"Gracias" (thank you) was heard many times as Wisconsin Conference administrators recently traveled throughout the Dominican Republic. They, along with other Lake Union personnel, visited churches and schools that Lake Union funds and members helped to build and looked at current needs for possible future projects.

The Seventh-day Adventist Church is growing rapidly in the Dominican Republic. With nearly 100,000 members among the island's eight million population, it is the largest Protestant denomination. In Santo Domingo, the capitol city, 120 Adventist churches meet each Sabbath! And 65% of the city's 24,000 members are under age 35. They greatly need a large youth center for worship, recreation and fellowship.

The group focussed on strengthening relationships to God, spouse and family. "Staying in the new lodge was great, and the food was wonderful," commented **Gary Schultz**, Eau Claire. "I'd come again." (His normal three-hour trip to camp took six hours!)

Women, Teen Girls' Retreats

"It's Worth the Wait," a one-day retreat sponsored by Women's Ministries, drew 82 teen girls in March. Meeting at Petersen Elementary School, they heard Indianans Judy Jordan and Debbie Barcella sharing ways to handle the gift of sexuality.

Wisconsin Academy hosted over 200 women on the same day, with a variety of topics: Dee Kessen, Milwaukee, on the Biblical story of Ruth; child psychologist Susan Boon, Raymond, on relating to the special needs child; personal testimony by Yvonne Thomas, WA assistant girls' dean; child development by Jeannie Buchholz, WA teacher; Scripture memorization by sisters/teachers Vonda Seals, WA, and Tami Lewis, Portage; and hospitality by Becki Knobloch, Oconto Falls.

"I can't leave my three children for a weekend, but one day is great!" said one participant. Another confessed, "I thought the women's retreats were just for the younger ladies. Now I know they're for all ages. This was my first time--but it won't be my last!"

WHATEVER HAPPENED TO TOMAHAWK?

After the 1992 conference constituency vote to close the Tomahawk Church, what has happened?

April 9, 1993, the reorganized, seven-member Tomahawk Company met in reconsecration.

"We have not only kept our church going, but we generously support ADRA, the academy Y.E.S. program, and H.A.V.E.N. (area home for abused families)," reports clerk Candee Kuhn. "We've had video outreaches, personal Bible studies, musicals, literature distribution, and a baptism." The group is also involved with Net '96 in sending 5,000 Bible study course cards.

And it told conference treasurer Ken Wright that January was a cold month when many didn't attend church! The January 31 report showed tithe down nearly 15%. Fortunately, February brought a cumulative gain of 6.06% over the first two months of 1995.

"Wisconsin Budget continues to be a challenge," says Wright. "We need to show gains there, too, rather than being slightly lower for the first two months of this year than last year."
