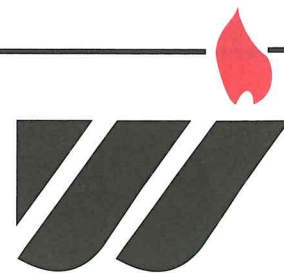

Lay evangelism touches lives

Kevin Wilkinson, a police officer and member of the New London Church, likes to tell about his friend, Kenny Lorenz from Fox Valley. "He has blue eyes that will sink right through you," Kevin says, "And he loves the message so much he can't help talking about it."

Kenny runs a dairy farm in Black Creek. On the side, he pumps manure pits. Admittedly, cleaning out septic tanks for cows is not a glamorous job, but, Kevin explains, "that's Kenny's ministry."

After emptying a manure pit at one farm, Kenny invited the owners to a Prophecy Seminar. The couple accepted his invitation, and today, Stan and Martha Getlinger are New London members.



But it doesn't stop there, says Kevin. While building a new house, the Getlingers discovered that their contractor, Mark Fredrick, was an elder in the Mormon church. They invited him to a Prophecy Seminar. Today, Mark, his wife Roxanne and their two children are baptized members at New London. A friend has also been baptized, and others are studying.

Here in Wisconsin where pastors are few and churches are many, successful evangelism depends on lay members. Pastor Glenn Lewis (Janesville) reports that many of the 14 baptisms held at camp meeting June 25 were the results of lay Bible studies.

Plans for camp lodges get underway

Awaiting official approval by the Executive Committee is the construction of two new mini-lodges for Camp Go Seek, says Conference Treasurer Ken Wright.

"The concept has already been approved," Wright explains. "And plans for construction are now being developed."

The Camp Planning Committee met July 14 to begin work on such plans. Preliminary blueprints show two winterized, four-room lodges, complete with baths and showers and able to house up to eight people each. The facilities will be available for year-

round use by church, school, Pathfinder and conference groups.

When completed, the basement of one lodge will also provide space for Camp Wakonda's Nature Center; the other will house Crafts and Ceramics.

Building sites have already been selected, with one lodge going behind the "space capsule" and the other in front of a section of tents.

The committee hopes to begin construction this fall, with the lodges enclosed by winter.

Funding of materials will come from the proceeds of the sale of Camp Wahdoon. ■

Church history tour nears

What do the homes of Uriah Smith, William Miller and the Pilgrims have in common? They're all part of the New England Church History Tour, coming up August 7-14.

According to trip coordinator Herb Wrate, 43 Wisconsin pastors, teachers and members have registered for the tour. Their guide will be James Nix of the White Estate.

Wrate says the trip was planned in coordination with the 150th anniversary of the Great Disappointment. Itinerary highlights include a visit to Plymouth Plantation, where authentic buildings and "residents" recreate the

Pilgrims' first settlement.

In Portland, Maine, the group will also see the grade school Ellen White attended (and where she was seriously injured by a school-mate, thus ending her formal education) and the house believed to be her childhood home.

On Sabbath, August 13, visitors will stand on Ascension Rock, where on October 22, 1844, hopeful Advent believers scanned the skies for signs of Christ's imminent return.

"Our church service held in the chapel William Miller built next to his home will be especially meaningful," says Wrate. ■

Coming this fall Eau Claire Crusade

Target cities for public evangelism in 1994 are Eau Claire and Chippewa Falls, says Conference President Arnold Swanson.

The crusades will feature guest evangelistic team Dan and Gloria Bentzinger from the Adventist Media Center in Thousand Oaks, California. Host pastor and coordinator is John Johansen.

Meetings begin Friday evening, August 26, at the South Middle School in Eau Claire.

The crusade will run through October 1.

In preparation for these meetings, Eau Claire is finishing a new church building addition. Since the sale of the old Eau Claire church a few years ago, members have been meeting in the Eau Claire church school facility. A new sanctuary added to the school will be the new church home for Eau Claire members.

Last year, the Wisconsin, Lake Region and Lake Union conferences teamed up to target the greater Milwaukee area for evangelism. Eight crusades supported by ten area churches led to at least 125 baptisms. ■

Trust services awarded new accreditation status

Wisconsin Conference Trust Services has been awarded Level B Accreditation from the North American Division Trust Services Certification and Accreditation Committee. This means the department is one step nearer its goal of obtaining Level A Accreditation.

"We are very happy about reaching Level B," said Trust Services Director Richard Habenicht. "This is an important step toward carrying on an even more effective trust program."

With this award, Wisconsin joins the Michigan and Illinois conferences, who both gained Level B status earlier this year. The Lake Union Conference trust program received Level B accreditation almost a year ago.

"We want to congratulate you on achieving Level B," wrote committee chairman George Crumley in a letter to conference officers. "Certainly Wisconsin Conference has made an outstanding commitment . . . to make this outstanding achievement." ■

Moving mountains a little at a time

There is a vast difference between a little and nothing. Nothing, multiplied a thousand times, is still nothing. However, a little at a time — a little money, a little enthusiasm, a little love — added to a little more of the same, soon becomes an impressive amount!

Most of us waste treasures of time and money, love and other less tangible things because we haven't learned to appreciate and use "a little" effectively.

A farmer wanted his winter supply of wood moved farther from his house but lacked the time to do the chore. Each time he passed the woodpile, it plagued him. One morning he stopped, picked up a few logs and carried them with him to a new location. Thereafter, he carried a load each time he passed the pile and soon had relocated the entire stack.

A young mother wanted very much to make new dresses for her two small daughters for Christmas, but her

family duties left no time for sewing. Determined, she stayed up late one night to cut out the dresses. Then she began by sewing two seams at a time whenever she could. By Christmas, the dresses were done.

Many lacking money to pay an obligation in full, fail to pay at all. Yet most businesses will accept a partial payment if an explanation accompanies it. A little shows a desire to pay; nothing shows a lack of concern.

The world is starved for love and appreciation. We all intend to show these—to loved ones, neighbors, friends—but there is no time!

Or is there? A phone call can be made in five minutes. A quick note often requires little more time. A short visit would require a little time, but it could make quite a difference in someone's life.

In the same way, we tend to excuse ourselves from work in the church and for the church. It seems to us that the little we could do would be insignificant. Others seem to have more talents and more time to devote to "church work." Probably most of us would classify ourselves a "one talent" member and therefore, not too important as far as success or failure of the church is concerned.

Another "little thing" is the goal of two percent of each member's income for Wisconsin Budget. It is a small amount and one may be tempted to think, why give it, what will be accomplished by my two percent? But when that amount is multiplied by the 6,000 members in Wisconsin, that "small amount" adds up to something impressive.

Wisconsin Evangelism, Wisconsin Academy, the campground and building programs across our state depend on the Wisconsin Budget offering. All of these programs are hurt by those who do nothing. Please don't underestimate the value of your small amount.

As the old Chinese proverb says, "The man who moves the mountain carries it away a little at a time."

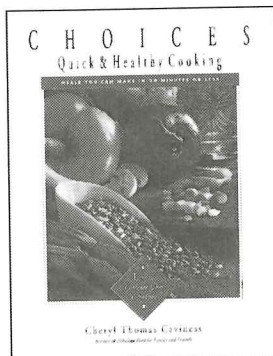
