eing led by the Holy Spirit, I was moved to go door to door and give out books to the community. With the help of my mentor and my fellow church family, we gave away an estimated 10 Bibles, 60 Steps to Christ, 40 Desire of Ages, and 40 Great Hope books after just three ventures. We knew God was with us already on the first outing! It was a gloomy day filled with downpours. Before even leaving the parking lot, the group was already feeling doubtful that we would find success. Thankfully after words of encouragement and prayer we decided to give it a go.

Before leaving, we prayed and asked; "Oh Lord, please give us just one hour of dryness." By God's blessing, the pouring rain turned into sunshine. It was wonderful offering spiritual and emotional support to the community. Our group was truly intergenerational: from age six to as old as 85. This in itself was a blessing. It was a beautiful sight to see how God used all of our ages to witness to our community, from the children offering their own witnessing through prayer, or the elders of our group sharing their wisdom, to the many stories from our very own Granny Mo. The intergenerational involvement in our ministry has proven to be essential to portraying an inviting, loving, and family atmosphere.

After this first giveaway of almost two full bags of books and taking multiple prayer requests, we headed back to our cars. Within moments, the sky had changed from blue to black. We very quickly found ourselves sprinting through a downpour. When we made it



to the dryness of our vehicles the clock had revealed to us that from the time we prayed for dryness to the time the downpour began, exactly one hour had passed....to the very minute.

During our second venture we learned very quickly that Satan was very displeased with our newly formed ministry. Upon reaching the halfway point, we reached an apartment building. Seeing that a woman was leaving the building and moving to her car, I quickly tried to get her attention.

"I'm not interested, and nobody in that building is going to open their doors," she very sternly voiced and drove off. Troubled by her comments, I prayed silently to myself and felt an urging from the Holy Spirit. Running to the group, I urged them that we should go into that building. "What's more important in

the eyes of the Lord?" I asked them, "Knocking on the door and not getting an answer? Or choosing not to knock on the door at all because we assume there won't be an answer?" With that we prayed together and went into the building.

Not only did we discover that 10 of the 12 doors were opened, we left that building with only one Bible and three books remaining that day. While inside, we found three people, both young and old, asking us questions about Scripture. Seven of the ten residents who opened their doors allowed us to pray with them. At the last door we knocked on, we were blessed with the opportunity to spiritually uplift a very discouraged person struggling with very difficult personal issues. What began as tears finished in hugs, and a man being thankful for us

From the President's Desk

What Will Happen in 2022?

oing some online research concerning people's expectations about 2020 and after, I found some predictions that ended up being unrealistic or even comical. According to www.bestlifeonline.com/2020-predictions/ by this time, "we could have ape chauffeurs," "we could live in flying houses," "we could have personal helicopters," "we could have both telepathy and teleportation," "mail could be sent via rocket," and "we could wear antenna hats and disposable socks." Others predicted we whould not need to work because of robots and machines; eat, because of "nanobots" capable of entering the bloodstream to feed cells and extract waste"; or even survive because of an imminent nuclear holocaust or extreme global climate changes.

There are still predictions and general expectations when a new year starts. Optimists foresee a very productive year ahead, while pessimists proclaim the beginning of a disastrous future. Covid-19 crisis, global economy, healthcare, political and social turbulences represent some of the main global areas that require immediate and undivided attention and practical solutions.

From a religious perspective, every new year is a time that brings us closer to the Second Coming of Jesus. The end-time events are being fulfilled more rapidly than we ever imagined. I firmly believe that we are part of a prophetic movement with a unique message for our generation. We are called to demonstrate our commitment to God and the people around us.

From the religious liberty standpoint, many are concerned about what will happen in 2022. More and more prophetic indicators and historic evidence match with a concentration of signs of the end time that are about to be fulfilled. This is both exciting and frightening.

I am "neither a prophet nor the son of one" to predict the future, but I am inspired to remind to remind you all of one thing. The best way to prepare for the final events is to follow Jesus in the devotional disciplines and be actively involved in His ministry.

Matthew 24:45-47 clearly states: "Who then is a faithful and wise servant, whom his master made ruler over his household, to give them food in due season? Blessed is that servant whom his master when he comes, will find so doing." Luke 19:12-13 reiterates: "A man of noble birth went to a far country to have himself appointed king and then to return. He called ten servants and gave them ten minas. 'Put this money to work until I come back," He said."

An essential part of the preparation for the second coming of Jesus is to watch and be ready, but the main focus is on "doing" (providing food in due season) (Matt 24:47) and "put this money to work... 'until I come back'" (Luke 19:13). It is an active service to fulfill the physical and spiritual needs of people around us until Jesus comes.

Instead of trying to predict what will happen this year & wishing for the best opportunities for us, let's concentrate on allowing God to renew us as individuals and as the church. We do not need better circumstances in life, but we need a renewing of ourselves. According to Apostle Paul, a transformational change has to happen in us. "Renewing of your mind" (Rom 12:2) differs from any comprehensive to-do lists or ambitious new year resolutions. The Holy Spirit's direct involvement transforms us from inside out, cleansing the spring or our thoughts, attitudes, and behaviors.

Thus, 2022 will be a great year if we are transformed in a new way to be like Jesus, whom we love, and wait for Him to come back to take us into God's presence for eternity.

Chippewa Valley Church Doing Evangelism Differently



he dates were selected, the speaker from a national ministry was chosen, the funds were in place, and it was time for the church board to take a final vote, sign the contract, arrange for the public mailing, and proceed with a six week evangelistic outreach series at the Chippewa Valley Seventh Day Adventist Church in Altoona, Wisconsin.

But the board just happened to be blessed with an enthusiastic, energetic, well-prepared pastor with a penchant for thinking "outside the box.". With 20+ years of experience in recovery ministry, and with a street-smart view of how people with different backgrounds and outlooks can better connect with each other, Pastor Kevin

Kuehmichel presented the board with a plan for "evangelism, done different."

Pastor would be the speaker. We would meet once a week for (yes) 32 weeks. We would start the series in September and go into the month of May 2022. The meetings would be in the gym. Child care would be provided. We would sit at round tables, listen to an hour (or so) teaching on the Book of Revelation, follow-up with a bit of social time (home made snacks provided), and include discussion and prayer at each table before leaving.

So "Hope in the Apocalypse: Removing Fear from the Book of Revelation" began on September 9th, 2021. What are people saying about the class? Two attendees mentioned they were coming because their friends who they love and respect invited them, while a newly-baptized member wanted to remove some of the fearful uncertainly about the book that she had learned of in the past. Another long-time church member said she had just never had the time to attend a Revelation Seminar before, while other church members commented they were attending to deepen their previous understanding of the book.

How is the series proceeding? After over 3 months of weekly meetings, attendance is holding strong in the middle 50's. About one third of the attendees are guests/ non-members. Pastor Kuehmichel began the series with general teaching about language and the chiastic structure used by Bible authors. He took the class through the importance and centrality of seeing Jesus in the sanctuary, and introduced us to general outlooks of how different scholars have approached studying the Book of Revelation. The handouts accompanying the lessons (many of which were prepared by the pastor just for this series) have given general outlines, comparisons, and supplemental details.

Currently the class completed lessons on the seven churches, and is totally ready and looking forward to move into an understanding of the seven seals. When the series concludes in May, 2022, the class will have been taught about all of our church's basic Biblical beliefs – just by studying through the Book of Revelation. Praise God!

s a result of Student Week of Prayer coinciding with the General Conference Ten Days of Prayer, our Student Association Religious Vice Presidents decided to use this theme and the materials provided for the basis of our Week of Prayer.

This week a personal experience of mine from long ago became very relevant in my mind. Some years ago I received a phone call from my sister with an urgent call for prayer as our nephew had gone backpacking in the Canadian Rockies. He left a message with a friend that if he had not returned by a certain day she was to call emergency rescue and his parents. His parents and the rescue people had been called and my sister was asking us to please pray that Matthew would be found and be safe and well. I couldn't sleep that night as I continued to pray urgently that our nephew would be found safe. The helicopter and emergency rescue did find him and he was safe.

This week, and I should say all year, we as WA staff have felt an urgency for our students. We can see the great Controversy playing out right in front of our eyes. In my forty years of teaching I have seen this happening, but it seems more so now than ever. We see students struggling between the world and Jesus. We ask that you will

join us in praying, with the same sense of urgency I had when my nephew needed to be found, for the Holy Spirit to reach each student's heart for Him. "Unceasing prayer is the unbroken union of the soul with God ..." Steps to Christ p.94.

During this week I was very excited to see a group of our young people leading out in United Prayer. They were earnestly seeking God in their lives and on campus. We also began a new tradition, "Drop Everything And Pray." When an announcement comes across our mass notification system, all classes and activities stop and each group of students pray. The week culminated in a special church service where a number of students shared their testimonies of specific answers to prayer. One of the stories shared was by a student who canvassed last summer. She shared how she had asked God for a divine appointment. Having made her quota for the day, she spoke to a gentleman who said he couldn't buy her books. Because she had received more than enough from the previous donation, she gave him the book. He broke down crying as he knew he needed it.

God is anxious to pour out His Holy Spirit on us at Wisconsin Academy in answer to our earnest petitions. Thank you for joining in praying for our students.

Grinding Wheat in Home Ec Class


