Pathfinder Fair





Break In and Vandalism Devastate School

On Sunday morning, May 24, neighbors discovered a break in at the Sunnyside Seventh-day Adventist Elementary school. The school is located at 176 Tenth Street, rural Clear Lake. Every window was broken! The main door was opened after breaking the glass and undoing the lock.

Police suspect this was the work of more than one person. Principal, Linda Rosen, reports that, "Everything in the classroom was smashed. Student's desks were tipped over, the small microwave and refrigerator were tipped over with food scattered around the room; the fish tank was shattered with water everywhere; drawers were torn off of cupboards, pianos were shattered, the photocopier and even the walls were broken with baseball bats." Cans of paints from the maintenance area were dumped on the floor and even fire extinguishers were discharged to create the maximum chaos and damage.

Investigating police officers were heard to remark that this was, "the work of an angry person." Brian Hamilton, Risk Manager for the Church in Wisconsin, remarked, "This is tragic. This school exists for the benefit of the children. To devastate their classroom when there school year is so near to its close is hurtful."
