be faithful to Him.

Where do tithes and offerings go?

The following charts offer an overview of the ways in which your tithes and offerings are put to use by the institutions of the Seventh-day Adventist Church. Chart A shows the proportional distribution of your tithe dollar to conference, union, and world ministries. Chart B shows how the tithe returned to Wisconsin Conference is allocated. Chart C shows how the offerings given to Wisconsin Budget are allocated.

- General Conference




Chart B - Wisconsin Conference Tithe Allocation

- Miscellaneous





Chart C - Wisconsin Budget Allocation

Where do we stand?

The ministry of the Seventh-day Adventist church in Wisconsin is being limited by several factors, including the following:

1. Tithe this year is 2.92% less than last year. (\$154,225.27)
2. Members are giving less to Wisconsin Budget.
3. Fewer members are sending their children to Adventist schools, including Wisconsin Academy.

As enrollment at Wisconsin Academy decreases, it relies increasingly on support from Wisconsin Budget to remain in operation. You may notice in Chart C, 75% of Wisconsin Budget is allocated to the academy through subsidy and student financial assistance.

As members give less to Wisconsin Budget, ministries such as evangelism, are increasingly limited in their ability to serve churches and their members.

As tithe decreases, the conference is forced to cut back on programs that benefit the churches. It may be we need to reduce our pastoral team to help our expense be in line with our income.

Although we trust God to supply our needs, we must take seriously the challenges that lie before us. Our commission is to expand the gospel work in Wisconsin, not reduce it. The work of God cannot continue at the level it has in the past if this situation is not remedied.

How can I help?

There are several ways you can help. A few are listed here:

1. Pray that God will guide our leaders as they seek ways to glorify Him in these challenging times.
2. Review your giving plan. Review the promises of Malachi 3. Return a faithful tithe and designate at least 2% of your income as offerings for Wisconsin Budget.
3. Encourage students in your church to attend Adventist schools, including Wisconsin Academy. God has given us an excellent school system. The Education Office would be happy to share ways you can support Adventist Education in your local church.

Greg Taylor - New Youth Director

Greg Taylor is the new youth director for the Wisconsin Conference. He comes from Indiana where he has been youth pastor for the Glendale SDA church in Indianapolis. Prior to that he served as Bible teacher/chaplain at Spencerville Adventist Academy in Maryland, and Grand Rapids Adventist Academy in Michigan for seven years. Greg graduated from Andrews University with degrees in Theology and Secondary Education.

"I have a passion to see youth knowing Jesus as their personal Savior, and to see them involved in the church," says Greg. "We need their influence, their creativity and their enthusiasm to do what we need to be doing in these last days of earth's history. I met Christ my junior year in academy at a prayer conference in England, and the thing that made it stick for me was that I was able to do something about what I believed. People

need to be able to act on what they believe, to know they are needed."

Greg met his wife, Kim, at camp. *"I guess you could say we are an extended camp fling,"* said Greg. *"We were impressed with each other's love for Christ and passion for reaching young people."* Kim, of Berrien


Helping MN Friends

Prayer Makes A Difference



Sheboygan Pathfinders Induct Six New Members



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Moments From the Past Icy Baptisms

In the mid 1800's it was not unusual for evangelists to hold week-long revivals during January and February. Rarely did the rampages of the badger winter affect the numbers of the faithful. Elder Mattson held well attended meetings on Washington Island in January. Elder Sanborn wrote from Mackford of two sisters who walked seven miles to the meeting, while the thermometer stood at 27 degrees below zero!

One of the worst blizzards of the century swept across the state in January, 1873. Some even lost their way between farm buildings and froze to death. Elder Matteson reported the severe weather had not cancelled his plans for a baptism following a series of meetings.

“The Lord favored us with mild weather after a very severe storm. Ten brethren and sisters came across the prairies, eight miles to be baptized. Three friends came afoot 15 miles to attend the meetings. The ice was about three feet thick, but after half a day's work, we obtained a suitable grave for baptism. Some were feeble persons, but all felt well physically as well as spiritually. One brother came 10 miles to be baptized.”

Elder and Mrs. White visited Wisconsin in February, 1862. While passing through Chicago, Elder White had purchased a rubber suit for baptismal purposes, and used it for the first time at Lodi, WI. A hole was chopped through the thick lake ice, and several persons were baptized on Sabbath afternoon.

That night an old-fashioned blizzard drifted them in for the next four days. Families shared their homes. Some people lived up to 60 miles away. The Whites wanted to head home, but after wading through drifts for three miles, they gave up and returned. Elder White reported, *“It is the fifth day since we came. We have been entertained with great kindness and hospitality.”*

At Bethel, some who walked to church in wintertime would carry a rope. If a blinding storm struck, they would tie themselves together for a safe return.

The practice of ice-breaking for winter baptisms prevailed in some areas on into the 20th century. As late as 1924, Poy Sippi members still held winter baptisms in the Pine River.

We are counseled: 'Let every one who is seeking to live a Christian life, remember that the church militant is not the church triumphant.' Fundamentals of Christian Education p. 294 Beloved, this just means we cannot get comfortable and think that as individuals or as a church, we have arrived.

He knows our needs and He promises to see us through. Moreover, He promises His blessing if we go forth with His power!

We must preach the gospel throughout the world independent of our financial challenges. We may be challenged in continuing our present practices. We currently pay the postman to do our witnessing for us and securing an evangelistic audience. The postman is generally faithful in delivering our advertising brochures but the delivery lacks the personal touch. In fact, the postman just delivers the mail and doesn't really care whether people read the advertising never mind come to the evangelistic meeting.

Each of us can do better! With the Holy Spirit guiding us, we can claim Jesus' promise, *"But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me . . . unto the uttermost part of the earth."* (Acts 1:8) This was how the early church grew, with the Holy Spirit burning within each heart. This promise even includes Wisconsin!

We have set up an aggressive series of training events for 2011. From giving Bible Studies to conducting your own evangelism; from small group fellowship to family life seminars, from learning and implementing principles of Natural Church Development to a New Testament Witnessing program. These are all designed to help you become an effective witness for Jesus. As you unite your life in service to Jesus, all power in heaven and earth comes to you to be His witness! You may wish to attend a training event near you.

May God bless you that you will be a witness for Jesus . . . starting today.



Isn't that the way many of us Christians live? We attend church, often wearing a mask to hide our true identity, and no one knows who we really are. And then Hi-ho Silver! Away! and we're gone until next Sabbath.

Church should be more than what happens once a week. At its heart, the church is called to relationships. In fact, our Heavenly Father created us with a relational gene.

That's what small groups in the church are all about. Small groups provide an opportunity to really connect with others in meaningful relationships; where we become more than members of a church - we become part of a family. None of us can do life alone. Without safe, loving relationships to support us when we are hurting we can get discouraged and disappear.
