Wisconsin Tithe Up Over 11%

As of Monday, January 15th, unaudited tithe gain for 1999 is 11.09%! Elder Brian Hamilton, Treasurer, consented to this interview prior to leaving to conduct an overseas evangelistic campaign. He gave this interview before receiving the year end report. His comments are still relevant



Lampletter: Could you give a report on giving in Wisconsin in 1999?

Hamilton: Well, ...at the end of November, we have one of the largest tithe percentage increases on record. In 1988, we had an 8.45% increase. As of the end of November this year, we have more than a 10% increase over last year, which is phenomenal. We want to express to our members how appreciative we are for the

faithfulness and commitment they demonstrate.

One of the big concerns we had at the end of last year was the launching of the "Together We Can" campaign. What effect would a \$1,000,000 fund raiser have on other finances of the conference? Would people divert their tithe and local offerings as well as conference offerings for "Together We Can"? While that was a concern of mine, it has been soundly put to rest. Every major category of offerings is up, our Sabbath School mission giving is up; our other world offerings show a slight increase; and our Wisconsin Budget is up a little over \$20,000.00 to date. So I guess this just goes to prove once again that you really can't out give the Lord. The Lord has blessed our people and they have been willing to share that on all the fronts the church is active in.

Lampletter: What does the Conference plan to do with this increase?

Hamilton: If I knew that I could count on a 10% increase in tithe over the prior year, year after year, we would very quickly begin to increase the pastoral coverage. Our pastors then would not have to pastor such large districts as some of them

"Tithe" Continued from page 1 do now. We would also probably look to bring in a full-time



evangelist to work in our metropolitan areas.

One of the things this will help is that it will be a little easier to balance next year's budget. We have pushed ourselves to supply as much coverage in the field as possible. In doing so, we need to have a 3% tithe increase to cover the increased expenses that seem to come our way, year-by-year.

Another of the things that we would like to do is to provide more funding for evangelism. Ideally we **should** be spending about 10% of our gross annual conference budget toward Kingdom Growth through "reaping" evangelistic endeavors. Presently, we invest just slightly over 3% of our conference budget in evangelism and we would like to see an increase in that area.

There have been many requests from our lay people that they would like to see Bible workers out in the field assisting the pastors and following up leads and giving Bible studies this increase may provide some money to add Bible workers for field work.

We haven't been able to do a lot of lay-training in the past, and one of the reasons why is because of a very tight budget. Much of our funds go directly to pay for the salaries of pastors and teachers and assist with

teachers' aides and the academy appropriation, which is a fairly large portion of our budget. We really haven't had the money for lay-training and this might give us a possibility for doing a little more lay-training that we have had in the past. I think this might be a very needful and helpful thing to do for helping our work here in Wisconsin.

Lampletter: What would it take to place more pastors in the field?

Hamilton: That is a complex question that deserves a good answer. We would probably move cautiously in hiring because we would hate to hire someone and then have to turn around and lay the person off because of future budgetary constraints.

Rule of thumb is that it takes about \$150,000.00 of tithe for each pastor (of course, the pastor doesn't receive that kind of wages). We look at our budget in terms of a world-wide work and a portion of the tithe dollar goes to fund mission work overseas. A portion of the tithe also helps fund the North American Division and the Union as well as the Conference.

Let's not forget our school teachers! They are also involved in the work of the local church—teachers not only work in the the three r's (reading, 'riting and 'rithmetic), but they teach religion, the fourth and most important "r." We would like to see a teacher and school working with every pastor to make that congregation a success. A portion of the tithe is dedicated to funding Christian education commensurate to the ministry that the teachers perform.

Another principle that guides us is that "those who have more share with those who have less." If we were looking at just the tithe produced by districts, there would be some districts that would warrant more pastoral coverage than they presently have. But we haven't given this to them so that we could provide pastoral coverage for smaller rural districts that maybe don't have the financial base to warrant having the pastoral coverage they presently have. We have always operated under the principle that the financially stronger congregation helps the weaker and that is true across the division as well as within the conference.

What you see is the forecast for the church in the coming years. What we have had is an unusually strong economy for a longer period of time than many have thought possible. I personally, from the reading that I have done and looking at dynamics in the market place of the world today, believe we will probably still, for a number of years, have



a very strong economy.

The Baby Boomers (one of the largest segments of the adult population in North America today) are at their peak earning and spending years. Once that starts tapering off, I think that we then look toward to quite a severe and very long recession or even a depression. And so the philosophy that I'm operating

Conference leaders and the building committee have commissioned blueprints from an architect. These blueprints are in their final stages of development. Once they are delivered, we will take the prints to building contractors to obtain bids on the project (if you would like to volunteer your trades' services in this project or offer services at discount, please contact John Thomas immediately—see related story on p.6). We will only know the real cost of the project when we receive all the bids and total them up (our best "guestimates" suggest nearly \$1 million dollars).

Elder Corkum has expressed hope that we might get all the bids in and raise funds such that we could have a ground breaking ceremony at Alumni Weekend on April 14-16. Whether all the preparations for the project are in place by then remains to be seen.

Elementary Achievement Success

The Iowa Test of Basic Skills results for the fall of 1999 are very positive. Although ability tests show that the students in our SDA elementary schools are very average as far as their mental abilities, the achievement test results show outstanding results.

Our students in the grades tested, grades 3 through 8, averaged at the 75th percentile. This means that of each 100 students taking the test in our nation, our students would score better than 75. Another way of putting it is that the calculations are from 1 to 99 with the national average at 50. With the national average at 50, our students scored at 75.

This creates a great occasion for us to praise our students for achieving well above expectations, parents for their strong support, churches for the sacrifice they make, and teachers for the tremendous work they do to make learning spiritual, interesting, creative, and successful.
