Thank You for Your Faithfulness

The Wisconsin Conference led the Lake Union in tithe increase for 2004 reported Associate Treasurer, Jean Schwark. During 2004, tithe went up 5.45% over the previous year.

An increase in tithe signals the following for an organization:

- The blessing of God is resting upon His people.
- The people of God are being faithful in their covenant relationship with God - (Mal 3:10 KJV) "... Prove me now herewith, saith the LORD of hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing"
- Our Church can continue to operate its program and fulfill its mission.

How will the increase be used? Since Elder Hamilton accepted a call to California, there is a reluctance to make long term financial decisions until a new treasurer arrives.

Most likely, the increase will be used to fund our existing operations and shore up depleted operating reserves.

"Over the last few years, the Executive Committee has had to allocate nearly \$750,000 of our operating reserves for special needs, such as Wisconsin Academy. Both of the dormitories needed new furnaces, the roof on girl's dormitory needed to be replaced, and day to day operations required support," reported Jean Schwark.

Perhaps it is better to ask *what won't happen* as a consequence of the increase in tithe . . .

- The Conference is not dealing with emergency staff reductions as some of our sister conferences have experienced.
- The Conference is not shutting down any schools because of lack of Conference funds for the remuneration of teachers.
- The Conference is not calling for emergency offerings and special constituencies just to sustain operations.
- The Conference is not cutting Camp Meeting back to a long weekend event.
- The Conference is not cutting back on seminars, training events, or equipment and supplies for our church's work.
- The Conference is not asking employees to take a rollback in salaries while the cost of living keeps going up.
- The Conference is *not* fixated on saving money when we should focus on saving souls.

All of these drastic measures could be in our future if we take our eyes off the One who has led us thus far.

God's economy is bountiful to those who take Him at His Word:

(Luke 6:38 NKJV) "Give, and it will be given to you: good measure, pressed down, shaken together, and running over will be put into your bosom. For with the same

measure that you use, it will be measured back to you.""

As we give to God, He gives back to us in abundance. Sometimes, He gives us more than we can imagine: "The master answered, 'You did well. You are a good and loyal servant. Because you were loyal with small things, I will let you care for much greater things. Come and share my joy with me." (Matt. 25:21 NCV)

As we press into this new year, we want to thank you for your faithfulness—you have made a difference by doing your part. Even if it is the difference of all the things that will **not** happen in 2005.

Cause For Rejoicing



Thank you for your faithfulness during 2004. As the reports came to the conference concerning baptisms in the churches and tithe

and offerings, there is much for which to praise God.

There were 228 baptisms in the conference this past year. That represents a 3.4% increase when baptisms are compared to the membership of the conference. At the end of the year our membership is 6,773. We began the year with a membership of 6,685, so our net increase was 88 which is a good year for the conference. However, we voted to set an objective to be at 7,000 members by our 2006 constituency meeting. In order to accomplish this, 2005 would need to be an exceptional year.

However, we know that each baptism represents a thrilling story

of God's grace. Already wonderful stories are coming in for 2005 of people who are being baptized into Christ and the fellowship of His church. This is what God desires the church to be—a rescue center for lost humanity.

Before leaving the conference, our previous conference treasurer, Brian Hamilton, calculated we would need at least a 3% tithe increase over the previous year in order to balance the budget for 2004. We prayed that this might happen so we would not have to make cuts in the program for the conference. The tithe increase was not 3% it was 5.45%! When this was announced at the office we all gathered and sang the doxology. December was a remarkable month with a 15% increase over the previous year.

Your faithfulness in winning souls and in returning tithe causes rejoicing in heaven. I think of the words in Gospel Workers p. 267, "The approval of the Master is not given because of the greatness of the work performed, but because of fidelity in all that has been done It is not the results we attain, but the motives from which we act, that weigh with God. He prizes goodness and faithfulness above all else."

2005 has already seen wonderful activities for God taking place. Evangelism is being planned in many centers. Some churches are using Net 2005 with Doug Batchelor during March. This will be a dynamic series. Several are desiring to launch new church plants—there will be a church planting convention in Milwaukee in March. Each area of the conference has exciting plans for outreach for God this year. We praise Him for His faithful people. Let's rejoice in God's grace as He uses us to accomplish the greatest work on this planet—reconciling people with God.

Christian Education just became more affordable in Wisconsin!

Wisconsin Academy was recently chosen as an official partner school with Pathways to Success, a division of the Commonweal Foundation based in Silver Springs, Maryland.

When thinking about Christian education, it is hard not to consider the costs involved. On average, academies across the nation charge anywhere from \$10,000 up to \$15,000 per year.

"Christian education is expensive," says Derral Reeve, Wisconsin Academy principal, "but we have to weigh the cost of not sending our children to our Christian schools."

However, with WA's new partnership with Pathways to Success, the decision to enroll our children where they will receive this Christian education has become much easier. Pathways to Success is a scholarship program that offers funding of up to \$5,000 per year to students who are experiencing boarding school for the first time. To qualify to be part of this new exciting program, you must be a first time boarding school student in grades 9-12 and have a family income at or below 250 percent of the federal poverty level. The family adjusted gross income (as determined by line 33 of the 2004 Federal Tax Return) must be at or below the following amounts:*

- Family of 2 cap is \$30,000
- Family of 3 cap is \$31,340
- Family of 4 cap is \$37,700 (in breakout box)
- Family of 5 cap is \$44,060
- Family of 6 or more cap is \$50,420


Considering that over 50 percent

of WA students receive some level of financial assistance, this program should be beneficial to many of our incoming students who might not have been able to attend otherwise. Unfortunately current students are unable to receive funding from this program because they are already in attendance at a boarding school.

"The faculty and staff are extremely excited, not to mention honored, to have this program move onto the WA campus," says Reeve. "Now more students have the opportunity to enjoy the WA experience that has been shared by so many before them!"

The students that are accepted into the Pathways program will be able to reapply every year until they graduate. There is no minimum or maximum number of students that can apply for a scholarship. Participants will have opportunities to meet with Pathways representatives to share their school experiences. There is even a celebration meal with Pathways staff and other award recipients. Additional benefits include having a special birthday recognition and receiving a copy of the PathNotes newsletter featuring students and alumni of the Pathways program.

started in August of 1994 and has awarded approximately 2,000 scholarships. Wisconsin Academy joins twenty-seven other boarding schools throughout the United States in this program.

For the 5th straight year the average student achievement test scores have increased in Wisconsin Adventist K-10 schools. Each year in November students in grades three through eight are tested with the Iowa Test of Basic Skills. Our student scores are compared to national norms. This year's average was at the 69th percentile. This means that our students would score higher than 68% of all students who would take this test nationwide. If the school averages for each grade are considered our average would be above the 80th percentile. Our schools in the conference are in the top 20 % of all schools nationwide. Although our top priority is to prepare our students for eternity, it is good to know that we are providing them with an excellent foundation for success in this life as well.

one another to follow in the footstep of our Master.

The climbing gym is only one of numerous events that the church has planned since Drs. James and Grace Flood have agreed to become the social committee leaders. nights, small group potlucks, and a super bowl party at a local hotel with a big screen and pool.

"Christ's method alone will give true success in reaching the people. The Saviour mingled with men as one who desired their good. He showed His sympathy for them, ministered to their needs, and won their confidence. Then He bade them, "Follow Me."—The Ministry of Healing, p. 143.

Mission Life In the Far East

It is a given fact that a mission trip's ultimate goal is to save lives, but for Jenni Ewers, that goal took on an entirely

new meaning during her participation in a mission trip to the Philippines this past December.

Jenni, a member of the Madison Community Church and 2000 graduate of Wisconsin Academy, is an English teacher/missionary who has been serving in South Korea since last October with the SDA Language Institute. She had the opportunity to travel with a group of 35 members of her South Korean church family over the Christmas break for a mission trip and adventure to the Philippines.

On the afternoon of Christmas Day, members of the group traveled to a beach area-there were 11 young people who had never seen the ocean, so they were excited to see the vast expanse of water. The warm afternoon sun enticed a few of them into the water. After awhile, Jenni, who was wading near shore, realized that three of the young people had gotten out a bit far, and she shouted to them to come back towards shore. She thought they could not hear her so she started moving out towards them.

As she reached them, she realized they hadn't followed her instructions because there was a strong undertow— the three children, a boy, 13, and two girls, 12 and 10, who were not strong swimmers, had been struggling to simply keep their heads above water.

As Jenni approached them, all three lunged for her, and pushed her under. Although she is not certified as a lifeguard, Jenni knows about water safety and she immediately disengaged herself from their grasp. She sent up an urgent prayer for wisdom and strength, because she realized she needed a miracle right then and there.

She started her rescue efforts with the youngest of the three, pushing the girl towards shore. When Jenni felt the 10-year-old was close enough and out of danger, she swam back to the two others. Jenni began to tire—she realized there would be no way she would have the energy to make two more trips, so she began pulling both children, urging them to kick as she pulled and worked diligently to time their efforts to coincide with the increasingly large wave swells. Eventually, she was forced to make the 13 year old boy swim on his own.

When they all finally reached shore, the three children were crying uncontrollably and all of them were shaking with exhaustic and coughing out seawater. A substantial crowd had gathered to watch the heroics, but no one had come in to help. It was only later that the mission group learned that the beach they had visited is famous for being a good surfing beach and a deadly one for swimming. At least one tourist drowns at the beach every year.

Jenni is grateful that she was able to be someone God could use to save lives and gives Him all the credit for helping her do it. She's "swallowed enough seawater to last a lifetime" and is hopeful she won't have to do it again, but she also prays for a heart that is willing to do whatever God asks her to do.

Every Sunday you can hear the bund of people working on the new Adventist Church in Wausau.

Our old church had to be torn down to make room for a new road. They call that eminent domain. The law says that when the government takes your property by eminent domain, it has to pay you fair market value.

After much negotiation and discussion, Marathon county offered to pay for a new church and for
