# Lamp Letter Hot Pink Slippers

t was a sunny, bitingly-cold, February afternoon in Wisconsin. I parked my car, got out, and shivered, as I briskly walked towards the Aldi's grocery store, where I planned to pick up a few items of fresh produce for the upcoming weekend. Before entering the store, I first headed for the shopping carts, which were nested together in a special alcove, that is attached to the exterior of the store. Familiar with the self-serve process, I inserted a quarter into the proper slot which released a cart from the long line of chain-linked carts, then I turned around and headed for the store entrance.

And that's when I first noticed her – a sweet-faced, elderly lady, who was wearing an old, black wool coat and a pair of hotpink slippers. She was walking slowly, and was obviously headed toward the cartalcove, now behind me. Pushing my cart, I made a split-second decision, and called to her, "Would you like this one?" and proceeded to roll it towards her, without waiting for her answer. "Oh, THANK YOU," she said with appreciation, and then added, her voice dropping, "I just came from a cancer treatment," as if to explain her labored gait.

I couldn't help but think, "Wow, she has had a tougher day than me!" By comparison, I had just spent a pleasant morning in my favorite armchair, and was quite pleased with my latest accomplishment, that of figuring out how to text a message PLUS an attached picture, on the new smartphone that my daughterin-law had just given me two days earlier. (Mock it if you will, but at age 72 and

being a "technology-challenged-senior," it had seemed like a really BIG DEAL to me!) But now, in an instant, the pride of my newly-acquired "big deal" skill, shrank to total insignificant proportions, when meeting a fellow senior who was courageously battling CANCER, a muchbigger "BIG-DEAL!"

I turned back, found another quarter in my coin-purse, obtained another cart, and headed for the door again. And there she was, slowly browsing in the produce department, just inside the store. Our eyes met, and her hand stretched toward me, holding a quarter to repay me. "Oh no," I refused, "it was for YOU!" Her smile was spontaneous and full-faced-beautiful, and she responded with a sort of childlike honesty and delight: "You have made me so HAPPY," as if my very-tiny, 25 cent kindness was the highlight of her day! But my own heart felt strangely warmed and happy too!

And then somehow, as if an unseen magnet was drawing us together, our carts were suddenly side-by-side and we were momentarily lost in sharing our common life experiences with one another. We both were widows; she had tragically lost her man only two weeks before; I had experienced the same loss two years previous. Both of our men had had multiple strokes that had taken them on a slowbut-steady decline toward their death. We discovered that both of us former-wives possessed caregiver-hearts, and had previously wrapped our grocery-shopping lists around the wants and tastes of our

## **Never Let A Crisis Go To Waste**

e are in the midst of a crisis like few of us have ever seen. A world-wide virus pandemic, travel restrictions, economic shut-downs and "safe at home" orders. Few have escaped the effects of this crisis. From fear and loss of income, to severe sickness and even death, this crisis has struck our world, our country, neighborhoods and families.

Some see this crisis as the fault of carelessness or even worse, a sinister plot. Others see this as a sign of the end, or a judgement of God. Today I'm not going to try to sort out source or cause, but I would like to ask, "are we letting this crisis go to waste?"

They used their confinement as an opportunity for praying and singing. They sang and prayed so loud that the other prisoners not only heard them, but listened to them. They took advantage of their crisis and witnessed for their Lord. They were less concerned for their safety than their fellow prisoners' salvation.

I would invite you to take advantage of this crisis. Find ways to praise God and witness of His goodness and love. If you spend special time with Jesus and His word; if you are able to touch even one person for Jesus this crisis will not be wasted, but can be used for the glory of our Lord Jesus Christ.

## Four Wisconsin Elementary Schools Received Funding Award for STEM Education



n March 6, 2020, Versacare Foundation awarded \$1,420,000 in grant funding to 189 Adventist primary and secondary schools across Canada and United States in support of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math). Four Wisconsin schools were recipients of the grant monies awarded. They are:

**1. Bethel Junior Academy:** Principal Jim Muhlenbeck, is looking forward to using the \$5,000 to buy and install a smart board in his classroom.

2. Green Bay Adventist Junior Academy: Principal Rick Blumenschein was awarded a \$5,000 grant to better equip the science curriculum for grades 7-10. Hands on technology will include Simple Machines, K'nex building sets, 3D printer, Ozobot coding robots, Hydrogen fuel cells, and littleBits Electronic Circuits.

**3. Petersen Elementary School:** Tiffany Meulemans, grades 5-8 teacher, requested funding to support upgrading technology devices in the lower-grade classroom. The school was awarded \$5,000 which will help purchase a class set of iPads for grades K-4, and Osmo learning materials which combine physical manipulatives with game play on the iPad.

**4. Three Angels Christian School:** Technology teacher George Levy applied for the Versacare grant and was awarded \$5,000. Levy won the grant with his robotics technology plan for grades 1-8. The grant monies will be used to purchase Cubelets Mini Makers Pack (where students learn tactile coding) and Cubelets Blockly (how to code the robots) for grades 1-4. Discover Robotics & Programming I Club Pack will be utilized for grades 5-8 so the older students will exercise greater control over the final build and behavior of their robots.

Students will be able to easily move past the basic understanding of robotics and explore more challenging concepts. A 3D printer and Smart Document Camera will be used to enable students to make 3D models of objects and print their creations.

The Versacare Foundation is an independent, self-funded, private foundation comprised of both lay Adventists as welll as present and former Adventist church employees. This foundation started supporting varied ministries of the Seventh-day Adventist Church with grant funding in 1990 and has awarded more than \$28,250,000 in grants.

Five years ago, the Versacare Foundation starting funding STEM grants for schools. Three years ago they began funding *every* school who applied for the STEM grant. STEM funds can be used to purchase, smart boards, tablets or Chromebooks for student use, robotic programs, computer labs, instillation of 3D printers and related software, equipping chemistry, physics and biology labs, and more. The STEM grant program has provided funding in three categories: three or less classrooms, four or more classrooms, and senior academies.

Congratulations to the four schools! We look forward to hearing how you will integrate this new technology.

So there we stood, two strangers in the aisle of the humble grocery store that caters to the age-group of Social Security recipients and low-income citizens, sharing our memories and heart-concerns with someone who seemed glad to listen and empathize. She told me of how her previous breast cancer had now metastasized to her bones, and was running rampant throughout her body, producing much pain! Her shadowed eyes told me that she understood her bleak future, and I realized that this was not only our first meeting, but also very-likely our last! It was then that the pink slippers made perfect sense to me, for no doubt they were the most comfortable choice of footwear in her entire closet, for her painful feet! (My own foot-pain from a fallen arch seemed very trivial and unmentionable at that poignant moment!)

I believe that in God's masterplan, He is interested in how we treat the people that He arranges for us to cross paths with. And I think that He was pleased that day, as two of His daughters reached out and blessed one another in loving concern. I cannot speak for the cancer-stricken, recently-widowed lady with the beautiful smile and the hot-pink slippers, but I hope that she left the store with a lighter heart! I only know for sure that I was warmed clear-through, especially when we hugged as we parted, not even thinking to exchange names. And when I exited the store with my small purchase of fresh veggies, the singledigit temperature outside didn't seem nearly as frigid as before!

t was just three months ago on January 20 that I submitted the last Financial Snapshot article for you for the previous Lamp Letter. I never would have dreamed how events could have changed in so short a time.

On March 12, 2020 I met with the finance committee for review and recommendation of the 2020 budget to the next Executive Committee. That turned out to be the last face to face meeting I attended. Less than a week later, the office was closed for business and we began working from home. Every event mentioned in that January Lampletter article has been either cancelled or postponed. Rather than working diligently on final preparations for camp meeting we are in the process of contacting nearly 600 individuals on what they wish to do with their camp meeting reservations. June summer camps have been cancelled while the rest of the year's camp activities are still up in the air.

You may ask what the future looks like financially for the conference? A lot of that depends on how long we must abide by the stay at home order. From the latest pronouncement from the governor's office it appears that our school year will be completed remotely. It is unknown just how long it will be before most members will feel comfortable coming back to church once restrictions have been lifted. We have just closed the remittances for March. Our tithe for the month of March after adjusting for unequal weeks of comparison with March of 2019 shows a loss of -7.29%. That gives us a loss of -2.79% for the year after adjusting our tithe figures for a large one-time gift received earlier in the year.

We have implemented lower or no travel budgets for the future and are limiting expenditures so that we can continue to meet payroll expenses. If income takes a deeper and sustained loss, we will certainly have to look at further adjustments. I can assure you that these adjustments are being looked at by every level and institution of the church. It has been and always will be our goal to keep our eyes on the mission of the church and make sure that whatever changes are needed will be in harmony with that goal in mind.

We realize that all of your churches and families are facing similar challenges. My prayer is that all of us keep the mission that God has given our churches, and to us individually, in mind as we navigate these challenging times.

I believe Paul's council to the Corinthians is relevant for our situation today. In 1 Corinthians 16:13-14 he states; "Watch, stand fast in the faith, be brave, be strong. Let all that you do be done with love."

Another student was just sharing how a number of them have started a prayer group, setting their alarms for 4 a.m., 12 p.m. and 7 p.m. to pray.

In the news during the last few days, I've read that food security is becoming an issue. As we've tried to purchase seeds for our garden projects, we have discovered that it is becoming increasingly difficult. We are excited that the green house and garden project are coming together. Our hope is to be able to grow sufficient food so we can share with those in need in our area and make connections so they will be open to hearing more about God's love.

## So, what is the purpose of Wisconsin Academy?

In these days when the phrase "Christian education" has become a buzzword, are we to be like other schools providing an education which will make our students worldly wise? I pray that our purpose is to help each one find a personal relationship with Jesus and to train them through true education to be God's missionaries to share the Three Angels' Messages to as many as possible.
