Net '95 nets rewards

March 25 marked the close of the "Discoveries in Prophecy" series with evangelist Mark Finley. At least 30,000 people in nearly 700 satellitelinked sites across North America attended the final night. Net '95 is the largest evangelistic crusade in the history of the SDA Church.

"God blessed in ways far beyond our expectations," said Finley.

Early reports from across the division show an average of 10 new members may be added to each church participating in the crusade.

Here in Wisconsin, pastors at the Ministers' Meeting on March 27 eagerly shared how the series has affected their districts:

Milwaukee Northwest

"[Net '95] has been the greatest experience in my entire ministry," says Pastor Steve Cook, recalling how people streamed through the doors the first night. So far seven adults have been baptized, and another six interests are being followed through.

Several individuals have stopped smoking, the pastor reports. One man had decided to commit suicide, but someone knocked on his door and invited him to the meetings. He is now attending church.

Another man was fearful of losing his job and home for keeping the Sabbath. He has found a new job.

Clearwater Lake/Rhinelander

Local elders helped run two series in Clearwater Lake and Rhinelander, reports **Pastor Bill Ochs**. Baptisms are planned for April 1 and 8.

One person especially struggled over the Sabbath. After working one Sabbath—a day he called "the worst day" of his life—he went home, prayed, and decided to keep the Sabbath. The next day he received a new job offer.

Attendance at both churches has increased, says Ochs. Former members are returning. "There's a new excitement in the air, a new dynamic. . . . We now have 15-20 new contacts that we're following through."

Fox Valley

The church taped the meetings and is showing them at a slower sequence; 70-80 nonmembers have attended the meetings at least once. cold, so they waited until evening for the baptism. [That night] the church was packed."

Sturgeon Bay

Five people will be baptized at Sturgeon Bay, reports Pastor Marvin Clark, who traveled 100 miles round trip for each meeting. An unmarried couple with children attended, and began feeling uneasy about their relationship. "I want you to marry us," the woman told Clark. A wedding is planned for the end of May, and the baptism the following week. The family came after a flyer was sent to their home.

Fifty nonmembers came the first night. "We gave out only 20,000 handbills, and wish we'd given out more," says **Pastor John Riggs.** Baptisms for at least ten persons are planned for April 15 and 30.

Marshfield

Bethel Jr. Academy distributed 6,000 handbills door-to door, states **Pastor Bob Stauffer**. Two women first contacted by student literature evangelists have requested baptism, along with several others.

Former members and youth have also returned to church.

Stauffer tells how plans for a baptism on Sabbath almost backfired. "We had filled the baptistry, but somehow the water drained. . . A deacon added a second hose and again filled the tank in time for the worship service, but the water was

Pound

As many as 55—in a town of 450—attended during the series. "All five churches have supported this program. It's excited the whole district," reports **Pastor Art Miller**. He expects around nine baptisms.

Wisconsin Academy

The series boosted lay involvement; some 90 members from WA and Beaver Dam helped with everything from the technology to child care. Five people have requested baptism, with five more considering it. Many members also made deeper commitments to Christ, and some have requested rebaptism.

"The benefits of participating in Net '95 have been well worth the effort, and the effects will be felt for years," predicts Pastor Gaylan Herr.

Lay advisory reviews conference business

The sixth annual lay advisory met Sunday, March 12, at the conference office to review conference business.

"The time together was an opportunity for sharing and for advisory members to better understand the work of our conference," President **Arne Swanson** said.

After a devotional by advisory chair **Ed Sajdak** (Fox Valley), Elder Swanson shared highlights of various conference activities in 1994. He reported on Net '95, the major evangelistic thrust of the conference for this year.

Kenneth Wright, conference secretary-treasurer, presented financial statements for 1994 and a proposed budget for 1995, which the advisory approved. (On March 21, the Executive Committee also approved the '95 budget.)

"1994 was a very good year for Wisconsin," Wright stated in his financial review.

"The total Operating Fund balance is up \$305,818 over the December, 1993, figure. At year's end, we had 68.1 percent of recommended working capital (unaudited). The audited figure was 44.2 percent. The current ratio (current assets divided by current liabilities) is presently 2.4, compared to 1.7 at the end of 1993," Wright said.

This meeting was called in accordance with the current constitution and bylaws of the Wisconsin Conference.

WA students fast for famine relief

Forty-three students at Wisconsin Academy were part of the 300,000 teens in the U.S. and Canada who joined the 30 Hour Famine Project, reports WA secretary Sue Rappette. This event is part of an international event

sponsored by World Vision, a Christian relief and development organization.

Participants asked family, friends, and neighbors to sponsor them as they went without food to identify with the hungry.

"It wasn't too bad," said one teen.
"But usually the longest I go without food is three or four hours."

The students and their six adult sponsors spent much of March 17 and 18 learning about the world's hunger problem. They also prepared and delivered 33 baskets of fruit and homemade bread to 33 local elderly residents on March 18.

WA outreach coordinator **Oliver Archer** reports the academy group raised over \$1,500 for the cause.

Pastor, teacher, and intern join Wisconsin

Two new pastors and a teacher will be coming to Wisconsin soon. Elder Claudio Consuegra has accepted the invitation to pastor the Lake Country/Watertown/Waukesha district, beginning in April. (The Executive Committee voted in February to add Watertown to this district.)

Elder Consuegra comes from Roanoke, VA, where he served most recently as a hospice chaplain and bereavement counselor. Earlier he pastored in the Potomac and Oklahoma conferences.

In 1984, Consuegra was named *Pastor/Soul Winner of the Year* for the Oklahoma Conference.

His wife, **Pam**, will teach grades 4-6 at Milwaukee Jr. Academy.

Jeffrey Coleman, a senior theology major from Union College, has accepted the call to be assistant pastor in the Milwaukee English district. He'll arrive mid-July, following his marriage to Melony Kennedy.

In 1996, Jeffrey will enter the seminary at Andrews University as an intern for Wisconsin Conference.




