# Hope for the Homeland—Wisconsin Style

Just weeks after "9-11," Church leaders in the Michigan Conference began a plan to inspire hope for Americans. On the one-year anniversary of the attack on the World Trade Center, they conceived that every Adventist church in Michigan would open its doors to a public series of meetings entitled, *Hope for the Homeland*. Hope for the Homeland (HFTH) would be more than another evangelistic meeting:

- HFTH would be a sharing of the Advent message of hope
- HFTH would uplift Jesus, our only hope in these last days
- HFTH would offer eternal security to people who had seen their sense of well-being demolished before their eyes along with the World Trade Center

When Elder Gordon Retzer, President of the Lake Union Conference, learned of these plans, he shared these plans with the other conference presidents within the Lake Union. They were glad to respond to his invitation to join Michigan in this outreach.

So Hope for the Homeland became a focal point of activity:

- September 13 (yes, Friday the 13th—not superstitious, are you?) would be the opening night for over 500 evangelistic meetings in the Lake Union
- Over 200 of these evangelistic meetings would be conducted by lay men and women
- Over 2.5 million brochures

- would be mailed to households the week of September 13
- Whether measured by commitment of finances or of personnel, this would be the largest evangelistic endeavor in the Lake Union's History



our November elders' retreat introduced a new technology for sharing the gospel—DVD disks have been developed which contain a full evangelistic series called, "New Beginnings." This series provides world class presentation capability to our lay people (20+ elders volunteered to hold evangelistic meetings in 2002)

We asked the pastors in January how many evangelistic meetings they intended in 2002. They responded that they intended to have 108 evangelistic meetings conducted by themselves, lay people, Conference office staff or visiting evangelists in this calendar year!

### How is Wisconsin Involved?

The Lord is preparing our pastoral work force for this outreach:

- In August of 2001, nearly our entire pastoral force took training in Microsoft PowerPoint to prepare for holding their own evangelistic series
- The Lake Union has made available \$2,000 grants for evangelistic equipment to pastors. The catch is that a pastor who applies for the grant must conduct an evangelistic series within 12 months. We have benefited with 12 pastors receiving this grant and holding their own evangelistic series

# The Presidential View Another Pentecost



On April 1 Greg and Lesa Budd came and led out in the worship time at the conference office. They are giving inspirational

leadership to prayer ministry in the conference and on this day they brought two seniors from the academy. The seniors shared their recent spiritual journey of how God has blessed their lives and given them a new focus for living. They prayed with us and they prayed for us.

Several weeks prior, I attended one of the evenings of the week of prayer at the academy and witnessed how students were leading out in prayer groups with all the students participating. It was thrilling to see students witnessing to students. It is evident that the power of the Holy Spirit is at work.

The Academy experience is just one illustration of what is happening throughout the conference. It seems that wherever I go, there is evidence of the presence of God's Spirit. Church members from the Janesville, Delavan and Beloit churches have met together on Friday evenings in recent weeks to pray for God's power to do a special work for Him. At a recent meeting in the Tomah church (a district meeting for the four churches of their district), many lay people were present to be trained to do evangelistic outreach. This is repeated throughout the conference. James Fox. our new Ministerial Director for the conference, reports that over 100 evangelistic outreaches are planned for this year among the English speaking members of the conference. The Spanish members are

planning over 35 evangelistic outreaches as well. All this is in addition to the hundreds of Bible studies that are now taking place through video Bible Studies, Discover Bible Schools and home Bible studies.

As I view all these events I am reminded of statements from the Bible and the Spirit of Prophecy that tell us that the power of God working through dedicated people will be the experience of God's people just before the coming of Christ. It is a part of the Latter Rain and the Loud Cry.

In Romans 9:28 we read, "He will finish the work, and cut it short in righteousness." So often in talking about the finishing of the work we sound as if it were our work and that we must finish it. But it is ours only to the extent that we are His. He will finish the work; we can be only the channels of His grace.

We are told in Desire of Ages that the "outpouring of the Spirit in apostolic days was the 'former rain,' and glorious was the result. But the 'latter rain' will be more abundant." p 827. My favorite description of this end time work for God is "Servants of God, with their faces lighted up and shining with holy consecration, will hasten from place to place to proclaim the message from heaven. By thousands of voices, all over the earth, the warning will be given. Miracles will be wrought, the sick will be healed, and signs and wonders will follow the believers."GC 612

Let's keep close to God, follow His leading and watch the Mighty Outpouring of His Spirit. There will be no other experience on earth to equal what will result!


We are planning on repairing the damage. Contractors have already begun their work.

- 7. Know the location of the First Aid Building, just west of the Cafeteria. Hours: 8:15-9:15 a.m., 12:45-1:45 p.m., 6:00-7:15 p.m. Report emergencies to the Administration Office.

- 8. Parents pick up your young children within 15 minutes after the close of their programs.
- Respect the boundaries of Camp Wakonda. Across the road is OFF LIMITS after 9:00 p.m. Please respect the Red Boundary Markers on the edge of our property! Help us be good neighbors!

# Wisconsin Science Fair—2002

What do Alzheimers, budgerigars, clouds, dreams, electrolytes and forest fires have in common? On Sunday, April 7, students from around Wisconsin traveled to Wisconsin Academy to share their discoveries about these topics plus many more at the annual Science Fair sponsored by the Education Department of the Wisconsin Conference of Seventhday Adventists.

Students in grades 5-8 from 18 elementary schools, 20 junior-academy students and eight homeschoolers registered 158 projects for consideration.

Participants received 102 first place ribbons, 19 second place ribbons, 8 third place ribbons and several participant recognitions. The ribbons were accompanied by

certificates worth \$35 for a first place, \$30 for second and \$25 for third, towards the entrance fee at Wisconsin Academy. Additionally, Andrews University sponsored \$1,500 in scholarship awards for experi-

mental projects. Winners of the Andrews scholarships were:
Joshua Burrington of Madison SDA Elementary, \$500; Marilyn Santiago of Milwaukee Junior Academy, \$400; Brandon Harrison of Madison SDA Elementary, \$300; Daniel Ewers of Madison SDA Elementary, \$200; and Michael Destaercke of Green Bay Junior Academy, \$100.

T-shirt winners included: Luamy Cornejo, Mark Doorley, Belinda Fox and Kelly Krueger.
Once project judging was completed, Dr. Ben Gardner, a research chemist at John Hopkins School of Medicine in the Department of Pharmacology and Molecular Science gave an interesting presentation about the threat of biological terrorism such as anthrax. Dr. Gardner has done research for the Center for Disease

Research Project developing ways to defend against biological terrorism. Other activities for the day include a "Helicopter Drop" competition for students in grades K-12, a "Pastamobile" race and a "Toothpick Bridge" challenge, featuring cash prizes for the top place winners.

One of the fair organizers, teacher Jeannie Fletcher, is amazed at the quality of the projects which students submit: "Each year that a student participates, they get a little more insight into what it takes to do a quality project and what the judges are looking for, and it shows up next year," Fletcher said. "Because I have always liked science, seeing a student get excited about researching a new topic or doing an experiment is rewarding for me." Fletcher is leaving the Science Fair Committee and was presented with a bouquet of flowers in appreciation for her years of service. In addition to host school Wisconsin Academy, there are 20 Elementary/Junior Academy schools in Wisconsin. Fourteen of the elementary schools are one-room schools with 6-18 students each and six are multi-room schools varying from 22-52 students each.







- 2. Spend Sabbath afternoons in outreach ministries during the 2nd quarter of 2002 Prayer walking, tract distribution, giving out Amazing Facts CD's, holding small group Bible studies in your home, lending Doug Batchelor videos to your neighbors these are among the hundreds of ways Adventist churches in Wisconsin are reaching out to their community. You can, too!
- Attend a training event (multiple time opportunities) Holding a HFTH
  meeting is more than simply popping in a DVD! It involves visitation,
  how to give appeals, how to advertise the meetings and how to
  conduct the meeting.

The Lake Union Conference will hold a three day training session from May 31-June 2nd at Andrews University.

At Wisconsin Camp Meeting, there will an afternoon seminar from Monday to Friday on HFTH Outreach.

Elders Corkum and Fox are willing to come to your church district and hold a training seminar on HFTH for your local leaders
