Winter Baptisms in Wisconsin

The following article excerpt was printed in the Review following meetings held in the Kickapoo church, January 1873.

"The Lord favored us with mild weather after a very severe storm. Ten brethren and sisters came across the prairies 8 miles to be baptized. Three friends came afoot 15 miles to attend the meetings.

"The ice was about 3 feet thick, but after about half a days work, we obtained a suitable grave for baptism...All felt well physically as well as spiritually, although some were feeble persons.

"On Sunday one brother came 10 miles to be baptized. After we had a parting meeting. Most hearts were moved, and the blessed hope seemed good to these friends who, a short time before, had been without hope and faith in Christ."

The practice of ice-breaking for winter baptisms prevailed in Wisconsin into the twentieth century. As late as 1924, Poy Sippi Church members still held winter baptisms in the Pine River.
