

Radical Christianity in a Changing World

Terrorism is changing the face of our

society. How do we battle an enemy we cannot see? How do we prepare for attacks that can happen anywhere in so many different ways? There are many in our world today whose life goal is to die a martyr's death. Thousands of children in radical Islam movements like Hamas are trained to regard martyrdom as the most glorious religious objective.

Christians too have died martyrs' deaths. There is a fundamental difference in the tactics of both religions—Christianity sees its warfare as spiritual.

Christians seek to defeat the forces of the enemy through the power of the Holy Spirit. We advance our cause by the power of God's Spirit and appealing to people's hearts.

Islam from its inception has used military conquest as a means of spreading their religion. Many Muslims believe that Allah calls them to fight to their death against the godless forces in the west—that eliminating people and destroying the power of the West will make it possible for Islam to succeed in spreading throughout the world.

How should we respond to this growing threat in the world? *I am now talking spiritually and not politically*. We must realize that God is still superintending our world. The message of Revelation is that Christ will defeat all opposing forces. The trinity of evil—the dragon, beast and false prophet—all will be destroyed. Christ doesn't

ask us to eliminate people through warfare but to help convert their hearts to Him.

1 Corinthians 15:25 says that, "... He must reign till He has put all enemies under His feet."

Sow 1 Billion

Sow 1 Billion is a project which is unprecedented in modern history, as 2/3 of the world's population will be blanketed with a pamphlet conveying a Christ- centered message and inviting them to study the Bible. Five million dollars has been donated to print one billion pamphlets worldwide, twenty-five million of which will be here in the United States.

The Sow One Billion project is designed to help prepare for evangelism 2004, when 150,000 evangelistic meeting will take place worldwide. We are hoping for 150 meetings in our conference. Thousands Expected for "Hope for Our Day" Evangelism Training



K-10 School Updates

The 2003-04 school year opened August 18 with 17 K-10 schools, 29 teachers and a total of 283 students. This represents a student/teacher ratio of less than 10:1. No wonder our school achievement test averages are in the top 25% of all schools nationwide!

We are happy that we had but a few changes in our teaching staff this year. Only two new teachers needed to be hired to replace those moving to other fields. Mr. Steven Champion has been hired to serve as principal/teacher of the Maranatha School in Lena, where he has lived for most of his life. Mr. Champion felt that the Lord was leading him to leave his job as a fitness trainer and enter into a ministry of teaching. He completed his training in December and was available when the opening occurred in Lena. Mr. Carl Wilkerson, who has served in administrative and teaching positions for the past 5 years in the Northeastern U.S., has accepted the position as principal/teacher at the Green Bay Jr. Academy. The Wisconsin Conference teaching staff is dedicated not only to ministry for God's children but also to professional development. 14 of our teachers were enrolled in school this past summer, the majority of which were working on Masters degrees. 10 of our 29 teachers already have an MA degree and 2 more will complete their graduate degree by December. Spread the word! Wisconsin teachers are highly qualified to do the work the Lord has called them to do!

The focus of the conference teaching staff this year will be not only to help students grow academically, but also spiritually. It is our goal to help God's children recognize His unconditional love for them and create in them a desire for a personal relationship with the Lord. This is vital to both the spiritual and the academic development of the students. Miracles in a Wisconsin Cornfield

As Wisconsin Academy registration drew closer this summer, applications for enrollment began filling the registrar's office. Although this is usually cause for great rejoicing, this year we trembled. Almost twice as many

students were requesting financial aid to attend school in the fall as the previous year. A large portion of those applying were juniors or seniors. The stories were heartbreakingparents out of work due to serious illness: families with multiple children in SDA church

schools; students working hard all summer to earn their entrance fees; families in need, all trying their best to make ends meet, all wanting the best for their children.

The treasurer sharpened his pencil. After tiresome calculations, he proposed cutbacks in unnecessary school expenses, like buying our own mouse traps and cancelling pest control services, making our own gluten instead of buying ready-made veggie food. The list went on until a \$20,000 savings was realized, all of which went to the Worthy Student Fund.

The rejoicing was short lived, however, as financial aid requests kept pouring in. This time, staff members came forward. Some changed their vacation plans and gave their vacation money to help

pay a student's tuition. Some requested that routine maintenance work not be done in their departments this year and the money be put toward worthy student funds. Others committed to make monthly payments on tuition bills.

The week before registration, 10 students were still being denied admission due to a lack of financial aid. Teachers who had been praying all summer, staff members who had sacrificed departmental needs, and students who were looking forward to seeing friends now faced the sad reality that the resources were just too limited to give to all. But God still works miracles for His children, even when human hope has failed.

Three days before registration, money began coming in. First, an alumnus who had heard nothing of our needs called to see if the school had a use for \$1,000. Principal John Thomas and Treasurer Paul Johnson gave detailed presentations of the worthy student needs, resulting in more donations.

By registration day \$87,800 in donations and pledges had been given to help WA offer Christian education to all students who desired it.

Are the students thankful? One is

so ecstatic that in his eagerness, he has shown up to work early nearly every day this week. Some cried when they were told the good news that they would be able to return after all. Conversations I've overheard between students this week have included statements like these. "I love reading

the Bible." "I'm so glad to be here.
I like it so much better than the public school I was at." "I thought it would take a long time to make friends but I already have three."

In a world where crime, despair, and unrest are the norm, there is a little tiny patch of joy in a Columbus, Wisconsin cornfield called Wisconsin Academy. If you haven't seen a walking miracle in your life, if you think God doesn't do big things anymore, if you need to sense God's presence, come out to our cornfield and let us share with you the story of God's miraculous answers to prayer.

Evangelism - 2004 and Beyond

We are already hearing exciting reports from around Wisconsin:

- Rice Lake Church laypeople are conducting 2 evangelistic meetings this fall with more on the calendar for 2004
- Watertown Church holds its first evangelistic series in years led by Pastor Ric Swaningson
- Milwaukee Central Church is planning five lay evangelistic meetings in 2004 with Pastor Mills conducting a sixth
- Madison East elders' meeting focused on lay evangelism with local elders eager to hold meetings to plant a new church
- The Monroe Church is launching into public evangelism in late September with Elder Dick Habenicht preaching
- Our president, Elder Corkum, will hold a full four week series in Steven's Point in October
- The 4 churches of the Portage District are starting a 3 phased evangelistic push with 36 evangelistic sermons on TV
- In 2004, the Monroe Church will host the first evangelistic series in Wisconsin with a female preacher as Lisa Isensee leads out.

The Holy Spirit is mobilizing men and women, pastors and lay mem-



bers, to share the good news of Jesus all over our state and to countries far beyond our borders:

- Three pastors and over 25 lay people traveled to Mexico in March to build a church by day and to preach in public evangelistic meetings by night.
- Five pastors and 25 lay people will lead in a church building program in Romania in October during daylight hours but when the sun fades, they will change garments and work for souls in a nine day reaping evangelistic meeting.
- Milwaukee Central Church members will travel in November to a remote mountain village in the Philippines to provide basic health needs and conduct a reaping evangelistic series

While evangelistic fervor is building in Wisconsin by His Spirit, the Lord seems to have something special in store for 2004. **Hope for Our Day** is title of the Lake Union Conference's evangelism emphasis for next year. We anticipate well over 700 evangelistic meetings beginning on or about September 11, 2004 (yes, it is the anniversary of 9-11). Our goal in Wisconsin is to hold over 150 evangelistic meetings in the fall of 2004.

But this is more than a Lake Union venture: around the world, the General Conference is promoting evangelism to begin at this same time. Official estimates suggest upward of 150,000 public evangelistic meetings in the fall of 2004. And Wisconsin will be a leader in this worldwide outreach!

Evangelism is more than the meetings and is an element in all that the church does. Youth, Sabbath School, Christian Education, Health and Stewardship all accomplish their goals and they are a



part of a successful evangelistic work - that is their ultimate focus.

If you would like to be part of this exciting work, it will take training and preparation. The Lake Union Conference is offering excellent training on the weekend of October 24-26 in South Bend, IN (see related story on page 3). WPGR AND WWJP ON AIR IN THE LAKES

On July 23, 2003, Clear Lake Christian Radio, a new low-power FM station, began broadcasting seven days a week, 24 hours a day. The station is a satellite of LifeTalk Radio located in Vonore, Tennessee.

LifeTalk airs Bible-based, Christ-centered programming, focusing especially on an interactive talk format, meeting human needs; and featuring presentations from various Christian ministries, including health, family, and financial experts. Programming is balanced with inspirational hymns performed by many well-known gospel musicians, such as Steven Curtis Chapman, Michael Card, and Steve Green.

"Connecting people with Christ" is the goal of the LifeTalk radio ministry. Hoping to reach people of all ages, the station provides several children's programs such as the ever- popular "Your Story Hour." Associated Press news is broadcast at the top of every hour to keep people informed of current events.

WPGR (We Praise God Radio) may be heard at 105.7 LPFM within a radius of 14 miles from its headquarters 5 miles east of Clear Lake.

Local listeners seeking an alternative station in Rice Lake will now have access to 101.7 WWJP, another low-power broadcasting station that began programming on June 7, 2003. WWJP, or Walk With Jesus Programming, is an outreach that is broadcast from the music room in Meadow Creek Adventist School through a 120-foot tower directly behind the school building. The station is part of the 3 Angels Broadcasting Network and airs Christian music, cooking and health shows, and local church services.
