

Up go the mini-lodges!

Situated on a hill overlooking Camp Go Seek's Lake Sandow (commonly known as the swimming lake) are two newly-framed minilodges, mirror images of each other. Thanks to many volunteers and a providential stretch of incredibly good fall weather, construction has progressed at record speed.

Building committee member **Dale Ziegele** says workers saved the conference roughly \$7,000 by pouring their own concrete in mid-October. A donation of all the steel also cut costs.

It was during the two framing bees in November, however, that the lodges really took shape. According to Ziegele, a total of about 45 volunteers—some in small groups from church districts—came to saw lumber and pound nails. Some stayed for a day or two; others, like **Raymond** ("Shorty") and Sharon Mundt (Tomahawk), stayed for up to three weeks to help.

Ziegele says he's pleased with the

turnout—even on days when the crew dipped down to a handful. "It's a busy time of year, crops are getting in, some are leaving for the winter."

The work schedule was intense: breakfast at 6:30, work till lunchtime, then back at it till supper, when cook **Linda Johnson** and her helpers would have ready the makings for haystacks and big servings of warm apple crisp.

Spirits were high the afternoon of Nov. 8, when the first back wall was hoisted into place. Just days later, *all* the walls were up.


On Sunday, Nov. 20, workers began roofing. That was when the only injury occurred: building chairman **Fred Miller** (Madison) tripped and cut his

hand on a saber saw. While there may be some nerve damage, no bones were broken, and wife Sandy says he's "doing fine."

From here, says Ziegele, "the project will continue at a more deliberate rate." Fred and camp ranger **Jim Johnson** will coordinate the remaining steps.

The completed 6,000-square-foot "mini" lodges will be available for year-round use by church, school, Pathfinder and conference groups.

Both lodges' upper and lower levels afford excellent views of the lake. "I never knew it was so pretty here," one worker commented.

n Sunday, Nov. 6, in the third special constituency meeting in three years, members met at Wisconsin Academy and reaffirmed their strong support of the school, accepting the recommendation of the Wisconsin Conference Executive Committee to continue special financial assistance to WA for the 1995-1996 school year.

Wisconsin Conference President Arnold Swanson noted that the meeting was not held because of any crisis, but because constituents had voted in 1993 to hold another meeting this year to evaluate Wisconsin Academy's current enrollment and financial situation.

Newly-appointed Lake Union Conference President **Don Schneider** opened the session with a devotional and prayer. A 1960 graduate of Wisconsin Academy himself, Elder Schneider stated, "I found Jesus at Wisconsin Academy."

Principal **Steve Brown** presented his report on the school, which included two videos—one of students and staff helping tornado victims in Big Flats, and another of the new packaging industry, which employs about 30 academy students.

Brown explained how Wisconsin Academy had far surpassed the expectations of many leaders at Test-Rite, the packaging company. Some number of projected orders for next year has been increased from 1.2 million to 1.6 million.

Brown also read a letter from yearbook evaluators who awarded WA the highest rating possible for last year's annual. They noted that while other religious schools seemed to try to "hide their faith" in their yearbooks, WA had not. "The community would be proud of this book," they said.

Applause erupted during the meeting at least three times: first after hearing Zurcher's letter; then when it was

had wondered at first why students would want to do this kind of work. In a letter from Test-Rite vice president Frederic Zurcher, Brown read, "To the astonishment of the most resolute skeptics on the staff at Test-Rite, the Academy came through with flying colors from the very first shipment. . . . there was absolutely nothing to complain about." Because of the success of the first shipment, the

reported that 98% of all current students' accounts receivable had been collected by August 23, 1994; and again when **Louise Legreid**, Y.E.S. scholarship committee chair, thanked "a quiet group, many on fixed incomes," who send \$100 regularly to help worthy students.

After a brief discussion period, the constituents adjourned, for the first time ever, at noon.

Favorite activities: Collecting bells (I have over 100) and spending time with the grandchildren.




