I was so nervous about how they might respond. I was humbled by all the positive feedback I was given. A couple of ladies said it was the best conference they attended. All praise is to the Lord. He gave me direction every step of the way! The credit goes to Him!

Friends, when we surrender to the Lord, He can do some pretty amazing things. The ladies at the Baptist church even asked if we could share more at their churches and if they could share at ours. So, if you desire to have a servant heart, be willing to say, "Lord send me," and He will pour out His blessing on you!

From the President's Desk

The Relational Church

Besides our relationship with God, being in a close relationship with fellow believers is crucial for our personal and corporate spiritual growth. We have been created for community, and we are blessed and privileged to be part of our churches as an extended spiritual family.

The early church lived in a community environment. Acts 2:42 says, "And they devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers." Jesus told His disciples, "By this, all people will know that you are my disciples if you have a love for one another" (John 13:35).

Jonathan Tame, with Michael Schluter of Jubilee Centre, present ten characteristics of a Relational Church I would like to suggest for our churches:

- 1. "Christ-centeredness: Leaders uphold the church's primary purpose: to know and glorify Jesus Christ.
- 2. Relational Organizing Principle: The local church is ultimately no more or no less than its members' relationships with God, with one another, and with the world around them.
- 3. Goals: Relational goals are included in the constitution or mission statement of the church, and appropriate training and evaluation are regularly carried out.
- 4. Familiarity: Each person in the church knows the names of most other members of the same congregation.
- 5. Appreciation: Each person is valued unconditionally for who they are and encouraged to grow in their contributions to the church's life.

6. Servant Leadership: Leadership is characterized by servanthood and transparency, where there is no "them and us."

7. Inclusivity: There is no discrimination or exclusion from the congregation based on age, race, ethnicity, gender, extended family, or any other criteria, except in cases of church discipline.

8. Interdependence/Pastoral Care: Practical and emotional needs of all members are made known appropriately, and compassionate help is offered in response.

9. Solidarity: An attitude of solidarity is fostered with other believers at local, national, and international levels, with particular concern for the persecuted church.

10. Civic Commitment: Deliberately being a blessing to the neighborhood, city, and nation where the church exists is highly valued, along with praying for civil authorities (1 Tim 2:2)."

Our churches today need a restoration of God's plan to live in community. Relationships must be a top priority. Mark Finley once stated that there are no standards for church fellowship; there are biblical standards for church membership and higher standards for church leadership.

I invite you to consider opening your hearts and lives to others prayerfully. Ask God to provide opportunities to meet new people or to deepen a superficial relationship. Your spiritual gifts were given to you to edify and build others. You will also be enriched, and our churches will be where people are attracted to God and enjoy spiritual fellowship with one another.

"Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: Love your neighbor as yourself. All the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments." Matthew 22:37-40

First Hmong Company in Wisconsin



On Sabbath, June 25, over 100 people gathered at the Madison Community Seventh-day Adventist Church to celebrate the forming of the first Hmong Company in the Wisconsin Conference. Chanchai Kiatyanyong, pastor for the new company, gave the welcome for this historic event and prayed a prayer of thanksgiving for what God has done and trusting in what He will do in the future. Titus Naftanaila, conference president, shared thoughts from the time when Joshua lead the children of Israel across the Jordan River. He called the congregation to follow God and consecrate themselves in preparation for what God will do.

During the Sabbath service, Pastor Ko Saelee gave an overview of how ministry in the Hmong community began in Wisconsin. He said that through a providential meeting

over 15 years ago plans were put in place to enable two Hmong groups to form in Wisconsin, one in Milwaukee and one in Madison. Pastor Saelee expressed his thankfulness for the support of the conference, for the Madison Community church allowing the groups to meet in their building, and for all the believers that have accepted Christ. He said, "We may be small, but God can use us and has a plan. When God calls, we answer and He will take us step by step." Also, two elders, Jerry Vang, of Madison, and Choua Lee, of Milwaukee, reviewed how God had lead in the formation of the Hmong groups.

Over time, the two groups began to meet together, alternating between the two locations. As the number of members grew, they found they would qualify for company

status and made the decision to join the two groups under the name Wisconsin Hmong Company.

During the celebration service, Brian Stephan, conference Executive Secretary, had the privilege of officially granting company status and inviting those wishing to join the new company to sign the membership list. In all, 61 individuals signed their names to this list. In addition to the members from Madison and Milwaukee, individuals from Appleton and even as far away as Minnesota came to support the joining groups.

At the close of the service, Pastor Chanchai welcomed four new members into the company who were recently baptized at Wisconsin Conference camp meeting, near Oxford, WI. After a group picture, the celebration continued with a delicious meal and time to fellowship together.

We praise God for his work in the Hmong community and the establishment of the first Hmong Company in Wisconsin.
