Grow, Grow, Grow

The Bible teaches that growth is a good thing, Christians expect that the Church should grow! When you think about it, many stories and teachings in Scripture suggest that growth is a necessity:

- The faithful servant in Matthew 25 turned five talents into ten talents
- The two talent servant earned two others to make four talents
- (John 15:8 KJV) "Herein is my Father glorified, that ye bear much fruit; so shall ye be my disciples." The fruit that Jesus here refers to is numeric evangelistic growth.
- The stone "cut out without human hands" in Daniel 2 "...becomes a great mountain, and filled the whole earth." This growing stone represented the growth of the kingdom of God.

All of these Bible stories reference growth as a key element of the kingdom of God. And we have much to praise the Lord for here in the Wisconsin Conference:

- Our pastors, evangelists teachers and lay people prayed and worked diligently for Jesus this past year and as a result God gave us 311 baptisms and professions of faith. This is about 80 more people joining the church in 2006 than in 2005. That is growth!
- We have new church plants in Waukesha Hispanic, Fond du Lac and Milwaukee Southside whose lights are shining for Jesus. That is growth!

- Fourteen church schools are ministering to 232 students in our K-10 school system.
 Wisconsin Academy welcomed 99 students at the beginning of this school year. This is an overall increase of 7% in our K-12 system. That is growth!
- Tithe dollars given in 2006 totaled \$6,807,600.64 This is an 8% gain when compared to 2005 (a significant part of this increase is a one time gain).

That is growth!

 We had more evangelistic meetings scheduled in 2006 than we had funding for (a great problem, by the way). We appealed to members to make gifts for evangelism a matter of prayer. You gave \$62,688 in evangelism offerings in 2006 compared to \$19,000 in 2005.

That is growth!

Our Hispanic membership has been hovering just under 500 members for a number of years. In 2006, Hispanic pastors conducted 14 evangelistic meetings baptizing 55 members. We now have a total of 557 believers worshiping in 14 Spanish churches, companies and fellowship groups each Sabbath in Wisconsin.

That is growth!

Growth can be measured in terms of the number of baptisms, the number of children in the church schools, and the amount of tithe or evangelistic offerings given. But there is a more important growth — Have we grown in our faithfulness to God?

We wish to thank you for your *faithfulness* in prayers and witness in helping the church grow.

We wish to thank you for your faithfulness in tithes and offerings in helping the church grow.

We wish to thank you for your faithfulness in Evangelism and Christian Education in helping the church grow.

"I'd like to thank each of you for your faithfulness to God's cause in Wisconsin. A lot of exciting things are happening – your faithful support allows us to do these things," states our treasurer, Roger Driver.

Thank you, God, for blessing our Conference with growth! May we be faithful to your calling and direction so that you can continue to shower your blessings upon us.

The Conference Office is Going, Going, . . . almost gone!

Our Conference Office property has not sold yet. We have not yet received money by which we plan to improve the dormitories at Wisconsin Academy and build a new Conference Office. What is happening?

The City of Sun Prairie again requested an extension of the offer to purchase until April 2, 2007. "The delay is due to difficulties in setting up of the TIF District (Tax Incentive Financing) by the City of Sun Prairie," reported Conference treasurer, Roger Driver. This is a complex enterprise and unforeen difficulties slowed down their progress."

The Conference has granted the extension with some conditions:

- The City must recognize that the value of the property has increased and pay an additional \$50,000 to reflect that increase in value.
- 2. The City must recognize that the Conference is at risk. We have begun the development process to build a new Conference Office in Columbia County before the City of Sun Prairie closes the deal and pays for the land. We have expended funds in good faith.
- 3. The City must pay \$150,000 in non-refundable *earnest money* to the Conference prior to the

closing date for the development of new office property.

The City of Sun Prairie has agreed to these conditions and has signed the modified offer to purchase. The Conference has now received the non-refundable check for \$150,000 from the City.

Driver stated, "It was necessary that negotiations between the City and all adjacent properties be completed before the sale was completed. That has been done. It now appears that we are on track to close the sale on April 2, 2007."

What Day Was That On?

Many of you may be wishing you had a simple way to know what events are taking place within the conference. That day has arrived. Through the auspices of the Lake Union Conference, the Wisconsin Conference now has a web-based calendar program available that allows our members the ability to log on and have access to the conference calendar anywhere you have an internet connection.

If you want to view the calendar, there are a few simple steps to follow. The system requires a user name and a password. Those will be provided to you at the end of this article. After logging in, you can view any month from September of 2006 through December of 2007. The events have been color coded. Once you find the event you are looking for, any subsequent events of the same type will appear in the same color. Always remember to LOG OUT when finished viewing the calendar.

Here are the steps you will need to follow to begin viewing the Wisconsin Conference calendar:

- Obtain an internet connection.
- 2. Type in www.luccalendar.org
- 3. At the Calcium login screen, click on the word "Login".
- At the username and password screen, type the following (lowercase): a. "wicon" (Name) Press tab key b. "wicon123" (Password) Click on Login
- 5. You will view a Calcium options for user screen.
- Click on the word "Wisconsin" shown on the left side in color.
- 7. The current month of the calendar will appear on the screen automatically.

- 8. If you want to view a different month, click on the desired month shown at the top of the calendar.
- View as much as you like. Changes will not be allowed so you can't hurt anything.
- 10.When finished viewing the calendar, scroll down to the bottom of any calendar page and click on the word "LOG OUT" shown on the right side. (IMPORTANT)

We hope you find this web-based calendar tool as useful as we have here in the Conference office.

As Good As You've Heard

The truth is, most people are surprised by the benefits of charitable tax planning. This is likely due, at least in part, to the fact that charitable tax planning strategies often make it possible to realize *multiple objectives*.

But the benefits do not end with the attractive annuity rate. Since, upon his death, the Gift Annuity contract becomes a gift to the charity, a number of charitable tax benefits accrue. A formula calculates the value of the ultimate gift to charity and provides for an immediate charitable income tax deduction. And when the Gift Annuity is funded with an appreciated asset, a portion of each annuity payment may be tax-free... further reducing tax liability.

If you'd like to see just how a Charitable Gift Annuity agreement might help you realize your objectives, simply call, write or fax your birth date, the amount of annuity you desire, and whether you'd like payments to be made for one or two lives. 

Wakonda means "set apart" but, at Camp Meeting time enough people are set apart to make up a small city; therefore, certain policies have been established to make getting along as smooth as possible.

A reminder of the policy is as follows: Balance due on 2007 noncabin reserved sites must be postmarked by April 1.

Cancellation: Full deposit transferred to 2008 until May 5; 50% transferred from May 5-26; No deposit transferred after May 26.

The Conference manages cabin subletting not individual cabin renters. If you have reserved a cabin and cannot attend Camp Meeting this year notify the Conference office (608-241-5235 ext 104). We have a list of folks waiting to sublet. Personal subletting is against policy resulting in forfeiting your right to re-rent.

Subletting cabins will be approved for no more than two years at which time the cabin will go to the next person on the Waiting List.

Site renters must be 20 years of age (or married) to rent a Camp Meeting site and willing to uphold the principles of the Adventist Church.

No person may add a sewer, water, gas, or electrical line or connection to any campsite unless it was originally provided by the camp.

It is against state and local law to discharge waste water (both gray and black) on to the ground.

All cabins must be reserved for the next Camp Meeting with ull payment by Wednesday evening of the current Camp Meeting.

By Wednesday evening of Camp Meeting, all non-cabin accommodations must be rerented by their present occupants for the next year. Failure to do so makes the site available to another on Thursday morning. To hold non-cabin sites, be prepared to pay 50% with balance due by April 1.

Refrigerators/ice boxes may not be left outside accommodations at the conclusion of Camp Meeting.

RV air conditioners are limited to the electrical amp service available to that site.

Camping in cars is not permitted.

No bicycles are allowed during camp Meeting.

Do not bring your pets to Camp Meeting!

If a cabin renter moves out of the Conference, or passes away, the accommodation will be assigned to the next person on the Waiting List, unless a Letter of Request form (available upon request) has been approved by the Camp Meeting Management Committee, thereby waiving the policy.

Locks and keys for cabins are maintained by the camp. A \$5 key deposit is required. Private locks will be removed.

There is a storage charge of \$75 to leave your camper on the grounds year round.

All personal equipment/furnishings left at camp are at the amper's risk. Cabins are rented to other campers throughout the year. Though respect for others property is encouraged, the

Conference/Campground is not responsible for items moved or misused.

Part time reservations are not taken until June 12. At that time call 608-296-2126.

2008 is the last year any conference tents will be pitched. 2007 and 2008 Rates are:

Full Service \$200 (\$220 w/ AC)


Fox was one of two Ministerial Directors to receive the award. Recipients are nominated by their peers in ministry in the North American Division.

New Light in Bankruptcy Proceedings

Congress can move quickly. In the last Lampletter, I mentioned the New York Federal Court denying debtors the right to pay tithe in their Chapter 13 bankruptcy proceedings. The family involved did not want to appeal the decision even if the appeal cost them nothing. However, Senate Bill S4044 was introduced on September 29, 2006 and became law on December 20, 2006 without the President's signature. This act amended Section 1325 of the Bankruptcy Code to restore the right to tithe that existed prior to the Bankruptcy Reform Act of 2005.
