lot of prayer has gone into this Summer Camp season at Camp Wakonda. Beginning their third camp season, Youth Director Zack Payne and his wife Allison wanted to see more in the way of a spiritual atmosphere and decisions being made for Christ at camp.

In addition to prayer, a lot of key conversations preceded this summer as well. When visiting Union College, Payne had a chance to visit with one of the Summer Camp staff, Bekah, who said she really would like to see more kids making decisions for baptisms at camp. Payne, too, had been feeling that Summer Camp ministry should feel more like mission work or evangelism, and he told her that he resonated with her idea.

Payne also talked with some seasoned Summer Camp directors who told him what they did to set more of a spiritual tone and how it was yielding more decisions for Christ at camp. Particularly, he remembers talking with Pastor Brandon Westgate about the schedule they have at Glacier View Ranch and how they intentionally set aside times expecting baptisms each week. Payne says, "We decided we wanted to move forward, likewise, in faith to see more decisions like this at camp."

Finally, during camp meeting, he remembers talking with a friend who said that she had a dream that the Latter Rain was going to be falling soon, or maybe even had begun to fall at this very time.

He says, "I thought it sounded exciting, but I didn't really give it much more thought after that."

Fast forward to today, Payne is looking back on a summer that has been absolutely blessed. Summer Camp at Camp Wakonda didn't just survive, it thrived! At Cub Camp, where campers are a little on the young side, Pastor Bill Dudgeon didn't make calls for baptism but, he asked our campers if they wanted to follow Jesus. They all came forward! At Tween Camp, Pastor Drew Weaver made the call for baptism and thirty three campers made decisions ranging from those wanting to know more about what baptism means to those actually getting baptized at Camp Wakonda before they left the camp. That Friday eight campers were baptized and two staff were re-baptized. At Teen Camp, Pastor Myoung Kwon made the call for baptism

and thirteen more made decisions for baptism, and that Friday five campers and one staff were baptized, and one camper was re-baptized. The final week of camp, Family Camp, Pastor Jonathan Fetrick made the call for baptism and two more staff came forward to be baptized for the first time.

Claire Castleberg, a returning camp staff and part of the team of Summer Camp Directors is one of the staff who made the decision to be baptized. Claire wrote an article about her experience at camp and the following is an excerpt from her writing:

"I have felt closer to God this summer than any summer I've been here so far. Thursday night of Tween Camp, I felt compelled to make the choice for baptism. Pastor Drew, my home church

From the President's Desk

Divine Interruptions

s a pastor, I witness a lot of A s a pasior, r writece a set unpleasant experiences. Loss, abandonment, death, and separation represent significant challenges for anyone not expecting a dramatic change in life. Our lives on Earth are full of disturbances, difficulties, hindrances, and unforeseen events.

Several years ago I was privileged to minister to a 53-year-old woman dying of lung cancer. I would read the Scripture and pray for her and her family. In the last week of her life, she asked her husband and children to forgive her, and in response, they did the same thing. That was a sacred moment for the family and me, as their minister. At her funeral service I presented the visible evidence of her faithfulness to the Lord and her family as an inspiring example for all.

Being born in a communist society, my expectations during that time were related to the nature of my culture. Survival and having religious freedom to express my practical devotion to God were my two primary goals in life. Later I added health, marital satisfaction, and a rewarding ministry. Now, in my mid-fifties, I realize that all my dreams have been fulfilled so far, and while I am aware that I can experience interruptions at any moment, I continue to enjoy God's blessings in my life.

I don't want any significant change that can rock my boat. But the realities of life make me more aware that all the accomplishments we enjoy at this point in life may be temporary, and they are based on God's grace for us and not on our merits.

Our local churches are full of people on different levels of spirituality and walks of life. It is incredible to witness and be part of their experiences when they suffer significant losses and a dramatic crisis.

They are not satisfied with theological or psychological explanations. They struggle to understand the correlations between God's promises to protect and bless and tragic realities.

Referring to the divine interruptions in life, James writes: "Consider it pure joy, my brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of many kinds because you know that the testing of your faith produces perseverance. Let perseverance finish its work so that you may be mature and complete, not lacking anything" James 1:2-4.

Following the same line of thought, Ellen White declares:

"Trials and obstacles are the Lord's chosen methods of discipline and His appointed conditions of success. He who reads the hearts of men knows their characters better than they know them. He sees that some have powers and susceptibilities which, rightly directed, might be used in the advancement of His work. In His providence, He brings these persons into *different positions and varied circumstances* that they may discover in their character the defects which have been concealed from their knowledge. He allows them to correct these defects and to fit themselves for His service. Often, He permits the fires of affliction to assail them that they may be purified." (HDL 9.1)

These disturbances are unanticipated and find us unprepared, but they do not catch God off guard. They are not unplanned, insignificant incidents. These interruptions are God's appointed events for a reason, significantly to change our characters, make us more like Jesus, and prepare us for His Kingdom.

"Reformation trip for high school students? Isn't that something only for really large schools or college students?" The same questions crossed my own mind when the opportunity for a student focused Spring Break Reformation trip presented itself. But after hearing the explanation from the tour company, my heart and mind were convinced, and our administration was open if the interest seemed high enough. After much prayer and conversation, we decided to move forward. Feedback was extremely favorable overall. In fact, when first gathering student feedback, I saw a light and energy in their eyes that is rare in mid February.

"You mean we might be able to go to Europe and see where Martin Luther actually pounded the nail in the door Mrs. Lawrence?" "Oooh, can we pass out Glow tracts on the trip?" "Can we send over cases of the Great Controversy in languages people understand we could share on the bus?" "Could we sing in an actual cathedral?" "All possibilities," I replied, "depending on God's leading and opening doors."

Those doors continued to open as we continued praying. The Wisconsin Board of Education officially approved our trip, a

presentation was held at camp meeting, and the final details are being worked out. Some questions and concerns have been raised along the way, one regarding whether or not this trip is in fact a "mission" trip. I believe that it is a mission trip, but one geared towards our own Seventh Day Adventist (SDA) youth.

One of the areas Wisconsin Academy (WA) is primarily concerned with is impressing on the hearts and minds of our students the importance of a personal relationship with Christ. That begins with understanding who Christ is and what He has done for us. On a class trip in my second year of teaching at W.A., a presenter asked us to put our heads down on the table and close our eyes. He asked all who were sure of their salvation in Christ to raise their hands - only four out of thirty raised their hands! He then gave a simple presentation of the gospel. That activity greatly impacted my heart and mind.

Could it really be that our own SDA young people don't really understand the plan of salvation? We send them out door to door, on mission trips, to lead out in church, but how many really understand the promise of Ephesians 2:8-9, "For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God." Martin Luther began to see and understand this promise and Ellen White writes that "A trip to Rome, combined with diligent study of the Scriptures, opened Martin Luther's eyes and helped him see "more clearly than ever before the fallacy of trusting to human works for salvation, and the necessity of constant faith in the merits of Christ." (GC p.125)

Nothing like first-hand experience drives head knowledge to the heart. That is the purpose and mission of this Reformation trip. Six different countries are on the itinerary. We will visit places like the Waldensian Valley, Church in Wittenberg, site of John Huss's execution, etc. We also have the opportunity to share a mini concert at the Cathedral of St. Paul. Every day is designed with the mission of connecting the students to their Christian roots and making certain chapters of The Great Controversy come to life. In addition, students will take a prerequisite class co-taught by our History, Bible, and English teachers to introduce them to the places and people of the Reformation whose footsteps we will be re-tracing.

"In reviewing our past history, having traveled over every step of advance to our present standing, I can say, Praise God! As I see what the Lord has wrought, I am filled with astonishment, and with confidence in Christ as leader. We have nothing to fear for the future, except as we shall forget the way the Lord has led us, and His teaching in our past history." (1915 Life Sketches of EGW, p.196)

Got drama? We do! Good drama that is. This fall Wisconsin Academy will offer a creative ministries class which will train its members to lead and share the gospel in a variety of creative ways. For the last two years a drama club has been happening on campus. Members have really enjoyed using their talents to present the gospel message through songs, skits, and other creative ways at schools and at area churches. A drama club doesn't offer enough time for students to really take it to the next level. Plans for a class were started last year and are finally coming to fruition. Greg Edge (Bible teacher) and Danielle Lawrence (English teacher) will co-teach the class. The first priority? Coming up with a creative name for the group besides "drama team."

Sometimes the word "drama" causes uncertainty when people hear it. "Drama" is a word with multiple meanings. Sadly, negative connotations often ring louder than the positive. The Merriam Webster dictionary's first meaning explains the intention: "a composition in verse or prose intended to portray life or character or to tell a story usually involving conflicts and emotions through action and dialogue..." This kind of "drama" when used for right is a powerful witnessing tool.

One of my favorite summer activities as a child was our church led Vacation Bible School (VBS). My favorite part was a toss up between the skit acted out each morning or creatively told continued story, each afternoon. As a teenager, my VBS role transitioned to telling the story myself one year, and being part of the skits; then in my twenties I began directing. In college at Southwestern Adventist University, I was part of the first "drama" class, and I have continued to see first hand how the gospel shared creatively through and to young people has lasting effects in bringing people to Christ. Not surprising, considering God uses visual representations, scenes and reenactments throughout Scripture to share His message.

"Drama" class will introduce students to sharing Christ through skits, creative storytelling, sign language, puppet ministry, choral readings, and by God's grace a full-length production. Drama class instills the importance of teamwork, focusing less on the individual, and letting God work through us when we give our gifts and talents to Him. We are dedicated to following the principles of 1st Corinthians 10:31 "So whether you eat or drink or whatever you do, do it all for the glory of God."
