Lamp Letter Be the Light

t was around 10:00 pm one day in April that I received a text message from Meztli Morales, one of the Waukesha Seventh-day Adventist Church young adults. "Sorry to text you so late, but I have to ask you: Our church has a group of elderly folks... could I ask them if they need help with outdoor work or getting their groceries? I would be happy to help out." This is how the project, "Be the Light," all started.

One of the core values of our church is "Intergenerational Fellowship." As the term suggests, to be intergenerational means to "intentionally cultivate meaningful interaction between generations." By this value we strive to go beyond simply being a multigenerational body in form, but also to be functionally intergenerational, in order to be more effective in ministry, to promote stronger bonding, and to promote spiritual growth. In times past we had tended to focus leadership only on the older and more experienced members. Now, with these intergenerational efforts, voices of the youth are meaningfully integrated and valued in working together to further the Everlasting Gospel to the local community.

So when I received this text message from Meztli I became super excited. Divine inspiration has led these younger leaders to take up leadership and initiative in the mission of the church. This would turn out to be a good moment in promoting an intergenerational culture. Also, I didn't want to miss out on this opportunity to provide for the community in this time of crisis -- two birds with one stone.

The following day I met online with two of

our young adult leaders, Rayden Balisnomo and Meztli Morales, to discuss how we could make the project happen. We were reminded of this Bible passage, "By this we know love, because He laid down His life for us. And we also ought to lay down our lives for the brethren. But whoever has this world's goods, and sees his brother in need, and shuts up his heart from him, how does the love of God abide in him? My little children, let us not love in word or tongue, but in deed and in truth." 1 John 3:16-18 The mission was to identify and provide support and services for those in need within the church and surrounding community during this social lockdown. The goal was to reach the elderly, the sick, and the high-risk in order to provide aid on the basis of simplicity and practicality.

The next step for our young leaders was to quickly gather a list of those that could

provide service and of those that were in need of service. In order for this project to develop, it was necessary for all members to get involved in contributing to this effort. Following a list of criteria, the services needed were: making face masks, delivering groceries, rides to essential locations, care packages, yard work, online tutoring for younger students, etc. For this to truly become an intergenerational effort, considerable measures were taken to ensure that all generations involved had a part to contribute in this effort.

This project is special, as our young leaders took the initiative. This is a positive change for the church as the church attempts to grow young. These leaders are coordinating with other ministry leaders of the church to execute the services mentioned above. We don't want this to be a one-time project



FINANCIAL SNAPSHOT

A s these times of uncertainty continue, we as an office staff have learned to accomplish our tasks using different methods and practices. This in itself is not a bad thing, as in some cases we do things more efficiently and even better as a result of these adjustments.

As you may have heard we did take a Payroll Protection Act loan from the SBA this spring. This has helped stabilize our cash flow through the past several months. This loan was designed to be a forgivable loan and we are currently in the process of applying for forgiveness of this loan. In addition, we thank the North American Division as well as the Lake Union Conference for providing some additional funding of tithe and non-tithe appropriations to our conference to aid us in the stabilization of our operations.

We are continuing to operate on a reduced spending of our budgets. We have limited out of state travel until further notice and delayed the voted cost of living raise typically given July 1. This pay raise will be discussed at an upcoming executive committee for a future implementation when appropriate. We are also praying that our schools will be able to open with students in the classroom this fall, but understand this may not be possible in all cases. This uncertainty could also bring with it financial implications as well.

Due to the unusual nature of this year, both the income and expenses with which we typically gauge financial health, have been very volatile in nature. As the year progresses we will be better able to understand and communicate the status of our financial situation. Due to your faithfulness, it will suffice to say that our financial outlook appears to be holding strong thus far.

The world is filled with trials these days, from Covid-19 to social and financial unrest. Now, more that ever is the time for all of us to look to our Savior and the Scriptures as to how we can survive the challenging times that are before us.

For the safety of our churches and students, we will temporarily limit bringing students to visit and share throughout our conference. We are excited about the live-streaming programs we have begun and look forward to sharing much more with you through this venue. As we began by live streaming Friday evening vespers programs, and then moved to virtual academy day and baccalaureate service, we realized that we could use this venue for sharing with our conference family many things that are happening with our students here on campus. Thanks to the faculty that have spent many hours creating programs. As they have worked together, we realized that adding some much needed audio/video equipment will greatly improve the quality of our programs and also provide important training for our students. If you are wondering what is happening here at the academy, and are interested in helping out in something that will greatly improve our ability to share with our conference family and farther abroad, please let us know and we will share more details with you.
