General Conference President Resigns

Silver Spring, Maryland, USA ... [ANN] Robert S. Folkenberg, president of the Seventh-day Adventist Church, announced his decision to resign at a specially-called meeting today (February 8) at the Church's World Headquarters in Silver Spring, Maryland. Folkenberg chose to personally inform staff of his decision to tender his resignation to the Church's Executive Committee.

Citing the controversy over allegations arising from an ongoing lawsuit, Folkenberg said that this was "detracting from God's work" and so in order "to avoid pain and conflict to my family and the church I love I am removing myself from the controversy." Concerns over business relationships with James Moore, the plaintiff in the lawsuit filed in Sacramento, California, had led the Church to set up, with Folkenberg's support, a special committee to address the church-related issues. This committee reported to the Church's Administrative Committee on January 27, 1999, which referred the issue to the Church's full Executive Committee, the body authorized to deal with such matters.

The son of missionaries, Folkenberg was born in Puerto Rico and grew up in the U.S. and Cuba. He began working for the Adventist Church as a pastoral intern in 1963 and has worked as evangelist, missionary

pilot, and in a wide range of leadership roles. He was elected president of the Adventist World Church in 1990, at its executive session in

the effective blending of cutting-edge technology and evangelism. He personally led in developing strategies to use satellite broadcasts and the Internet in gospel outreach. As the Church's "communication president," Folkenberg has devoted a significant portion of his time to visit and support the Church's mission around the world. He emphasized the active role of laity in ministry and witness as well as greater personal and professional accountability at all levels of the Church.

In his formal statement addressed to G. Ralph Thompson, secretary of the Executive Committee, Folkenberg said, "I will continue to give my all to advancing the mission of the church." According to the Church's working policy, Thompson now serves as acting president until a new president is




When teens are involved, there is energy and "they know computers, too!"

Text of Elder Folkenberg's Statement

"From my early childhood as the son of missionary parents in Inter-America, to my ministry as General Conference President, my entire life has been tirelessly and singlemindedly devoted to advancing the message and mission of the Seventh-day Adventist church. However, over the last few weeks it has become apparent to me that the controversy surrounding the allegations of James E. Moore, made in the context of his lawsuit against the church and me, is

detracting from God's work.
While I have repeatedly and publicly acknowledged mistakes in my dealings with Mr. Moore I rejoice that the integrity of my motives has not been called into question. However, to avoid additional pain and conflict to my family and the church I love I am removing myself from the controversy by tendering my resignation through you to the General Conference Executive Committee.

I will continue to give my all to advancing the mission of the church and I pray that through this action the church can maintain its focus on the task our Lord has entrusted to us."

Continued from page 1 a departmental leader, a teacher, and a college president.

A native of Norway, Paulsen becomes the first European to be president of the world Church. He has academic degrees from Andrews University in Michigan and Tubingen University in Germany.

The committee of 244 registered members from more than 90 countries met for the full day, with the entire committee serving as the nominating committee. They spent almost two hours discussing the qualifications they expected in a president, and turned to prayer on four occasions.

In the process of selecting a president, the committee considered more than 10 names and spent almost four hours in discussion.

During the morning, the committee heard a devotional message by George Brown, former president of the Inter-American Division of the Church, and a statement presented by Robert S. Folkenberg, former president of the world Church.

Folkenberg spoke approximately 30 minutes, thanking the committee for giving him the opportunity to lead the Church for more than eight years. He noted that church membership had grown from 6 million in 1990 to more than 10 million today, and that contributions to the Church now total more than \$1.5 billion a year.

After discussion, the committee voted to formally accept Folkenberg's February 7 resignation. A full text of Folkenberg's remarks is posted on the Seventhday Adventist Church's web site at www.adventist.org

Wisconsin Conference Wins Approval to Write Charitable Gift Annuities

The Planned Giving department was notified in December that its application to write charitable gift annuities has been approved by the Wisconsin Insurance Commission.

That notification marked the end of a year long project by the Planned Giving department to gain approval. Many states do not regulate the writing of charitable gift annuities, but Wisconsin does. This adds an excellent financial tool with which to serve our constituents.

Under the terms of a charitable gift annuity, the donor can contribute cash or stocks or other assets acceptable to the charity in exchange for a set amount of income for the rest of their life. This helps those who have a need for increased income while at the same time allowing them a current charitable deduction for part of the gift.

For example, Mrs. Member is 86 years old. She had two \$10,000 CD's accruing 5.0% giving her \$1,000 per year income. She would like to do something for the church, but really needs the income from the CD's. If she would get a charitable gift annuity for that \$20,000, she could be guaranteed 10.8 % (by all the assets of the issuing organization) for life or \$2,160 a year income. In addition, she would be allowed to claim a

charitable contribution of
\$10,800 in the year she
purchases the annuity.
This might provide
additional tax savings.
She would also have the
security of knowing that
even if expenses (nurs-
ing home, etc.) would
use up all her assets she
would always have this
income and know she
has done something for
the Lord's work.
