Who: Professional, pastor and lay evangelists from all over the United States will be leading out in the preaching of God's Word.

Why: God has commissioned us to give His last day invitation to the people of Wisconsin.

The Everlasting Gospel is not "one option for people to consider!" Acts 4:12 states that the name of Jesus is, "the only name given under heaven whereby we must be saved." We must schedule big events from time to time to capture

The Commission and the Commandment – Both need to be Great

The future of the Wisconsin Conference will remain strong if our hearts beat in unison with Christ's heart. Our mission is defined by His mission.

Two central focal points define the mission of Jesus— The Great Commission and the Great Commandment.

A Few Words from the Secretary -- Treasurer

Together We Can

Many of you know that we are in the process of building a second new dormitory on the campus of Wisconsin

Academy. The first was the boys' dorm which has already been completed.

Now we are concluding our capital projects as voted at the last Constituency Session back in 2006 by constructing the new girls' dormitory. At that time, it was explained that the new conference office project and the boys' dorm would be paid for by sale proceeds from the old office property. Both projects have been completed and paid for.

For the girls' dorm, the situation is a little different—it is going to require several different funding sources to be able to completely pay for this project. At the beginning, the Executive Committee hoped that fundraising would accomplish the bulk of the cost of this project. However, who could have predicted the financial mess the country is in now? Due to the financial struggles the country and now many of our constituents are experiencing, the Conference has had to come up with an alternative funding scenario from what was previously planned.

The Together We Can campaign exists to accomplish the fundraising for the dormitory project. In the month of July, we transferred \$325,000 in Together We Can gifts to the Plant Fund (it had been

recorded in the Operating Fund). This transfer has had an effect on the conference financial statement. Any time you reduce your cash balance, your net assets go down. (You have personally experienced this, I'm sure!)

Another piece to the dorm funding puzzle comes in the form of unrestricted, matured trust money - the Conference Executive Committee has opted to dedicate these funds to the completion of the girls' dorm. The Executive Committee hoped to use those funds elsewhere but they felt there were fewer and fewer viable funding options available for finishing the girl's dorm. The movement of these assets to the Plant Fund will further reduce the net assets of the conference to a level lower, much lower than we are accustomed to.

It will be imperative that the pledges for the Together We Can campaign be completed as promised. Even if all the pledges keep coming in as promised, we will most likely reach a point where we will need to borrow money to complete the dorm project as we await the fulfillment of the pledges that have been made.

If you have been faithful in keeping up with your pledge, we THANK YOU! If you have not made a pledge yet, we would invite you to do so as soon as possible. Together We Can has the ability to make this new girls' dormitory a reality—a reality we can all say we played a part in - large or small.

Our Economic Outlook

The national economy is facing some real challenges. Some might argue we are not facing them head-on! We will leave that discussion for another time and place.

The economic times we are living in effect everyone, including the conference. Cash flow is very important in times like these. The Conference is being challenged from many fronts:

Cash Flow:

- One challenge comes in the form of receivables from schools and/or churches. The conference has paid a bill on their behalf and now the conference is waiting to be paid back. The longer the conference has to wait, the tighter our cash flow becomes.
- Another challenge comes in the form of monthly remittances from churches that have been collected and processed at the local level, yet have not been passed on to the conference. If your church is in this category, please do what you can to get your remittances up-to-date as soon as possible. This backlog adversely affects the conference cash flow as well.

Recession:

The recession certainly plays a part in our situation. Many of our investments have gone down in value, some showing an unrealized loss - others have experienced an actual cash loss. Each of our investment's are bought in accordance with denominational policy. Yet we are not totally isolated from market forces that affect their value.

Fox Valley Church Ministers to Mission Aviators

In early August every year, thousands of pilots converge on Oshkosh, Wisconsin, for the EAA Show. The

Experimental Aircraft Association Airventure gathering is a combination of air shows, static displays, family reunion and aviation innovation events that is compelling to thousands of pilots and their families. It is also a gathering point for Christian Mission Aviators of all denominations.

The Fox Valley Seventh-day Adventist Church and MASA, the Missionary Aviation Support Association, has made it their mission to minister to the Missionaries. Carol Buchholz, Fox Valley Church secretary, calls it, "the largest group of missionary pilots congregated in one place at one time ever in the world."

The Fox Valley Church ministered on multiple levels:

- On Sunday morning, July 31, the Church provided breakfast to 225 mission aviators and their families
- Members loaned missionaries their cars for the week of EAA Airventure
- Members opened their homes to provide lodging and food for missionaries

Some statistics from MASA and Fox Valley Church:

- √ 387 missionaries and their families attended (totaling around 420 attendees).
- √ "We" served 7,242 meals (about 345 people per meal).
- √ "We" placed missionaries in 114 homes.
- √ "We" loaned 44 vehicles.
- √ There were 25 on-call drivers available to chauffer missionar-

ies as needed.

- √ "We" placed 85 missionaries in church worship services.
- Missionaries also spoke in 12 small groups as well as civic groups.

What is the *value* of what MASA offers? These are conservative estimates:

- $\sqrt{}$ \$100 per night lodging = \$700
- √ \$5 per meal for 7 days = \$105

 (A frozen lemonade on grounds cost \$4!)
- $\sqrt{}$ Car rental for 7 days = \$200
- √ Total minimal cost for the week
 = \$1,005 per person X 387
 missionaries = \$388,935
- √ Plus those who received free dentistry and salon hair cuts

Praise God for Mission Aviators! Praise God for the Fox Valley Church and those who support mission aviators!

- He blessed us with the sale of the old conference office property at a time in the market cycle where we could receive the most benefit.

Pastors and Teachers for Mission Driven Schools August 9-10, 2009

On Sunday morning August 9, Elder Don Corkum presented our keynote address. His message focused on the fact that our schools are failing to accomplish our mission. Schools need to do more than teach academics and have Bible class, they must be mission driven; they must help the students develop relations with Jesus Christ and teach them the joy that comes from serving others. There must be a revival of our educational mission which is "Developing leaders today who will walk with Jesus into Eternity." The rest of the day was spent in discussion of how teachers and pastors can support each other and work as a team to accomplish this mission.

On Monday morning Elder Corkum presented "The Dream: Each District With a Thriving Church School." He then led the workers in a discussion of setting goals. Ken Kirkham presented the concept of developing Action Plans

that were practical and thorough. For the final 2 ½ hours the workers were broken into four groups of pastors and teachers:

- 1. Established. Well Functioning Schools led by Ken Kirkham
- 2. At Risk Schools led by Elder Corkum
- 3. Districts with No Schools led by Elder Fox
- 4. Wisconsin Academy staff and selected youth pastors

It was wonderful to watch these groups work with excitement and joy as they developed action plans to meet the needs of their particular group. Pastors and teachers with established and solid school programs developed plans to work as a team to improve their school's efforts to become more mission driven. Pastors and teachers in schools which are "at risk" made actions plans to increase enrollments, gain financial stability and become more mission driven. Pastors with no schools in their districts worked to develop action plans to start at least one

school in their district in the next five years. The Wisconsin Academy staff, including Jimmy Carter our new academy chaplain and selected youth oriented pastors developed action plans to provide the students with a more spiritual environment and involve them more in the campus church and the work of evangelism.

The Union has supplied funding so the pastors and teachers can build a working relationship. The teachers and pastors will be reminded regularly to build this working relationship and to carry out their action plans. At the January workers meeting they will be asked to report on progress and the focus will be on allowing the Holy Spirit to work in their lives. It is essential that the team be "Spirit led" as they work to save the souls of our youth and enlist them in the work of serving others and spreading the word that Jesus is coming soon.

It is the end of the first week. There are lots of plans in place for our first weekend together. At our first vespers we attend a prayer walk around the campus. Students and faculty pray for the people, the activities and most importantly for God's Spirit to be here with us as we study, work and worship together this year. We end the evening with cookies and fellowship time in the cafeteria.

Sabbath, August 29

We go to a park just outside Columbus for outdoor church. It is a cool day, but no rain. We spend

Seniors are going to Camp Wakonda for a weekend of bonding and relationship building. They call it "Senior Survival." All other students will go home for a weekend. Classes resume on Tuesday, September 8.

As the new school year begins we face more challenges than we have in the past. Some of these are due to the state of the economy and some are due to the state of the world in general. If we look around us we can find many things that would cause us to be discouraged. We can also find much that can make us excited. We can be discouraged by the suffering in the world, natural disasters, the cruelty of mankind and the apathy in our own church or we can be excited by the fact that all of this is a sign that our Lord is coming soon to take us home!

The pastors and teachers have chosen to be excited. You could see this as they worked together during the worker's meetings. Each school pastor/teacher team has made plans for this new school year. However, the Three Angels School and the Green Bay Adventist Junior Academy enrollments were up substantially. The academy has started the year with 92 students. The number of girls is actually up from last year despite the fact that they face less than ideal living conditions until the girl's dormitory is completed.

That's Impossible

My ears perked up when I heard the name of Elder Ron Clouzet. Elder Clouzet was one of my favorite professors at Southern Adventist University when I was there. Since then he has moved on to the North American Division and is in charge of the Evangelism Institute located at Andrews University.

Elder James Fox was sharing with the pastors in our conference a vision he caught from Elder Clouzet. This vision was simply impossible. You see Elder Clouzet and the dedicated pastors and church administrators working with him were stepping out in faith suggesting that for 2009, the year of pastoral evangelism, we set as a goal a growth rate of 10%.

A growth rate of 10% is simply impossible. I say that because the church in North America has been growing at a rate of less than 2.5%. By the time Elder Fox shared this vision with me, it was obvious that this wasn't a goal <u>we</u> could achieve, it was a goal that only <u>God</u> could achieve. Through Elder Clouzet's leadership we have accepted the challenge to achieve a goal that only God can achieve.

I have no idea how we are going to see this many souls won to Jesus, but I sure am excited to see how God is going to use us this year.

Some people get bent out of shape when we talk about numbers like 10%. Personally I'm not bothered by this, because that number represents something to me. It's not a cold, impersonal number. Instead it's my brother-in-law, my uncle, and my neighbor who desperately need Jesus. It's your son or daughter who you haven't seen in church for years. It's your father or mother who have avoided

God every chance they get. Ten percent isn't simply a faceless number; it represents your friends, family, and neighbors.

I have been sharing this with my congregation for months. We are going to reach for a goal that only God can achieve. We can't do this ourselves. It was the fact that I had been preaching this to my churches that makes what happened next so ironic.

I was sitting around a table with a group of pastors as a preliminary budget was passed out indicating what each church needed to raise to be a part of Hope for Wisconsin (a Milwaukee city wide evangelistic outreach consisting of over 50 simultaneous evangelistic meetings being held this October). I looked at the budget numbers listed next to my churches and my mouth dropped open. I was on the verge of raising my hand to say, we can't do this. There is no way we can raise this kind of money. It was at that point that I remembered the sermons and articles I had been sharing with my members about setting a goal that only God can achieve. These budgets certainly came into that category as far as I was concerned.

I took them to my churches and they approved them, not because they knew where the money was going to come from but because they too are looking forward to seeing God reach this impossible goal. As of this writing both churches have raised over 90% of the funding needed towards this impossible goal.

I don't know how God is going to work in the next few weeks and

A Seventh-day-Adventist Presence Formally Re-opened In Fond du Lac, Wisconsin

On Sabbath August 29, Elders
Don Corkum, Conference President, Roger Driver, Conference
Executive Secretary-Treasurer,
and James Fox, Conference
Ministerial and Evangelism Director officiated at a special worship service attended by 58 people,
marking the formal organization of Adventist believers in Fond du Lac as a Company.

An Adventist Church existed in Fond du Lac as part of the Fox Valley District since 1904, but with dwindling membership, the Church had to be closed in the late 1970's. Since then, an Adventist presence

was maintained through the few members still living there, but it was the dream of many to reestablish an Adventist Church there as soon as possible. Fond du Lac is the county seat with a population of 100,000, on the South Shore of beautiful Lake Winnebago, approximately half-way between Milwaukee and Green Bay.

"The events of Sabbath August 29 marked the culmination of the work of many," says Fond du Lac Pastor Samuel Garbi: "Since my arrival in the Fox Valley District in 2005, I have seen how all who've been involved in the Adventist work in Fond du Lac have had a crucial part in the re-birthing of an Adventist Company here."

To mention just a few:

Tim and Jennifer Tillman and Roy and Tammy Erickson and their families, led in a Branch Sabbath School there up to 2006

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- The work of Literature Evangelists such as Paul Presley and Bob Buchholz from Fox Valley SDA Church
- The vision of Elders Don Corkum and James Fox at the Conference, the support of Lisa Isensee as Conference Church Planting Coach Steve Aust, as well as the labors of Evangelist Ric Swaningson and his Adventures in Prophecy team as he led in an evangelistic effort here in the Fall of 2006
- Linda and Paul Schmitz from Sheboygan SDA church, LeSuong and Chris Cina and their families, Pastor Clair and Bonnie Tillman formerly from MN, the Sturms (from MI), and now, the Muranyi (from CA), Conti (from IL), Mally (from Delavan SDA Church), Ackles (from Beaver Dam SDA Church) and Kwon families (from Fox Valley SDA Church).
- Ric Swaningson's 2006 evangelistic effort transformed Fond du Lac from the Branch SS it was into a Church Plant
- The Cinas carried the full burden of leadership for the 2 years since the 2006 Seminar; and now, with the Muranyi's move to the community in 2008 and the continued contribution of all, the group has found the remaining elements needed for becoming a Company."

The Fond du Lac SDA Company currently meets downtown at the former Saint Patrick's Church. Arpad and Estie Muranyi were led to purchase this property in the summer of 2007 and to move their family there, with a desire of using the beautiful pipe organ and attractive facilities for fine musical performances and

quality educational programs. In gratitude to God, they have accepted to open this property to the Church as well. Among other features, the well-located compound includes a large parking lot, meeting rooms, and a school with a gym, which may, down-the-line, be used for an Adventist School. Immediately following this special Sabbath, evangelistic plans are in

place for a Daniel Seminar to be held from September 11 to November 22 under the leadership of Dorothy and Pearo Ackles, head elder of the Beaver Dam SDA Church, with Pastor Samuel Garbi co-teaching. This effort is mostly funded with NAD Church Planting Seed monies made available to the Church Plant through James Fox's applications. The group is hoping that this well-advertised effort will boost the membership of the Company to where it fulfills all of Conference requirements to become a full-fledged church. Some new members from North Dakota, Chicago, and many other places have recently found their "church home" in this blossoming Church Group. Plans are also in place for this group to support other Church-Planting efforts in Fond du Lac, within one year of the Company acquiring church status.

A moving moment symbolically bridging the past of the Adventist Church in Fond du Lac to its present took place when, after the delicious fellowship lunch prepared by the ladies of the church, a delegation of the charter members of the newly formed Company went to visit with the former head elder Floyd Watts and his wife, who now are shut-in because of age, offering them the privilege and

joy of once again joining their names to the official membership roster of the new company. The believers in Fond du Lac were praying for the requirement of at least 15 charter members to be met on that Special Sabbath for the group to become a Company. With the Watts family signing the list, it brought the number of Charter Members to 25, only 5 short of the 30 members required to qualify towards recognition as a church in the Wisconsin Conference.

There is a bright future for the work in Fond du Lac as the membership continues to simultaneously work at clarifying its identity, inclusiveness and support of new ministries in this rapidly changing world and community. It is only through the participation of very different people finding common ground that this exciting project came to this present level of fruition. Pastor Samuel Garbi offers the twin observation that: "Only through a balanced church program that is intentional about outreach, mission and evangelism, and an inclusive stance that will give practical and willing support to different outreaches with different target groups in the community, will our new Fond du Lac Company reach the full potential God has in mind

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for His work in this location in preparation for the soon coming of Jesus."
