Rediscovering our Roots: Camp M



The first Seventh-day Adventist Camp Meeting in Wisconsin met in the late 1860's. Church leader (and later Wisconsin Conference President) Isaac Sanborn offered the use of his cow pasture east of Janesville. Invitations to attend were posted in the *Review and Herald*, and a big tent was ordered for \$16.

While organizers hoped to see forty tents pitched around the main meeting site, only twelve families roughed it in tents. Others stayed in nearby homes.

Adventist founders Uriah Smith and James and Ellen White came from Battle Creek, Michigan, to speak. Later, W.C. White labeled this experimental gathering the "forerunner of camp meetings."

A freezing camp meeting in late September, 1869, convinced Wisconsin Adventists that camp meeting is meant for warm weather! Leaders voted unanimously to hold future meetings in mid-summer.



etings of the Past



Since those early days, Wisconsin camp meetings have been held in 52 different cities. From 1927-1977, the "tent city" was pitched at Portage. For the next two years, meetings were held at Wisconsin Academy until cabins could be moved to the present location at Camp Go Seek.

The above picture was taken at the 1912 Wisconsin Camp Meeting at Wausau. The picture below is of the 1920 Camp Meeting in

Madison. Both pictures reflect the spirit and faith of our Church fathers and mothers.

Please plan to attend our 125th Camp Meeting Anniversary--and feel free to dress in historical period costume! As the 1867 Review notice read, "If you are discouraged, come, and be encouraged and revived. . . . If you feel strong in the Lord, come, and grow stronger. . . . And if you think you cannot spare the time, you are the very one that needs to come."







Special Offerings for Operation Amigo

The Lake Union continues its plans to build churches and a new school in its sister union, the Dominican Republic. Two special offerings will go toward these projects.

On May 29, a union-wide offering will be taken for the new church school at San Francisco de Macoris. Present facilities are so poor that the government is threatening to close them. Building the new eight-grade school will require an offering of \$65,000.

On June 19, a special offering at Camp Meeting will be taken. These funds are to help build churches in Santiago. With help from Maranatha Volunteers International, which joined Operation Amigo in April, churches can be built for about \$5,000 each.

Please give unselfishly May 29 and June 19.




New church site in Santiago, halted for lack of funds.

STEWARDSHIP REPORT

TITHE AND MISSION GIVING REPORT

Here's good news from Ken Wright, new Secretary-Treasurer: The Wisconsin Conference shows a tithe gain of 8.81% for the first quarter of 1993 compared with the first quarter of 1992. Mission giving during the same period is up by 3.21%.

"It really makes me happy to see how God's faithful people here in Wisconsin support the world-wide work of the Seventh-day Adventist Church through their tithes and offerings," Wright said.

About 53% of the total tithe returned stays in Wisconsin, according to Wright. These tithe funds pay the salaries of pastors and conference workers. A portion of tithe goes to Wisconsin church schools and Wisconsin Academy Bible teachers.

The General Conference receives 20% of tithe for the world work of the church. Another 10% goes to the Lake Union for its' leadership and assistance to the five local conferences--Illinois, Indiana, Lake Region, Michigan and Wisconsin. Literature evangelism receives 3.5% and Andrews University 2%.

Living here in Wisconsin are 40 retired church workers who receive monthly checks from the retirement fund. "We send almost 10% of our total tithe to the retirement fund," Wright said. "Provision was made for the Levites in Bible times, and I believe the Lord wants His church to continue to assist those who have dedicated their work career to His service."

Does he expect to someday collect retirement too?

"I really hope the Lord comes before that!"

WISCONSIN BUDGET REPORT

If you look at the total Wisconsin Budget income on the Church Report, you will see that we received \$49,155.00 in the first three months of 1993. The Bar Chart total of \$53,258.00 includes \$4,103.00 which was sent directly to the Academy. This figure came too late to be included in the Church Report.

Since our goal for the first three months was \$104,423.00, you can quickly see that we raised just a little over half of what we needed. This presents a challenge and this is why many of us are giving two per cent (2%) of our income for Wisconsin Budget. If those who are supporting this Conference offering would increase their giving and those who may not have been including Wisconsin Budget in their giving would step out in faith and give even 1/2 of one per cent, we could reach our goal.

USE OF WISCONSIN BUDGET FUNDS:

The biggest share of the Wisconsin Budget offering goes for Worthy Student Scholarships, Operating Subsidy and Capital Improvements for Wisconsin Academy. Evangelism across our state and Conference appropriation to local church building projects are also a part of Wisconsin Budget offerings.




