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# Wisconsin Academy—Facing Financial Challenge

How can you be in the midst of a Cafeteria Building Project and suddenly find yourself struggling to meet operating expenses? That is the position Wisconsin Academy faces with a \$65,000 operating shortfall for 2000-2001 *and* a 2001-2002 budget shortfall of \$105,000.

### **Encouraging News**

While Wisconsin Academy budgeted for 115 students, they have begun the year with 126. As of September 12, three students have returned home.

ong the students. Twelve students traveled to Andrews University on September 13 for a prayer conference. Faculty and friends of the Academy notice the difference in the spiritual tone that this year's seniors bring with them.

### **Discouraging News**

Financial review in the late winter of 2001 suggested there would be a shortfall. Carleen Gustrowsky and John Thomas reported an operating loss of about \$65,000 for the 2000-2001 school year. Several items contributed to this deficit:

- One of the coldest winters on record increased heating cost
- Food prices rose by 5% during the first three months of last school year
- The packaging industry has not been able to provide a salary for one member of our staff who was virtually dedicated to

their work. This resulted in three salaries being allocated to the maintenance department which is excessive for our operation.

- ◆ The cafeteria construction project was being finished in the cold winter weather. The project required heat to be supplied to the building prior to windows being fitted, insulation being fully applied and other aspects that would have made the building more energy efficient. The heating plant had to be run continuously without thermostats to facilitate the construction project.
- There was a dramatic drop in enrollment for second semester that reduced tuition income.

When you consider these factors, it is remarkable that Academy leaders kept the deficit to only \$65,000—it could have been worse.

#### The Challenge

The proposed operating budget for 2001-2002 was out of balance by some \$105,000! What can we do?

The K-12 Board held an emergency teleconference on the evening of August 29, and made recommendations to the Wisconsin Conference Executive Committee.

### **Adventist Church Responds**

When hijacked aircraft began flying into buildings on Tuesday morning, September 11th, the Adventist Church began to mobilize its resources and its members in ministry.

Churches were opened for prayer.

After observing Satan with his mask off, can we still choose him over God?

September 11 also taught us—don't drop your guard. America relaxed it's guard with its many millions of travelers each year and stopped being careful at security checks. In these critical times for

God's people, He appeals to us, "don't drop your guard." Be vigilant in your defense against evil. *Watch and pray* are the oft repeated appeals of scripture:

"Put on God's complete armor so that you can successfully resist all the devil's methods of attack. For our fight is not against any physical enemy; it is against organizations and powers that are spiritual. We are up against the unseen power that controls this dark world, and spiritual agents from the very headquarters of evil. Therefore you must wear the whole armor of God that you may be able to resist evil in its day of power, and that even when you have fought to a standstill you may still stand your ground." In order to finish the project \$106,092 is needed from the noncurrent commitments. The conference has advanced considerable funds to finish the building phase the project. However, the balance needed is approximately the cost

chairman, reminded the committee that Wisconsin Academy is a priority ministry of this conference. With over \$500,000 in subsidies to the academy operations from the conference each year, this represents a significant part of the conference operation. Yet, the constituency wishes for a strong academy so the conference seeks to help make this a reality.

Elder Brian Hamilton, Conference Treasurer, reported that, "during the last few years of plenty, the Wisconsin Conference Administration (with the blessing of the Executive Committee) have been careful to set aside some non-tithe and tithe funds in case a special need should arise. We can cover the amount of last year's shortfall without special offering appeals."

Next year's budget is a different matter—there is not a sufficient contingency fund to cover the \$105,000 shortfall, continue substantial subsidies for the Academy, as well as maintain the operation of the conference at its present level. John Thomas, Academy Principal, made a presentation of proposed cuts to Academy operations to cover the forecast shortfall.

#### They include:

One of the recommendations (with reservation) was to raise tuition approximately \$120 per student per year. A committed Christian made an extraordinary gift of \$15,000 to cover the balance of the funds needed.

#### The Future

There are very few other cuts that can be made now that would not result in reducing the program of Wisconsin Academy severely.

None of the shortfalls resulted from mismanagement or overspending a department's budget! Enrollment is good! The spiritual climate is good! It is an increase in the cost of doing business and challenges related to starting a new industry that has placed Wisconsin Academy in this position.

In the recent parent-teacher newsletter, Principal Thomas said it well:

"Please note that we have not touched the financial aid program, a benefit to our parents of \$220,598... We would like to encourage you to support the approved budget savings items. Together, we can continue to make Wisconsin Academy a great place to educate our youth."

This will determine how soon we can complete the project. It is understood that circumstances arise that make it difficult to complete commitments. We encourage each person to share with us their present ability to meet their commitments. There may need to be additional funds solicited if insufficient funds are realized.

There is a natural desire to finish the project as soon as possible. However, this project was started with the commitment to not go into debt. We are endeavoring to proceed as we are confident the funds are there to support the expenditures. The support of the membership in the conference has been exceptional. There is evidence that the Lord has guided to this point. He will lead to a successful completion!

### A Letter Home From Camp

Dear Friends,

many of you headed home after a terrific camp meeting, our Camp Wakonda summer staff took a deep breath and refocused our attention on ministering to your young people the next 6 weeks.

We first began with Blind Camp.

where 63 campers of all ages unloaded from busses and cars with excitement and enthusiasm. Coming from Michigan, Illinois. Indiana, Minnesota, and Wisconsin, these campers have a special place in our hearts. It is amazing the activities they were eager to do, even though they could not see. We helped them make ceramics, shoot arrows, ride horses, and experience nature. We enjoyed them as they shared their many talents. From singing and piano playing, to bongo music they bviously had a great time per-

ming. Their cheers, smiles, and ciapping told us they enjoyed hearing one another. Thanks, Christian Record Services, for bringing these campers to us.

The following four weeks found us serving young people from ages 8-16. Each week they experienced water-skiing, swimming, horseback riding, and ceramics. New activities included; candle making. glass painting, Marshallese handicraft, model rocketry, archery and canoeing. Our new Nature Center (the refurbished Cedar Lodge) was the beginning point for our nature classes, including Insects, Ecology, Spiders, Edible Wild Plants, Trees, and Pond Life. It is exciting to help young people know about and appreciate God's wonderful creation.

e evening in our new Indian Illage, campers played Indian games, and watched the staff depict the story of Naya Nuki, an Indian girl who was captured by an enemy tribe. As she depended on God she was able to travel over hundreds of miles back to her village. After the program, hiking back to the tents along the trail by flickering tiki lights, the mood of the ancient Indian ways lingered on

Another night we met in our newly cleared meadow by a civil war tent and, after dress-up relays and corn shucking contests, we were captured by the drama of an early American family caught in the pull between political feelings of the day tearing the family apart — and in the end realizing how important family really is in our lives.

One night we even had a rodeo, with horses and games, followed by a wagon ride to a campfire where we listened to another of the continued stories by our camp pastor. By the way we had great camp pastors — Bob Mills, Pearo Ackles, Loren Nelson, and Delmar Austin. Thanks guys!

The plays on Friday night and Saturday night were especially great. Friday night we learned of the gift of salvation through a parable called "Sonny the Soup Sipper"— you see, Sonny the Soup Sipper sips soup sort of systematically, seeking satisfactory soup. But that wasn't enough. She wanted something more than what the soup factory offered — and she finally found that she could only get out of the soup factory if she acknowledged she was dirty and would "accept the Boss's offer."

On Saturday night the staff shared the dramatic play, "The Path Not Chosen;" the story of the rebellion of Lucifer in heaven and how Jesus made every effort to save him — just as He does for us. Each camper was challenged to choose the path that leads to

eternity with Jesus.

On Sabbath morning campers walked out to our new Chapel in the Pines set in a tall grove of whispering pines away from the busy activities of the week. pastor shared the sermon with an appeal for young people to choose to follow Jesus. 132 young people chose to accept Christ, with 139 choosing to rededicate their lives to Him. 68 young people indicated that they would like to study to be baptized. I know that all heaven must rejoice. My dream is that many in the Wisconsin Conference will look back and remember the Chapel in the Pines as the special spot where they committed their lives to Jesus.

On Sabbath afternoon, campers took a "Walk Through the Bible" and came upon many scenes of the life of Jesus — seeing Him heal, teach, plead, pray and die for us. He did all He could do— and challenged us with "Now what will you do?"

Our last week of camp was for mom, dad, and the kids. Family Camp, although small this year, was a lot of fun. It was great to see parents and children together riding horses, swimming, raising and lowering the flag, doing all the camp activities together. If I wasn't already at camp, I'd sure like my family to experience Family Camp.

All the tents are now put away and the summer staff have all headed back to school. It is difficult to share with you the smiles, the excitement, the fun that the 309 campers had this summer. It is a thrill to see them grow.


The core group for the new Beloit Hispanic Group has formed under the leadership of Pastor Hector de Armas. The group presently numbers nine members but they are planning for growth.

## Healthy Choices, Healthy Living

"Would you like to know your Health Age?" was the question asked at the health booth sponsored by the Madison Community SDA Church during the Dane County Fair, held July 18-22, in Madison, Wisconsin.

Nearly 500 people were surveyed at the fair regarding "Seven Good Health Practices." A study of 6,900 people over a period of 15 years identified seven basic health practices that were good predictors of how long people lived. (These included regular, aerobic exercise; eating breakfast every morning; avoid snacking on junk food between meals; achieve a healthy weight; don't smoke; get at least 7-8 hours of sleep; don't drink alcohol). The survey compared current health practices with the results of the study and calculated a person's "Health Age," or how old their body really is. Over 170 people gave their names and addresses for further follow-up regarding health and spiritual information.

We are now planning ministries to meet the needs expressed to us. We look forward to a good response as we plan health evangelism in the new year.

### Small Group Training Seminar August 24-25, 2001

On the weekend of August 24-25 our conference held its annual Small Group Training Seminar at Camp Wakonda. Four pastors and forty lay people from all over the state attended and were very much blessed by the presentations. Some of our members came for the very first time and others came to have their skills in small groups sharpened.

W. Milton Adams was our guest speaker. He is a pastor of two churches in the Oregon Conference. He has published materials

on small groups including: The Beginnings of Reaching Out in Love: A Seven Week Introduction For High School and College Small Groups, Small Group Leaders Training Manual, and Growth Groups Training Seminar: Designed for Seventh-day Adventist Churches (this is what was presented).

There is no way to put in a short article all that happened on this weekend so here are a few highlights. On Friday evening the gospel message of "Growth Groups" was the main topic. The emphasis was on "Growth". If "small groups" are not growing then they are not functioning the way "small groups" should. Every member should be looked at as a potential leader. A leader should


be someone who is productive in building up the kingdom of God and helping the church to grow numerically. Milton showed what the New Testament model of a church was and then showed how churches can copy that model today.

There are seven tests to qualify as a New Testament Church: The Institutional, The Cell, The Photocopy, The Simplicity, The Multiplication, The Adult, and The Persecution. Each test was analyzed. Each Pastor will receive a copy of the Growth Group manual; maybe you could look at the seven tests with him and see if your church passes.

One of the points of emphasis about the New Testament Church was much socializing from house to house. Adventists are typically very strong on theology and correct understanding of the Bible, and are very weak when it comes to socializing. Milton emphasized that we need to mingle more with non-Adventists as Christ mingled with the non-believers of His community. "The Savior mingled with men as one who desired their

good." *Gospel Workers*, p. 363.

On Sabbath most of the presentation was on how to operate Growth Groups. What to use for



questions were addressed. One concept that people really liked was "Matthew Parties".

A "Matthew Party" is based on Jesus going to the house of Matthew and other people and social-

izing with them. Why not do the same? Go to or invite people to your home to celebrate birthdays, anniversaries, holidays, and other special events. These are opportunities to meet new people and to share with them an invitation to come to your weekly small group.

Growth Groups, Matthew Parties, Evangelistic Meetings, and personal Bible studies all go hand in hand. Having all of these functioning in each church will help to build up God's kingdom a lot better than just doing one thing. Milton Adams did an excellent job at showing the necessity of Growth Groups and how they work together with everything else going on in the church.

## October 13 Signature Sabbath

In the spring of this year, Danny Shelton met with executives from Time Warner Cable in southeast Wisconsin to discuss possibilities of placing 3ABN on local cable. 3ABN is already available in a California outlet of Time Warner Cable. Time Warner executives were interested in the station primarily for its natural health content (approximately 40% of 3ABN programming). They made no commitment to place 3ABN in their lineup, however.

Bea Graham of the Milwaukee Central Church had a vision for Milwaukee's church growth that prominently featured 3ABN. "I had planned to go to India to be part of that massive lay evangelistic effort there. The sudden and unexpected death of my son forced cancellation of the mission trip to India. After a time of grieving, I realized I still had vacation time on hand. I decided to attend a seminar at 3ABN."

Mrs. Graham contacted Darryl Mundall and Annette Christiansen of 3ABN's marketing department. Together, they suggested some ideas to bring the marketability of 3ABN to the attention of Time Warner. A signature campaign was among those ideas. "If we could

get 20,000 signatures of resident of SE Wisconsin requesting 3ABN on Time Warner Cable, it would make a significant impact," reported Graham.

Groups from the Milwaukee churches, Wisconsin Academy and the Pathfinders from throughout southern Wisconsin will converge on Milwaukee to gather signatures.

While the malls have typically denied us permission to gather signatures there, individual retail-

Two thousand signatures have already been gathered. Shirley Shim, from Central Church demonstrated that they can be obtained. With a large response on October 13th the original goal of 20,000 signatures could be reached. Time Warner has indicated that the company would be watching for responses from the community.
