After having my youngest son, I decided to continue my education. The educational institutions did not accept my degree from Uruguay, only giving me about half of my bachelor credits and a minor in Spanish.

With God's help I did graduate with a BS in Psychology, and a minor in Spanish. My next thought was, "Lord, what do you want me to do next? Open the doors and I will walk through." He opened doors alright. I went to Concordia University

just to get information, and the dean arranged my semester's schedule. My first class started the following Monday. God has plans for our lives, and if we allow Him to, He will do wonders.

School has not been easy. English is my second language. I work, am a mother, wife, and active church member. But I know God listens to my prayers, and He has answered mine when I asked Him to give me wisdom and strength.

Now, after all these years, God is still talking to me and inspiring me to keep advancing my education. If everything goes according to plans, I will complete a doctorate degree in the near future.

I know for a fact that God uses our careers to praise His name and to help others get closer to Him. I am an instrument of God's grace when I do therapy in my private practice.

I have only one boss, Jesus my Lord. He guides my life and gives me hope.

In 1891, Meade MacGuire, an Adventist youth of Antigo, Wisconsin, had an inspiration to start a youth program.

"Once I was invited to attend some youth meetings of another church," said Meade. "I was thrilled and thought it would be wonderful to have a society like that in our church.

"Most church members were very opposed to the idea, yet one elder, Brother Conner, was very sympathetic. He said that if I wanted a young people's meeting, to go ahead. He would see that I had a chance.

"Almost 30 youth came to that first meeting. We spent a little time in Bible study and then had a prayer and testimony meeting. We expected every member to pray and speak each time. If one missed, we felt very much upset those days and prayed earnestly for that one."
