Wisconsin Academy Celebrates One Hundredth Anniversary


Alumni and friends of Wisconsin Academy gathered on April 16 & 17 for a very special celebration—WA turns 100 years old this year.

Christian education on the Academy level began with Bethel in 1899. Walderly Academy operated in Hawthorne, WI from 1907-1928. In 1949, Columbus became the home for WA with a new campus and a new vision for educating our young people for Christian service.

For this celebration, over 1,200 people packed the campus. Featured events included:

- Danny Shelton told thrilling stories of God's providence and soul-winning through 3ABN
- Buz Menhardt made an appeal on Sabbath morning for reconsecration to Christ and scores of men and women responded
- Don Schneider took us down "memory lane" as alumni past and present shared their





recollections of life at Wisconsin Academy.

Fred and Sandy Miller told experiences of God's financial blessings when they committed themselves

to serve God with their finances. As Don Corkum gave the appeal, over \$147,000 was pledged or donated for the new cafeteria building (see story on p.6).

Even the Saturday night program brought surprises as the students beat the alumni in both women's and men's basketball (pictures on p.4-5)

THE LION'S ROAR

Recent dramatic events in Colorado and Kosovo illustrate the truthfulness of the text in 1 Timothy 5:

7, "Be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the devil, as a roaring lion, walketh about, seeking whom he may devour.

The kingdom of Satan is built on fear and destruction. Since the students were killed in Littleton, Colorado, a ripple of fear is spreading in schools across the United States. Threats of similar violence are occuring in many schools. The debacle of Kosovo is also causing anguish throughout our world The violence, bloodshed and terrorism so evident in our world is a result of kids allowing Satan's creative genius for evil to control their minds and hearts.

However, the devil's "lion roar" is only a counterfeit. As with Pharaoh in Egypt, he seeks to copy the miraculous power of God. In Amos 3:4, 5 the majestic, prophetic voice of God is referred to as a lion's roar. In Psalms 29 God's voice is depicted as thunder from the heavens.

While today activity from Satan's kingdom is causing fear and destruction, activity from God is causing hope, joy and renewed confidence among God's people. The overthrow of communism in eastern Europe and the opening of Cuba to the gospel is bringing encouragement. Stories from India and China will be heard the first weekend of Wisconsin campmeeting bringing a sense of triumph. The networking of satellite evangelism around the world is a clear illustration of how the "loud cry" of the three angels of Revelation 14 is being heard.


Wisconsin Teams Earn Second Place in Lake Union Bible Bowl














Together We Can!






On WA's Alumni weekend, the first public invitation was made for this project. Fred and Sandy Miller of the Madison Church are project chairpersons. As they made the appeal, the Lord impressed people to pledge or give over \$147,000.

This means that the project now totals nearly \$450,000!

Today Is The Day Of Miracles

It is easy to conceive that the miracle-working power of God only operates in Bible times or in the mission field. However since the beginning of the "Together We Can" project we are collecting our own stories of God's intervention and provision.

The raising of one million dollars in Wisconsin for an academy cafeteria is a big endeavor. Many churches and families are already stretched to meet their operating commitments. How then can we add to that challenge?

Philippians 4:19 says, "my God shall supply all your need according to His riches in glory by Christ Jesus." God has the resources to supply funds over and above our regular commitments. This is being evidenced.

One family has reported that they made a sacrificial commitment and knew it would stretch them to fulfill it. One week later they were notified that they had been named in a will and would be receiving more than what was needed to fulfill their commitment. They praise the Lord for His help.

Another couple reports that following their commitment, sales from their company dramatically increased, supplying funds way over and beyond their pledge. This couple made a second commitment and amazingly they had an extra-large tax return exceeding the amount of their commitment.

Another person made an initial pledge but stated she hoped she could do more. She made it a subject of prayer. A few weeks later she was notified that she had overpaid her taxes in the previous year and the refund with interest would make it possible to give a larger donation.

Others haven't seen dramatic evidences but sense the presence

of God as they are able to meet their commitment month by month. It is like the oil of the widow of Zarephath that did not fail to supply her need.

Creative projects are also helping to realize the objective. A member from the Oconto church has made a compact disc of 80 books and materials from Adventist pioneers. He is making a donation from the sale of each of these discs to the cafeteria project. This is a tremendous resource and for those who would like to purchase one, you may contact the ABC.

This project will be successful as we all participate and do our part for His cause. It's not equal giving but equal sacrifice that God blesses most. Join with hundreds of others and see how God's miraculous power can come and supply our need. This will honor God and bless our youth with improved facilities for their center of learning and training.

To date we have received pledges for \$450,000. At the same time, to the end of March, we were almost 8% ahead in tithe; and giving to SS offerings and WI budget are all higher than the previous year. God will bless over and above our needs when we prioritize His work.
