New London Celebrates 125th Anniversary

On November 13 the New London church reached an amazing milestone–125 years of active service.

The church was organized in 1879 and has been recognized as *the missionary church*. Many members of the New London church became missionaries for the Adventist church.

The church building that was built for the original church family is still the home for the present church family.

When the New London Church was established, the nature of the Adventist work was different. In 1879, there were:

- 260 employees in the Adventist Church worldwide
- 640 churches

Today the world church has: About 175,000 employees 53,000 organized churches

Youth Ministry - Pure and Simple

Youth ministry begins in the home. Christian parents showing loving relationships paint the first pictures of Jesus that children see. Parents have a profound impact on young people learning to love Jesus. Additionally they are the ones who lead their children to opportunities that allow others to also show and share Jesus. Many "traditional youth ministries" are designed to support families to raise their children for Jesus. This collaborative effort of Adventist education, Pathfinders, Adventurers, summer camp, Sabbath School and church helps young people meet, get acquainted, and commit their lives to Jesus. Statisticians tell us that the more oppor-





tunities that young people are exposed to the higher likelihood that they will continue to follow Jesus as adults.

Youth Ministry - Wisconsin


In Wisconsin we have 1875 young people under the age of 21 who are part of our church family.** What an army of youth! Of those 1,081, are between the ages of 8 and 18. The good news is that of these 1,081 youth, 429 have made the decision to follow Jesus as baptized members of the Seventh-day Adventist Church. That's 40%. The flip side is that 60% have not yet made that decision. We have a mission field right here in our state among our youth. From the graph below it is clear that most of our young people who get baptized are baptized by the age of 14. This is both a blessing and a challenge. We need to continue youth ministry to these

younger youth, and find ways to more effectively lead our older youth to Jesus.

Youth Ministry - Meeting the Needs

During 2005 we are providing more opportunities to reach young people.

- * Through the collaboration of our Education Department we are continuing to provide quality education that has as its focus leading youth to Christ.
- * Through our Children's Ministries Department we are providing training to our youth Sabbath School leaders at the spring Sabbath School Workshop. (April 3).
- * Through Pathfinders and Adventurers young people are guided on a week by week basis to be active in service and growing in Jesus.
- * Through weekend events such as our public high school retreat, our conference/academy youth rally, and regional youth rallies around the state young people are brought together and challenged to love and serve Jesus.



* Through our summer camps youth join together for outdoor and nature activities that lead them close to committed and caring staff members whose highest goal is to lead campers to Christ.

Youth Ministry - Goals for 2005

- * Currently we have 18 Pathfinder clubs, and 4 Adventurer clubs. Our goal by the end of 2005 is to have 21 Pathfinder clubs and 6 Adventurer Clubs
- * To have a conference-wide youth rally sponsored by the Youth Department and Wisconsin Academy (April 29, 30)
- * To have at least 2 regional youth rallies around the conference. Locations and dates to be announced later
- * To have a public high school retreat at Wakonda to minister specifically to the majority of our young people who are not in our Adventist schools. (January 14-16)
- * To have at least 10% growth in our summer camp attendance
- * The Youth Director provide weeks of prayer in 6 of our elementary schools
- * To continue effective young people's programs at camp meeting, with special emphasis on strengthening the Young Adult department
- * To lend support to the JAHWA federation for our Spanish speaking youth (Retreat October 14-16)
- * To provide training opportunities for our youth leaders

What is the Future of the Work in Wisconsin?

An interview with our President, Elder Don Corkum



A key element of our issue on the future of our church is the President's

perspective. He provides leadership and direction to the work throughout the state.

The LampLetter interviewed Elder Corkum regarding his vision for the future.

Editor: The year 2004 is nearly past—2005 is upon us. What is the future for the Wisconsin Conference?

Corkum: We have sought that our plans and programs be an expression of God's will. We have spent significant time in prayer both in the office and out in the field with our pastors and lay leaders. We are living in significant times. God has laid some plans on our hearts for these times.

Editor: What are the major events in the Conference during 2005?

Corkum: We have some truly significant events for the whole conference during this calendar year. In addition to our Men's and Women's Ministry Conventions, our Elders and Public High School Retreats and Summer Camp Programs, there are some wonderful training events in store for 2005:

- Small Group training will convene on February 11-13 at Camp Wakonda. Milton Adams, a pastor from Oregon who is immersed in Small Group Ministry himself, will be our trainer.
- Church Planting Training will be the featured training for March 19-21 in the Greater Milwau-

kee area. Tom Evans, Church Planting director for the Texas Conference will bring some of his team members with him to give us the latest inspiration and insights.

- Natural Church Development will be the focus at our elder's retreat this year. It will continue to be an important part of our consultation with churches throughout the coming year.
 - Camp Meeting will be a major event of 2005. Our theme is, "Transformed in Christ" which is identical to the General Conference theme for 2005 in St. Louis. Our featured speakers will be Walter Wright of our own Lake Union; Mike Tucker, the new speaker for Faith for Today; Stephanie-Dawn, gifted gospel musician; Shawn Boonstra, new speaker for It is Written television; Randy Maxwell, Don Morgan on Health; Ranko Stephanovic from the Andrews University Theological Seminary and many other seminars and presenters. It will be a great program this year.
- Our education program features some major events
 particularly at Wisconsin
 Academy. Their recent "Walk
 through the Bible Lands"
 display, Alumni and Graduation
 weekends are tremendous
 events in the lives of our youth.
- There is ongoing training in public evangelism throughout the year in various regions of the conference. The Lake Union will sponsor another such training event August 26-27 in Merrillville, Indiana.

Editor: I'm sure you have plans and dreams for the future—What

are your dreams for our Churches?

Corkum: I see our church members transformed in Christ in this coming year. I long for the expres-

sions of joy and gratitude on the faces of our people during this coming year as



Christ leads us into passionate spirituality and loving relationships. These two strong emphases are something we all need. Our religion must never become mechanical and rigid with only rules. We need a deep abiding sense of the presence of Christ that can alone transform the soul. We also need loving relationships and mutual respect and caring. In the heart of



Jesus, this would be the greatest evidence of discipleship, the love we have for one another.

I would like to see three areas of common

growth in each of our churches;

- 1. Involved youth
- 2. Inspirational worship
- Churches and members who are engaged with their community.

A Vision for Stewardship for 2005

I have attended too many Church Board meetings and Conference Executive Committee Meetings over the years where the questions were:

"How are we going to meet these needs with the funds we have."

"Which of these good programs are we going to have to postpone or drop because we don't have the money to carry them through to completion?"

"Which pastorates or departments are going to have to be dropped?"

I've also been told, "Oh, you just need more faith—the money will come in." I wouldn't deny that may have been the case sometimes. If we were absolutely sure of God's direction, He would have provided.

One of the ways God gives direction to us is to withhold funds for projects we've dreamed up that are not His will at the moment. I think it is also fiscally responsible for a board to say we'll proceed with this direction if and when God provides the funds. Otherwise, we may be presuming God's blessing.

I know also that sometimes God makes His will clear but lets us move forward before He completely opens the way. It is similar to the Israelites at the Red Sea—God only parted the waters when their feet got wet.

My vision for stewardship for Wisconsin is that each of us be so close to Jesus that our lives, including all our assets, would be available to Him. How wonderful it would be if each member's faith was such that first of all, we return our tithe to Him, trusting Him to meet our needs and fulfill His promises to bless us and reward our faithfulness. I am saddened when I think of a significant portion

of our members who are not seeing God's miraculous provision:

- After tithing, He stretches the remaining 90% of our money to meet our needs
- He helps us change our priorities in our home budgeting

His miracles build our faith and will help sustain in the times ahead.

I have often thought about what it would mean to our church leadership on all the levels if we could experience the following:

"If all, both old and young, would do their duty, there would be no dearth in the treasury. If all would pay a faithful tithe, and devote to the Lord the firstfruits of their mercies, there would be a full supply of funds for His work. EGW{AU Gleaner, December 14, 1904 par. 1}"



God is not short on funds. The Bible says "For every beast of the forest is mine, and the cattle upon a thousand hills." Psalm 50:10. Sometimes we forget that all we have is His and we need to be listening to Him so when He desires it, we make it available.

Wouldn't it be incredible when opportunities came up and we knew God was leading, we could say, "Go for it—the money is in hand." What if we could spend most of the time of our meetings seeking God's direction and planning outreach rather than

trying to figure out how to pay the bills.

My dream is that we might find and experience the following..



God requires no less of us than He required of His people anciently. His gifts to us are not less, but greater, than they were to Israel of old. His service requires, and ever will require, means. The great missionary work for the salvation of souls is to be carried forward. In the tithe, with gifts and offerings. God has made ample provision for this work. He intends that the ministry of the gospel shall be fully sustained. He claims the tithe as His own, and it should ever be regarded as a sacred reserve, to be placed in His treasury for the benefit of His cause, for the advancement of His work, for sending His messengers into "regions beyond," even to the uttermost parts of the earth. 2004 Finances - Heading to the Finish Line

The year 2004 is almost history. From an accounting standpoint, we have two months of financial data yet to record, that of November and December. Our tithe gain as of October is 5.39%, which leads the Union. However, this increase includes one extra Sabbath as compared to the same period last year. When discounted for the extra Sabbath we have a 3.02% gain over last year. Given the state of the economy in the Midwest we praise God for the gain.

Included in this report you will note an "Income & Expense Summary" which will give you a thumb-nail view of the Conference operation. As you compare totals, you may want to note that actual income and expenses compares quite favorably to budget. I might also point out that as you look at operating costs for 2004 as compared to 2003 you can see that we have been able to contain or in many cases reduce operating expense in

a number of categories. This is good news in that we could end the year in an improved financial position compared to what we anticipated.

On the challenging side, our employees did not received a 1.2% inflationary cost of living raise in July as many of their counterparts did in other conferences. We will seek to make this up in 2005. Also, Wisconsin Academy experienced a

Corkum: We want to provide lay pastor training and certification for our elders in particular. We believe this will cause our people to be more involved in shepherding and outreach ministry. We would like to provide more training and experience in small groups. Thriving small fellowship groups are the common denominator for most growing churches in North America.

As we look to the future: one of the greatest challenges facing our conference is how to fund Christian education; both on the local level as well as conference level. Almost 60% of our children do not have the privilege of attending one of our schools. How does one communicate the value of Christian education to the parents of this 60%? What price can one put on having our children in an environment where moral and spiritual values are part of the learning experience? In light of the times in which we live is this important? I think so!

We will give a more complete financial report after year end.

Our Vision For Education 2005

As the year 2004 draws to a close it is time to take stock; it is time to ask questions . . . Where do we stand? Have we reached our goals? Have we reached the standards the Lord desires for us to meet?

We have seen our opening enrollments decline in recent years. Our opening 2004 enrollment dropped 13% from the previous year. The largest portion of that decline was due to a drop of 21% in the academy enrollment. It is true that we had an extremely large senior class graduate in May, but that still does not totally account for the large drop that did occur.



In November of 2003 An Education Taskforce was formed. The purpose of the taskforce was

to provide recommendations for the K-12 Board to consider as they planned for the future of education in the Wisconsin Conference. Several things have happened as a result of those recommendations:

- A phone survey of church members with children was conducted so that we could gain a clear picture of how the constituency felt about our educational program.
- Each year every K-10 school in the conference which is not going to have a full evaluation will be conducting a study and developing their own objectives for improvement to better meet the needs of their constituency.
- The Lake Union Conference has granted us a three year subsidy totaling \$45,000 for development. A substantial portion of that money has been

set aside for recruitment purposes. Study is being given to the best way to use the balance.

At the August workers meeting,



pastors and teachers met together to discuss the importance of mutual support in

the total ministry of the church and to see how both groups can work to prepare our children for the kingdom.

Every school has been asked to form their own school marketing committee to seek ways to build enrollment by appealing to constituent parents and reaching out to the community.

We learned some important lessons from the parental survey that was conducted:

- Children today have a much larger say in where they will attend school.
- The parents are not sure that our small schools can provide the quality education that the large better funded public schools can provide.
- Parents have become consumers who are looking more for convenience, the lowest cost, and their child's desire for more extracurricular activities.

There is encouraging news for concerned parents:

- Academic achievement test scores in our school system have improved steadily over the past four years.
- Testing has shown that academically, our schools are in the top 23% of all schools nationwide (that includes both

public and private schools).

Low cost and convenience does not usually provide us with the **best** of any-



thing. Most anything that is in our best interest requires effort and sacrifice.

The Conference Education Marketing Committee is working to change misconceptions and to open parents' and students' eyes to the times in which we live. We have a vision that includes:

- 1) Having a much higher percentage than the present 40% of our children enrolled in our schools.
- 2) Seeing schools opening in new areas and schools reopening in areas where interest has waned.
- 3) Parents realizing that our schools (though small) provide just what our youth need, a quality education and every opportunity to meet their Savior, Jesus Christ.
- Providing for all academy age youth-not just those who are college bound. We need to provide vocational training for those who are so inclined.
- 5) Each of our schools seeking to determine the needs of their constituency and doing everything in their power to meet those needs.
- 6) Funds being provided so that every family who wants their children to get a quality education and meet Jesus will be able to enroll their children in

our schools no matter what their financial situation is.

- Sending recruiters to every home to help families work through any problems which are keeping their children from attending our schools.
- Each local marketing committee working to see that every constituent child possible is enrolled in one of our schools.

We must realize that the times in which we live are perilous for us and our youth. Jesus Christ is coming again! We have no time to waste. We must prepare ourselves and the children God has given us to meet Him when He comes. He has given everything for us—Let's not disappoint Him when He comes for His children.

We must remember:

Is there a Future for Public Evangelism?

In the mid-1980's, there was a sentiment among some Christians that the day for public evangelism in North America was finished—Scores of pastor and lay evangelists in Wisconsin would be inclined to disagree.

In 2002, we launched Hope for the Homeland with over 70 public evangelistic meetings in one year. God blessed our Conference with over 330 baptisms as a direct result of that initiative.

But public evangelism is not a stand alone event:

- It works best where there is a solid Church School with dedicated Christian teachers
- It works best where members have been active giving Bible studies in the Community
- It works best where there has been Health Ministry outreach and people know the Adventist Church is seeking their best good
- It works best where church members have been praying and laboring consistently in sowing the gospel seed.

Public Evangelism can be best understood as a counterpart to harvest time on the farm. Farmers don't try to harvest where no seed has been sown.

Growing churches seem to follow a cycle of activities in their body life:

- Revival—Growing churches schedule, pray and plan for a deliberate time of revival and passionate spirituality
- Training and Equipping—In growing churches, 60-80% of the members are active in ministry and there is a deliberate process of training to increase effectiveness
- 3. Outreach—Growing churches reach out to their communities. Through health ministries, community services, Bible studies, cooking schools, and C.H.I.P. programs, new people are brought into the church's orbit of influence
- Harvest Evangelism—Growing churches invite people to make decisions for Jesus and His Church based on Bible truth

 Nurture—Growing churches plan on an effective plan of nurture for new and existing believers. This often includes small group ministries, visitation programs, and spiritual guardian relationships.

Surveys have discovered that growing churches plan their events out over an eighteen to twenty-four

month cycle . . . and then they start it all over again.

We are helping an increasing number of pastor and layevangelists to grow in their skills and efficiency. Is God calling you to be one of their number?
