Maranatha Miracle

On October 5, Maranatha volunteers converged on Camp Wakonda and twelve working days later, the "Fireside Lodge" stood framed, partially roofed and sided!

During those 12 days, almost 80 volunteers from 20 states and one Canadian province worked a miracle. Day one started with a flat slab of concrete. On the second day, volunteers were tipping up walls, and by day four they were setting the roof trusses. One volunteer commented, "We may be old, but we are like an army of ants. We just swarmed over the area and things happened."

Volunteers came from as far away as Alaska, California and Alberta, each paying for their own travel to spend 2 weeks working to make our dream a reality. For several, this was their first Maranatha project, while other volunteers had worked on 10-90 projects.

About 60 people from Wisconsin also participated in the building project, both during the time that the Maranatha team was present and during the work bee which followed. By the close of the work bee, the work on the roof was nearly completed, over half of the siding was on, and the windows were installed.

What was done in a few days by these dedicated volunteers could have taken many more weeks — and thousands more dollars — to complete. The Maranatha team worked 769 work days, putting in over 6152 working hours, all for no pay other than the joy of service.

There is much more work to be done before camp meeting comes around next summer, and you can become involved in this special project. We need your financial support, your help at work bees, and most importantly, your prayers as we work together to build a facility which will bless people of all ages who enjoy Camp Wakonda.

During the weekend of October 23-25, 108 members of Wisconsin churches traveled to South Bend, Indiana, for the Lake Union Conference Evangelism Training Workshop. They joined with 1100 other delegates at the Century Center for a full weekend of training, inspiration and fellowship.

Wisconsin has joined the General

Conference initiative, "2004, the Year of Evangelism" in encouraging every church, every school, every geographic region to be involved in public evangelism beginning on September 11, 2004. Our faith goal for Wisconsin is one hundred and fifty reaping evangelistic meetings in 2004. This will require many trained lay evangelists as well as our pastors and conference office workers to lead out in meetings.

We learned during Hope for the Homeland that our lay evangelists were very competent in conducting meetings. The meetings in 2004 will be much more effective if people are positively impacted by the ministries of our church *before* evangelism begins.

On Saturday night, Elder Walter Wright, Lake Union President, led out in a recognition service for

those who had led out in Hope for the Homeland lay evangelism. Mark Graham, an elder in the Rice Lake Church who had just finished an evangelistic meeting in Rice Lake, gave his testimony of how Hope for the Homeland changed him, his church and their view of mission: He reported that soulwinning was becoming more of a way of life for the elders of the church in Rice Lake - "We need to be more involved in winning souls and the business of the church will take care of itself," he shared enthusiastically.

In the Sunday morning commitment service, participants pledged that they would begin their labors to prepare for 9/11/04 and the largest evangelistic endeavor ever in the Wisconsin Conference.

Wisconsin Evangelism 2003

Watertown, Minocqua, Birchwood and Rice Lake host meetings

Although the year 2003 is not a year of emphasis for evangelism in the Adventist church worldwide, several churches in Wisconsin are not letting the year end without hosting meetings to share the gospel with their community. The Adventist churches in Watertown, Minocqua, Birchwood, and Rice Lake spent significant time this autumn preparing for and hosting evangelistic meetings with encouraging results.

Pastor Ric Swaningson of Watertown spoke at meetings in the Hawk Center in Watertown. Pastor Swaningson's meetings on Adventures in Prophecy drew in about 30-40 participants nightly, which was a significant number for a small community like Watertown. At the end of the series, Pastor Swaningson had the privilege to baptize 9 new members into the church. He noted, "This is huge growth for the Watertown church. This has more than doubled the active membership of the church."

The Adventist church of Minocqua also held Bible Prophecy seminars for the community during the fall. Pastor Christian Ronalds, the speaker and pastor of the Minocqua church, expressed pleasure at an excellent turnout of 6 or more visitors each night. The series resulted in 4 baptisms, 2 re-bap-

tisms, and 5 individuals who expressed an interest in studying for baptism.

In the north woods of Birchwood, two church elders and their wives hosted the New Beginnings evangelistic series which deals with prophecy as well as church doctrines. Larry and Kathy Beyreis and Pam and Dan Ringwelski spent considerable time preparing for the series which averaged 8-10 visitors nightly and featured a nightly health nugget at the beginning of each meeting.

In Rice Lake, church elders Jim Wright, Mark Graham, and Bob Simonson led a prophecy seminar based on Doug Bachelor's materials, although the three had to write all of their own sermons. Though there were no immediate baptisms, 3 women are attending the Rice Lake church regularly and have begun studying the Bible with Jim Wright.

Why Does Our School System Exist?

They were asked to do more than to work to raise the level of their student's academic achievement this school year. While academic achievement is important, this is not the most significant reason for the existence of our schools. The main purpose of having our children in Adventist schools is to help them build a love relationship with Jesus Christ so that they will want to develop their talents to their utmost for Him.

This year all students in grades 5 through 8 were given the book *Messiah*. This book is different from the other textbooks they received, as it is theirs to keep and to highlight as they see fit. It is being used as a part of the curriculum, but at the end of the year, we hope that the students value the book so much that they will take it home and continue to use it as part of their devotions. Some of the teachers are using the book as a part of their Bible curriculum. Others are using it as an element of their morning worships. No matter how it is used, however, the purpose is to help the students learn about God's unconditional love for them so that they will want to develop their talents for Him.

Our children need to know that there is absolutely nothing they could ever do that would cause the Lord to love them any *more* than He already does. With this understanding, their natural reaction is a desire to serve Him. They also need to know that there is absolutely nothing they could ever do that would cause the Lord to love them any *less* than He already does. If they understand this, they will trust Him enough to turn to Him each time that they fall. They must learn that the Lord accepts them just the way they are, but that He loves them too much to leave them that way.

Wisconsin Happenings

Thirty Wisconians Make a Difference In Romania

While some individuals enjoy vacation time on luxurious Caribbean cruises or tours of European art, thirty Wisconsin church members chose to use their vacation time to conduct evangelism and construct a church in Sarmas. Romania. From October 2-15, members of the mission team spent their days laboring at the construction site and hosting a medical clinic in the village. Evangelistic meetings at the church for both children, youth, and adults filled the evenings, and the turnout for the meetings was very high. The Vacation Bible School was especially popular, averaging about 90 boisterous children per meeting by the week's close.

Although the culture and language of the Romanian church members was far different than that of the Americans, the mission team felt very welcome. "Never once did I ever feel that we were putting them out, whether it was my host family or anybody at the church," noted Pastor Bill Ochs of Madison. "They just went out of their way to be good hosts and take care of us."

Despite financial difficulties, the Romanians generously gave their own resources for the mission team. Pastor Jonathan Larssen of Madison shared, "Even though the Romanian church members were financially poor, they were rich in their close-knit families, their community, and their lifestyle. They gave sacrificially so that we could feel comfortable there." Kitty Crary, a member of the Vacation

Bible School team, also felt that the Romanians valued the simple pleasures more. "The children were just like children in America - loud and boisterous - but they appreciated the little things more, like the stickers we passed out and playing simple games. The people were so warm. Even while walking in the village, people would cross the street to shake your hand."

In addition to the evangelistic meetings and health clinics, the team from Wisconsin also left behind a special gift for the Romanians - \$24,000 to put towards the installation of a church furnace so that the Romanians could begin using the facility by the winter. The bulk of the money came from Wisconsin church members who did not get to see Romania for themselves, but felt impressed to donate money for the church building fund. Pastor Ochs stated, "It was very inspiring to see how our churches came forward to give. It wasn't only in Romania that we felt that generous spirit."
