Learning to Listen; Trusting Our Hope

The evening started as a "typical" Saturday night, November 24, 2012, approximately 7:00 pm. I developed a persistent discomfort in my mid-abdomen, much like indigestion. As the evening continued, the indigestion sensation convinced me that it might be well to go to bed early, so I "turned in" at 8:30 pm.

I had a recurring thought that

night: CHIP teaches that the first indication of a heart blockage is sudden death. Yet I have been a healthy vegetarian since my teens, and no pain radiated to my arms and legs.

By morning I felt better. I told my wife, "I think that may have been a heart attack last night." Suddenly, Susan and our daughter insisted I go to the hospital right away. Finally, on Monday morning, I agreed to go to the emergency room. A false sense of security told me that I would be returning home right after being checked.

The hospital staff determined irregularities in my blood and heartbeat. Surgery was scheduled. I was still in denial while lying on my back in the operating room, but I prayed, "Lord, please get me through this." After the angioplasty heart procedure, surgeons disclosed that the main heart artery had 95% blockage and a second heart artery had 70% blockage.

I am learning to listen when God speaks. He speaks to each of us at appropriate times, and He often speaks through our loved ones and friends. I am grateful my first warning of heart blockage was not death, and I am grateful to have a good wife and family.

It is clear to me that God preserved my life for His purposes. This side of my heart attack, Susan and I are even more attentive to God's leading.

Morning Speaker: 9:30 Dr. David Trim, director of archives and statistics for the General Conference, received his BA from Newbold College before attending King's College in London, where he wrote a PhD dissertation on English involvement in the European religion wars of the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries.

From 1998 to 2007 Trim was on the faculty at Newbold College, teaching history and theology. Until the end of 2009 he was the Walter C. Madison Sanitarium

At the Madison camp meeting in 1881, Elder and Mrs. White urged the building of a sanitarium, as Madison had no hospital.

In 1899, two nurses from Battle Creek and another couple, the Bramhalls, leased an old clubhouse at 118 Monona Ave. for treatment rooms. The venture grew, and soon a line of health foods and restaurant were added.

The Wisconsin Conference then voted to build a hospital. They bought five acres on the south shore of Lake Monona, built a three-story building and on June 7, 1903, Dr. J. H. Kellogg gave the dedicatory address.

Horse-drawn busses brought people to the sanitarium, until management purchased a steamboat which made four trips a day bringing people from Madison. Many congressmen from the capitol came for treatment, and nursing care was provided for the wealthy Barnum and Bailey family at Baraboo.
