GLOBAL STRATEGY FOR GLOBAL MISSION

AUGUST, 1990

The July 7 Sabbath report of HARVEST 90 at the General Conference Session in Indianapolis, showed 2,503,142 new members added to the church during the last five years --more than 1300 daily.

Five years ago church leaders at the General Conference Session in New Orleans suggested a goal of 2 million new members for the 1985 to 1990 quinquennium. Many thought this impossible, but God granted the Church over 2 and 1/2 million new members.

From the 1990 General Conference Session at Indianapolis comes the challenge of Global Stategy for Global Mission. During the coming months we will be hearing and reading about Global Mission.



While it is true that we are working in 184 of the world's 215 countries, it is also true that within these countries are people groups and geographic groups yet to be reached.

The world's population has passed the 5 billion mark. Our church leaders have divided the world's population into 5000 geographical units of about 1 million persons each. The SDA Church ministers in about 3200 of these, leaving 1800 units in which we have no work.

GLOBAL STRATEGY is the plan of our church to reach into these new areas by the year 2000, while at the same time strengthing the work already established in the other areas.

The work of the church in Wisconsin is part of Global Mission. Let's endeavor in every way possible to reach out to new persons in our territory while at the same time strengthening the work which is already established.

While GLOBAL MISSION impels us to open our eyes to the entire world, at the heart of Global Mission is people -- People won to the Saviour one by one in each local church.

GLOBAL MISSION -- Let's all be a part of it!

It was estimated that more than 35,000 were present in the dome on Sabbath, July 7.

And on Sabbath, July 14, it was stated there were more than 50,000 in the Hoosier Dome!

Elder Ralph Thompson, General Conference Secretary, presented the worship message the first Sabbath. The day was full of very special reports and special music. (The Andrews University Seminary Chorus provided music along with an orchestra, as just one example.) Incidentally, on at least three days, Bruce Rasmussen, Music Director at Wisconsin Academy, was the organist.

Because of all the special features and music, Elder Thompson did not even begin his message until 12:30 p.m. and finished near 1:45! That afternoon, it was exciting to hear each division leader give their HARVEST 90 REPORT, telling what had been accomplished, with the Lord's leading, in their area of the world field. As of June, 1990, the Seventh-day Adventist World Church had grown by more than 2 and 1/2 million new members. For that we can Praise the Lord!

During the business sessions throughout the week days, some issues discussed at length were: (1) Proper Sabbath Observance and (2) Ordination of Women. Many delegates stood to speak of their support of the Sabbath Observance paper that had been prepared by a study committee over the past 10 years; however they also expressed their concern that this information not be voted as Church policy. The concern was expressed that this might be misused as a "club". The delegates voted to accept the paper as a guideline - not as Church policy.

On the issue of Women's Ordination, discussion -- both pro and con -- took place over a 2-day period. The delegates were limited to 3 minutes each and at the time it was voted to limit the discussion and take a vote, there were still some 20 to 30 delegates lined up to speak. It was interesting to me that some delegates used the same Bible text to "prove their point", one being

for and the other against ordination. Of one thing I was convinced and that was that both were convinced they were right!

When the vote was taken, by a 3 to 1 margin, it was voted that women could not be ordained. However, they can be issued ministerial licenses allowing them, in the church where they are assigned, to perform weddings, funerals, baptisms and other pastoral duties. Ministerial credentials, received at the time of ordination, allow ministers to perform these pastoral duties in any church in the world.






So much more to report and not enough space! I'll just report on 2 other events.

On Sabbath, July 14, Elder Folkenberg presented the worship hour message encouraging us to come TOGETHER in UNITY to FINISH THE WORK. This was the hope expressed by so many all through the week -- during the devotionals, business sessions and division reports. And a GLOBAL STRATEGY for finishing the work was shared. But that will have to wait for the next issue!



On Friday, July 6, the first work of the 226 member nominating committee was to elect a General Conference president. This task, begun at 8:00 a.m., was not completed until some 8 hours later. In fact, it was nearly 6:00 p.m. before the nominating committee reported to the delegates and the vote was taken.

Forty-nine year old Elder Robert S. Folkenberg was elected as the fifteenth president of the world church. He most recently served as president of the Carolina Conference; however, his years of denominational service include 19 years overseas service.

As you may have read in the Adventist Review, Elder Folkenberg is a 4th generation minister,

born of missionary parents in Puerto Rico, has spent 30 of his 49 years in Inter-America and speaks Spanish fluently. When introduced to the assembly on Friday evening, Elder Folkenberg spoke of his inadequacy for the task and, yet, of his assurance of the source of his strength. He said, "It should be clear by the events of this day that the real General Conference president is the Lord Jesus Christ. There's no problem or challenge that God cannot solve. With God we can do anything."

Sunday morning, more than 2000 runners, walkers and volunteers made a public statement for fitness when they participated in the Adventist International Fitness Event.

Richard Terrell and Millie Swanson 2 were Wisconsin members who participated in the 5K walk beginning at 7:30 a.m. in the Indianapolis Military Park.



Many non-Adventists participated. More than one-third of the 1800 runners were non-SDA. This event provided an excellent opportunity to make a public statement stressing the benefits of physical fitness.

Beginning Monday, July 9 and continuing through the 11th, I enjoyed attending the 1990 General Conference Session Women's Meetings which were sponsored by the General Conference leadership under the direction of Shepherdess International. Theme for these 3 special meetings was "Renewal in Christ." I especially appreciated the presentation by Dr. Wilma Hepker from Walla Walla College. She challenged the women of the church with her message titled "Assertive Servanthood" which focused on the special contribution women can make in the family, church and community for their God.

GENERAL CONFERENCE SESSION

The Hoosier Dome in Indianapolis, IN was the site where thousands of Seventh-day Adventists gathered for the 55th World Session of the Seventh-day Adventist Church. The editor attended this Session as a visitor and the following report is an attempt to share news and information from this my first General Conference Session.

Ruth Nelson of Frederic was a delegate representing the Lake Union Executive Committee and Ruth shared with me her perceptions of the conference.

Ruth said, "It was overwhelming! Fantastic! Unless you have been to a General Conference before, you can't comprehend what it is like to attend one. Everything is so well organized for the thousands who are in attendance, from the seating in the dome, the "Speed Line" in the cafeteria, the speakers and music to the division reports and the democratic way in which the business sessions are conducted. I am sure none of us can comprehend the hours of preparation that were spent. What a privilege to be able to attend, to feel the presence of the Holy Spirit and to know this Church is going through until Jesus' return!"

Elder Robert Carter, LUC President welcomed the delegates and visitors during the opening session beginning at 3:00 p.m. on July 5. Elder Carter stated, "The constituents of every conference and institution in the Lake Union territory join me in extending a hearty welcome. It is my sincere hope that our attendance at this General Conference session will strengthen our

resolve to be with our Saviour and His followers throughout eternity."

Thursday evening, Elder Neal Wilson presented his last report to the assembly as General Conference President. His message centered on the mission of the Church and what had been accomplished in the last quinquennium (1984-1989). A summary titled "A Look at Seventh-day Adventists" gives a quick statistical look at the last 5 years; however, Elder Wilson, as he has done during his more than 12 years as leader of the world church, turned our attention to the future and the work waiting for each of us. "..I am convinced that in spite of what the Lord has already done for us, we have only just begun. He wants us to lift our eyes to see that the fields are white unto harvest. He wants us to dream bigger dreams, to attack more difficult and challenging tasks, to attempt the impossible by the power of His Spirit."
