God's Providence for this Time

Editors Note: As we go to press, the City of Sun Prairie has requested that the sale of our Conference Office property in Sun Prairie be delayed until January 3. 2007. The reason for the delay is final work on the city's Tax Incentive Financing (TIF) District that they wanted in place prior to finalizing the sale. Our Conference leaders have accepted their request in good faith and have therefore granted the request. We will keep you informed of progress on our website http:\\wi.adventist.org and through announcements delivered to your pastor.

In 1995, the State of Wisconsin announced their plans to widen and improve Highway 151N in the City of Sun Prairie. In accordance with State Statute, they sent a formal notice to property owners who might be impacted by the decision. As Secretary of the Conference Corporation, Elder Richard Habenicht received this notice. His responsibilities include property management as well as the buying and selling of church properties. Habenicht attended the announced meeting with State officials and received notice that the proposed widening of the highway would result in the State taking over a portion of the Conference office property.

'dabenicht reviewed the details of the original land purchase in 1975 wherein the Conference secured the land for \$3000 per acre or roughly 7 cents per square foot.

He contacted a commercial realtor and an appraiser to give him an informal idea of the value of the property in 1995. They both suggested that the farmland had risen in value and could yield close to \$1.00 per square foot. Habenicht continued to attend State and City of Sun Prairie meetings on the subject of the highway development. He also began to talk to individuals in the business of commercial real estate. One of these contacts suggested that it might be wise to secure a development plan for the property through a company he knew. This might result in a higher value for the land when the time came for the State to take the property they needed for their right of way.

Habenicht reported his findings to President Don Corkum and then Secretary-Treasurer Brian Hamilton. They realized that the Conference property would have greater value to the State and to commercial development if it were treated as a block together with the property of the Sun Prairie Community Church. Our administrators therefore recommended to the Executive Committee a plan:

- That we enter into discussion with the Sun Prairie Community Church and ascertain if they would be willing to place their property in a block with ours for development.
- 2. That we secure a development plan for the two properties.

The leaders of the Community Church were willing to participate in this process. The Conference, therefore, secured a development plan for the two properties for \$10,000. The Community Church paid one third of the cost.

Habenicht continued to attend meetings with State and City officials and told the City of the interest in development. He asked the City's Planning Department what their thoughts were for the Conference office area. He had the development firm write up three possible plans for our properties and brought all three to the City's Planning office and asked them which plan they preferred for this land. The City of Sun Prairie Planning Department chose one of

the plans as being very close to their concept for development in that area. From that time on, the City of Sun Prairie included our development plans on their maps for future development! The Executive Committee voted to list the Conference office property for sale in 1998. They listed it as a commercial real estate property at the high end for pricing for such property in 1998.

In 2002, the State of Wisconsin sent adjusters to secure the property for the expansion of Highway 151N. Elder Habenicht met with this team and made plain that we wanted a fair price for our land and would like this settled without the intervention of the courts or lawyers. The State made a preliminary offer for about 5 acres of land that was quite low. Elder Habenicht, in consultation with Administration and the Executive Committee, provided evidence of the development plan, the listing of the property for sale, and the inclusion of the development plan on the City of Sun Prairie's Planning Office documents. The adjusters acknowledged that the value of the land was much higher than they had first estimated and made a revised offer of \$5.95 per square foot plus additional compensatory payments. This was a six-fold increase in the estimated value of the property in 1995. The Executive Committee of the Conference accepted this offer, which resulted in \$1.5 million dollars for the land, which was taken by the State for their highway expansion.

In 2003, the City of Sun Prairie indicated that they might have potential buyers for the block of land including the Conference property. Habenicht again entered into careful talks with City planners and the Conference Executive Committee and Administration.

When negotiations were completed, the Conference signed an offer to sell our remaining property for five million dollars! This offer to purchase is scheduled to close on January 3, 2007. Until the sale closes, nothing is certain.

In God's Providence, these potential funds may be coming at a time of great need:

- The dormitories at Wisconsin Academy need renovation.
- The operating reserves of the Conference have been reduced due to unforeseen expenses and lowered enrollment at Wisconsin Academy.
- There was no funding available for growth initiatives to make our conference larger and stronger.
- There were no funds to fulfill Christ's Commission to preach the gospel through all the world.

"As we look back over the circumstances surrounding this sale, it seems as if an Unseen Hand has been guiding these events to assist us in our work," stated Habenicht. We pray that God's manifest leading in the work of the Conference might strengthen the work and empower us. May we continue to be faithful that the Lord might bless us.

Conference Building Fund

For many years, the Wisconsin Conference of Seventh-day Adventists has experienced a rate of growth indicating an upward trend. A trend we would not want to see going in any other direction.

To accommodate all the new members, it is sometimes necessary to enlarge existing facilities or purchase new church facilities. Typically, the Conference is involved with this process and even provides financial assistance (with the vote of the Executive Committee) to the local church for the acquisition of a new facility.

This year it seems like there is an unprecedented number of new church building projects being started. The challenge for the Conference has become how to fund all the requests that are coming in. The Conference funds available for these types of projects come from non-tithe dollars contributed from folks all around the conference. The nontithe dollars contributed are getting smaller and smaller which means the pool of funds available for conference building project assistance is dwindling.

The Executive Committee took a careful look at the policy of providing church building assistance and has taken an action which our congregations should keep in mind as they plan for the future. The Executive Committee has placed a temporary freeze on the Church Building Assistance Fund. For those congregations who have already begun their projects, assistance will still be provided. Any new projects will not have the benefit of Conference help. When the pool of funds available for assistance has been rebuilt to an appropriate balance, the Executive Committee will provide notification that funds are available again.

Thank you for your support of the Wisconsin Budget program. May the Lord bless us as we strive to make our houses of worship a place that is inviting and warm!

- Recognize School Teachers
