Two Good Knees

"You don't know what you are getting into!" That's what everyone said as I told my Hungarian church family I was moving to the United States of America. "You don't know the language. You don't have any friends there. This is crazy!" I smiled. "It's OK", I have two good knees!"

agdolna Muranyi is an 82-year-old grandmother living in a beautiful historic Catholic church in Fond du Lac, Wisconsin. She came to the U.S. five years ago to live with her son and his family after the death of her husband. "I didn't want to come," she said. "I was comfortable with a home in the country as well as a home in town, but I left my country with only four suitcases. If God wants me here, this is where I'll serve Him."

Magdolna was born and raised just outside Budapest, Hungary. Her Father was Catholic, her mother Presbyterian, but they generally followed the Catholic faith for family unity. When Magdolna was 11 years old, her father died suddenly. Her mother wanted to go visit her sister on the other side of Budapest, but it was during the war, and government permission to travel was difficult to obtain. Near the end of the war they finally made arrangements to spend several months visiting

with their relatives who happened to be Seventh-day Adventists. Magdolna and her sister, Helen, learned all they could from their cousins. When they returned home, they got involved in an Adventist church, and, even though they were not members, began selling Adventist books door-to-door. In 1946, at the age of 18, Magdolna was baptized along with her sister, Helen. Two years later, her mother was baptized also.

Magdolna married a musicologist who specialized in organ performance. He too had been raised with communist restrictions. She smiled as she related how, as a boy, he would hide each Sabbath under the church's large pipe organ, because children were not allowed to come to church. He grew up loving the church and loving music. Seeing a great need for more Christian books, he began translating Adventist books, especially Spirit of Prophecy books, into the Hungarian language. He also wrote an Adventist hymnal for the Hungarian church.

After her husband's death, and coming to America, Magdolna began praying, "Lord, I want to serve You. What can I do? I can't speak English. I feel like I cannot do any-

M y mother is a firm believer in Adventist education. How do I know? She made it top priority.

Over the years, Mother took care of almost 50 foster children. From changing hundreds of diapers, to assembly-line feeding of three hungry kids in high chairs, Mother did everything she could to earn tuition and music lesson money for my siblings and me. It must have been hard to care for up to eight children at a time with Dad gone to work all day. Mother was willing to do whatever it took to keep her five kids in Adventist schools.

Dad made sacrifices, too. He moved our family to a town with a strong Adventist school, even though it meant he had to commute nearly an hour to work each day. My parent's decision wasn't based on how much Adventist education cost or how much effort it took them. Their decision was based on the value they placed on us getting the best spiritual, social and academic education possible.

I have noticed in other areas of life, as well as in education, that we invest in the things we value. We prioritize the things we hold important. We sacrifice some things to gain what we cherish.

As we stand at the beginning of a new school year, many parents are asking themselves questions like, "Can I afford to give my child an Adventist education?" and "What am I willing to sacrifice to make sure they get it?"

I encourage those who are struggling with the issue not to give up. Talk to your local school administrators and your local church. Find out what financial and practical assistance is available.

I encourage our local church families to support your local schools, not just with money, but with time and resources. Preparing our children for heaven is a team effort. Ask your local teachers and administrators what you can do to support the ministry of your school.

I applaud the hundreds of mothers, fathers, grandparents, church families, and others across Wisconsin who are making sacrifices to keep their children in Adventist schools. Your dedication is noticed.

Like my mother, I am a firm believer in Adventist education. Why? I was lovingly led to Jesus in an Adventist school.

thing now! Please, show me what I can do for You." She bought 1,300 Steps to Christ booklets and put the church address in each with a Bible study card. Every morning she took a map and a bag of Steps to Christ booklets and began delivering them to all the homes around the church. "No one responded," she said. "I was very discouraged. Yet I continued praying, 'Lord, what can I do for You?' Then God reminded me I could still translate books. I immediately bought an English/Hungarian dictionary and a computer, and began translating."

By her desk is a stack of books she's translated-books by Zdravko Stovonovich, Jon Pauline, George King, Marvin Moore, Samuel Bacchiocchi, and many others. "I really enjoyed translating the book Daniel, by Stovonvich," she smiled, "it gave me a chance to learn some Hebrew and Aramaic."

She sends the translated books by e-mail to a pastor friend in Hungary who shares them with the people. She has also translated several books by Ellen G. White, and thinks they now have most of her writings, except for the Testimonies.

The country of Hungary is smaller than the state of Wisconsin, and has a population of 10 million people. Recently, Mark Finley and

Shawn Boonstra held evangelistic meetings there. Many people responded. "My people still have some freedoms," says Magdolna, "but with the new leadership I believe our window of opportunity is beginning to close. Government people are always present at our services, and only state approved pastors are allowed to speak. We need to pray, and do what we can now."

Magdolna and her family are doing what they can to plant an Adventist church in the town of Fond du Lac. They currently have 13 members and about that many visitors each Sabbath. "God has given us one for one!" she smiles.

Magdolna prays every day for each member and visitor. When she hears of someone gaining a victory over some troubling problem, she rejoices, "My heart is so full of joy today! My prayer has been answered!"

Each Sabbath you can find Magdolna sitting at the back of the church waiting, and praying for people to come. She has a dream of filling the church and attached school someday with Adventist people from Fond du Lac. "I can smile, and I can pray," she says. "This is something I can do."

Religious Liberty: *Words Matter*

write this article to make you aware of what seems to be a shift in the statements of our national leaders relating to Freedom of Religion. I have read the complete text of our Presidents Cairo Speech in June of last year. It was a pretty good speech and referred to "religious freedom" as a "spirit we need today." That certainly fits with the practice which has helped make America great and is highly valued by us as Seventh-day Adventists. Since that time some have commented that the term "religious freedom" has often been replaced by our President and Secretary of State with the term "freedom of worship." I can understand this may be an attempt to placate those in the Muslim world, but it could have serious unintended consequences. I include a paragraph from the Catholic Online magazine that clarifies the difference.

"In her article for First Things magazine, Ashley Samelson, International Programs Director for the Becket Fund for Religious Liberty, stated, 'To anyone who closely follows prominent discussion of religious freedom in the diplomatic and political arena, this linguistic shift is troubling. The reason is simple. Any person of faith knows that religious exercise is about a lot more than freedom of worship. It's about the right to dress according to one's religious dictates, to preach openly, to evangelize, to engage in the public square. Everyone knows that religious Jews keep kosher, religious Quakers don't go to war, and religious Muslim women wear headscarvesyet 'freedom of worship' would protect none of these acts of faith. Freedom of worship moves the dialog from the public national scene, to the inside of a home or church.'

"Human rights lawyer Nina Shea, who is a Senior Scholar at the Hudson Institute, is also concerned. 'I'm very fearful that by building bridges, we're actually stepping away from this fundamental principle of religious freedom. It is so critical for Western, especially American, leaders to articulate strong defense for religious freedom, and explain what that means, and how it undergirds our entire civilization."

This is something to keep in our prayers as our prophetic understanding indicates that America will someday repudiate these principles.

Oxford Prison Ministry Expands

ver the past six years, Wendell Springer, retired pastor and member of the Oxford church, has served as the prison ministries coordinator. "When God opens a door, you go through it.," says Pastor Springer. "It can be a little scary at first. You hear doors clanging behind you and get a little spooked. But once you get to know the fellows, even though they are inmates, they become your friends. You pray together, and realize this is a real highlight in their lives. Once you get into it...it's a little addicting!

Every Sabbath at 12:30 p.m., Oxford SDA church members visit the local Federal Prison. They go through Bible study set's, or sometimes even the Sabbath School Lesson Quarterly with interested inmates. Several baptisms have come from this study time, in fact one is scheduled for this coming October 21. Jeff Veldman and Dennis Pendleton are currently heading up this Federal Prison Ministry.

Six months ago, a new ministry started at the Portage State Prison. The prison chaplain, Leo Campbell is a Seventh-day Adventist and wanted to be sure the prison had an Adventist influence. Elders from both the Oxford and Portage churches are conducting Sunday evening services now and have about 80 prisoners coming each week. If fact they have two services, because the meeting hall is only large enough to seat 40. Pastor Springer and Jerry Minett are also conducting personal Bible studies with 4 of the prisoners.

Oxford's newest ministry started July 24, with Karen Blair organizing a weekly Sabbath church service for inmates at the Marquette County Jail. The jail has been without worship services of any kind for a number of years. Jail rules require inmates to obtain advance permission to participate, and response has been good with about one-third of inmates placing requests! A group of church members take turns going in teams of two, to sing, present a short sermon, and pray with attendees.

"It is my sincere hope that this ministry will continue and thrive until our Lord returns," says Karen. "Only Eternity can make known the good accomplished by such efforts." RH December 18, 1900


