Thousands of Wisconsin Seventh-day Adventists gather at camp meeting each year for Biblical training, spiritual growth, and fellowship with believers.

I twas around midnight when I was jolted awake by a series of jarring blasts from the camp siren at Camp Wakonda. The walls of my spacious tent had come alive with fast-moving, strobe-like flashes. A sober and serious voice warned that a dangerous thunderstorm, with possible tornadoes, was bearing down upon Wisconsin Camp Meeting, 2010. We were advised to quickly find shelter in the more substantial buildings. Since my vulnerable nylon home sat right next to a tree-tall pole, and since atop that pole was fixed a pointed metal spike (an old-style lightning rod), and since its connecting electrical wire grounded within a few short feet of my sleepy head, I dressed quickly and joined a pajama-clad crowd moving purposefully towards the main pavilion.

In three decades of being an Adventist Christian, this was the first time I had ever fully attended an entire camp meeting with complete freedom to attend any meeting and bask in the blessings offered. And what a rich and rewarding experience! The preaching services and seminars were powerful and nourishing. The excellent music was uplifting and moving. The friendly spiritual fellowship was a positive, blessed encouragement. And the precious new books purchased at the Sunday sale were already being consumed with interest. I determined I would not miss a thing. I even filled a journal with 58 pages of handwritten notes so I would not forget it afterward!

Before it was over I purposed that I would make Wisconsin Camp Meeting an annual pilgrimage. I knew from studying denominational history how crucial these meetings had been for us as a people. Anciently God's people were commanded to attend three camp meetings each year (see Ex 23:14). God still has camp meeting blessings reserved for His people today, and I don't want to miss any of them.

Oh, and about that storm? It providentially headed in another direction, and we all safely returned to our sleeping quarters. There is another storm coming, however, the worst the world will ever experience (see Matt. 24). Camp meeting just might be one of the best places to prepare for it.

Camp Meeting Policies 2011 (abbreviated)

As you prepare for Camp Meeting 2011, you may find this abbreviated list of policies helpful. A complete list of current camp meeting policies is available at <u>wi.adventist.org</u> or in the camp meeting program.

RENTAL POLICIES

1. Please come prepared to present your camper ID card to the attendant at the entrance or to the locating office upon arrival.

2. Accommodations unoccupied Sunday morning will be available for rental to others unless the locating office is notified.

3. Each campsite is designated for one family only.

4. The rental of a cabin or campsite is for the duration of camp meeting only.

5. Our electrical service is limited. Please limit multiple use of electrical devices. Running either A/C or microwave is appropriate. Running both simultaneously is not.

6. Cabins and full service sites can be sublet only twice before they revert back to the conference. All subletting is to be processed through the conference. Remember, private subletting by-passes those on the waiting list, and makes "first renters" liable to forfeit rental privileges.

7. If you reserve a site, then find you cannot attend, your payment may be transferred to the next year. The office will sublet your site for the year you are gone. This allows someone to attend who needs a place to stay.

8. Cabin locks and keys are maintained by the camp. A \$5 key deposit is required. Keys are to be returned at the end of camp meeting. Private locks will be removed.

9. Cabins for 2012 must be paid for in full by Wednesday, June 22, 2011. Failure to do so makes the site available to another on Thursday morning. To hold non-cabin sites, 50% must be paid on June 22, 2011.

10. Any renter shall lose his or her rights to re-rent or remain in any accommodation if it is found to be occupied by minor children or young people without proper chaperonage.

GENERAL POLICIES

1. Golf carts are allowed for the transportation of handicapped people only. Driver must be 18 or older. Permits are issued by security and must be displayed on carts at all times.

2. For the health and safety of all campers, pets of any kind are not to be at camp meeting. See website for listing of area kennels.

3. One vehicle may be parked by your designated campsite, facing out. All other vehicles should be parked in designated parking lots. Vehicles must not be used to sleep in overnight.

THE FOLLOWING ARE PROHIBITED

- 1. Tobacco, alcohol, or illicit drugs
- 2. Fishing
- 3. Using candles or campfires

4. Firearms and fireworks of any kind, including BB guns and slingshots

5. Water guns, squirting toys, and water balloons except as provided by the camp for organized events

6. Bicycles, scooters, or skateboards

7. Unicycles (except in designated area and time)

The Impossible is Possible With God

W hen I look at the children of Israel trapped between the Red Sea and Pharaoh's army, from a human standpoint, they were doomed. There was no way they were prepared to fight Pharaoh's trained soldiers and there was no way they could get across the Red Sea. And even if there was no Red Sea, with all their flocks, their children and their old people they couldn't move fast enough to escape from Pharaoh's army.

But God had an answer. He made a way of escape through the sea for the Israelites and then God used that same way of escape to destroy Pharaoh's army. What a God!

We face a big challenge to fund our local churches, our conference, and our academy in these tough times. We may at times feel like we are between Pharaoh's army and the Red Sea, but we have a big God who wants to grow our faith as we see what He can do through us.
