It's Youth Rally '94!

Helping organize the event is a team of ten Wisconsin Academy students. "We especially wanted their input, since this is their day," says Richmund.

One of these team leaders is **Carolyn Teeters**, a junior at WA. She says she thinks the rally is a good idea. "I think it's cool that people our age can get together and express our Christian beliefs," she says.

A combined Sabbath School/worship service opens the rally at 10 a.m. in the gym. Following lunch, songs and a

message from the guest speaker are planned.

Regular church services will be held in the academy chapel (9:30 a.m. Sabbath School). Visiting parents are welcome to attend.

WA pastor **Gaylan Herr** says he doesn't mind losing half his congregation to the gym that day. "We try to meet the needs of both the academy and the community

every week," he says, "but occasionally it's good to have a worship service especially for students."

While this is the first youth rally at the academy, chaplain Richmund and **Steve Brown**, principal, say they hope it will become an annual event.

Youth Rally '94 kicks off one of WA's biggest weekends of the year. Saturday night, the **Spring Music Concert** begins at 8:30 p.m. Director **Ed Pelto** says students will perform individual songs along with the musical, *The Wind in the Willow*.

Pathfinders invade the campus Sunday for the annual **Pathfinder Fair.** Marching drills, booth displays and a Pioneer Drag Race are only part of what's in store. The fair starts at 10:30 a.m.

Just as the gym clears Sunday, **Academy Days** begin at 4 p.m. Vice principal **Cherry Habenicht** says the plan calls for a softball game and general assembly that night.

### Lay advisory well attended

### We must stop being an audience, counsels one member

Thirty-eight churches—over half the Seventh-day Adventist churches in Wisconsin—were represented at the Lay Advisory Council on Sunday, March 13. The group of nearly 60 lay members, chaired by Ed Sajdak, Fox Valley, heard progress reports from Arnold Swanson, conference president, and received a preliminary camp meeting schedule, recent faxes from the General Conference president, and information on the new Adventist Communication Network.

Statistical/financial reports were presented by **Ken Wright**, secretary-treasurer, along with the proposed 1994 conference budget, properly balanced according to denominational guidelines. After review and answers to questions, the group voted to recommend the budget to the conference Executive Committee.

#### Academy report

**Steve Brown**, principal of Wisconsin Academy, also presented a brief written and verbal report, including the following:

- Current enrollment of 100, with potential for next school year of 115.
- Accounts receivable lowest in years.
- Under operating budget by about \$30,000 to date.
- Potential warehouse lease to bring in \$2,000 monthly.
- Packaging industry being explored with local company.
- Extensive recruiting efforts.
- On-going and varied spiritual activities.

## Some questions asked by delegates:

How much does it actually cost to operate Wisconsin Academy?

A. \$1,435,992 last school year, with major expenses being staff salaries and fixed expenses such as heat, utilities, etc. Brown noted that tuition and fees cover only about half the actual cost of operating the academy.

What is the advantage of belonging to the Lake Union Conference?

A. A group of conferences can do more together than one alone in terms of resources, counsel, etc. Eliminating union conferences would mean directing all problems and needs to the North American Division office, which does not have sufficient staff to deal with issues all across North America. Herb Wrate cited several benefits for the Education Department including development of curriculum and computer programs.

Although tuition and fees totaled \$7,325 per student this school year, Brown and Y.E.S. coordinator **Louise Legreid** concurred that "no student needs to be turned away for lack of money." Scholarships, sponsors and work opportunities are available. Currently 28 students work at Bake-n-Serve.

#### Outreach report

Lay outreach reports included:
Members enrolling others in a Bible study course at Fox Valley and conducting a cooking school; tracts distributed door to door by Milwaukee North Spanish; networking with other groups to conduct seminars at Sturgeon Bay; prayer and friendship reclaiming a member and winning his wife in Hayward, with other family members now studying; a children's story hour at Hylandale where parents ask to stay, too; and more.

"We need to stop being an audience," said one council member, and get more involved in working for Christ."






age of a criminal act-date rape.

### Raymond school sees salty miracle

Here in Wisconsin, snow is nothing new. But when school board members at **Raymond Jr. Academy** near Milwaukee came up with a plan to use the snowy weather to pay off the school's heavy debts, they weren't prepared for what happened next.

Faced with high bills, a low enrollment and the possibility of their school closing, members called an emergency board meeting January 30. Rather than seeking a bank loan, the group prayerfully decided to try to sell road salt to pay their bills.

The idea came from school board chair **Nelson Boon**, **Jr.**, whose company deals with road salt supply.

"Churches sell oranges, why can't we sell salt?" he asked.

With God's help, the plan worked. One family contacted relatives who work in snow and ice removal in Chicago, where heavy snows had exhausted salt supplies.

Response was immediate. According to Boon, one buyer flew by helicopter from Chicago to Milwaukee to negotiate a deal. Another buyer donated \$4,000 cash and some land-scaping equipment to the school!

By the end of February, Raymond Jr. Academy had raised over \$30,000 in road salt commissions, with more orders coming in.

All school debts have now been paid without obtaining bank loans. Plans are underway to build up the program and attract new students.

## Durand church participates in special evangelistic crusade

Protestant churches in Durand and surrounding communities united in sponsoring a special evangelistic crusade March 19-22, with **Ralph Bell**, associate evangelist for the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association, speaker.

Elder Clinton Meharry, pastor of the Durand and Menominee churches and chaplain of the Chippewa Valley Hospital and Oakview Care Center, assisted in the planning for the meetings. Elder Walter Arties of the Seventh-day Adventist "Breath of Life" telecast served as soloist and director of the 100-member community choir that sang during the crusade.

The purpose of the crusade was to present Jesus to the people in Durand and surrounding communities.

Lay members from all participating churches were trained to follow up on

interests developed from these meetings. Randy and Val Edge, Lester Carney, Kerri Castleberg, and Elder and Mrs. Meharry attended the training classes from the Durand Church. They will be making calls on people who came forward at the meetings.

Pastor Meharry also led out in prayer luncheons that were held on five Tuesdays prior to the crusade. About 20 people from different churches met to pray for the community, the crusades, and revivals in Durand area churches.

Pastor Meharry says, "It has been a very valuable and rewarding experience for Christians to learn more about each other and pray together."
