

Healthy Food Ministry

“It took eight years to have my second child!” said Kim Rekawik, mother of six, and member of Madison East SDA Church. “I had a couple of miscarriages... and then I went to these health seminars given by our church and was taught to eat no sugar, oil or meat, and no dairy products, and I started eating that way. After a while, I got pregnant!” Rekawik said.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, more than seven million women in the U.S. have difficulty getting pregnant or carrying a baby full term. Further, the death rate of African American babies in Wisconsin is among the worst in the U.S, according to the CDC. Improper nutrition during pregnancy increases the risk of pre-term birth and low birth weight, which are common causes of infant death.

These poor birth outcomes motivated the formation of Families Eat Well, or F.E.W. Madison for short, at the Madison East Seventh-day Adventist Church. The group, believes the Adventist health message can be a powerful tool to help change birth outcomes for low income and racially and ethnically diverse women, leading to fewer deaths and health complications.

Rekawik’s story is not unique as many women report beneficial effects of a more natural diet on their conception, health during pregnancy, and baby’s health. Jennifer Stan [pseudo name], member of the F.E.W. team, recalls her experience.

“I had to monitor my glucose every day because I tested at-risk for gestational diabetes. I quickly noticed that every

meal impacted my numbers. High sodium foods, like Chinese food and meat, spiked my glucose, and healthier foods like avocados produced normal levels,” Stan said.

For Stan, maintaining a healthy diet during her pregnancy was difficult and expensive. Before becoming pregnant, she consumed less than two servings of fruit and vegetables per day. “I knew that I had to eat healthier, and I wanted to do my best since this was my first child. I read so much information saying if I did not do this right, it would lead to preterm birth or low birth weight, and the risk was higher because I was Black,” Stan said. “I was constantly scared. If I did not have time or could not afford a healthier meal, I would skip meals. Not eating made things worse, but I didn’t know how to make healthier foods that I liked.” She believes the ministry will benefit women not accustomed to eating fruits and

vegetables every day or that think they can’t afford vegetarian or vegan diets.

The F.E.W. team has pulled together a delicious set of healthy recipes that take forty-five minutes or less to cook with no more than ten ingredients, most with only one to five ingredients! Following Christ’s model to minister to peoples’ unique needs and hearts one-on-one, the team will work with moms to learn more about their needs, eating habits, likes and dislikes, and budgets. The goal is to customize recipes and suggestions for each individual’s lifestyle and budget.

The F.E.W. ministry team has partnered with Access Midwifery Clinic and the Madison Women’s Care Center, organizations serving low-income women and those racially and ethnically diverse. During the COVID-19 pandemic, they will donate boxes of recipes and non-

Corporate Worship Invitation

According to Pew Research Center (PRC) 2018, consistent church attendance is declining in the United States and evidently in the Seventh-day Adventist Church. In my understanding, regular presence is attending Sabbath services 3-4 times per month.

The top ten reasons people consider when attending church are: "To become closer to God (81%); so, their children will have a moral foundation (69%); to become a better person (68%); for comfort in times of trouble or sorrow (66%); they find the sermons valuable (59%); to be part of a faith community (57%); to continue their family's religious traditions (37%); they feel obligated to go (31%); to meet new people or socialize (19%); and, to please their family, spouse or partner (16%)" (www.pewforum.org).

Concurrently, according to PRC, the top reasons for missing regular worship services are: "they practice their faith in "other ways" (37%); they are not believers (28%); no reason is "very important" (26%); they haven't found a house of worship they like (23%); they don't like the sermons (18%); they don't feel welcome (14%); they don't have the time (12%); poor health or mobility (9%); no house of worship in their area (7%)" (www.pewforum.org).

Nevertheless, according to the Bible, the number one reason we attend church is not for spiritual entertainment but to corporately worship God. He is the One who invites us in His presence. "It is not men whom we are to exalt and worship; it is God, the only true and living God, to whom our worship and reverence are due" (Evangelism, 133).

From the beginning, God created the Sabbath day for unique spiritual fellowship with Him and one another. He wants to share His holiness with us, transforming our lives according to His character. In Psalm 100, David clearly states: "Worship the Lord with gladness; come before him with joyful songs" (Ps 100:2). See the

imperative language used? It's not optional. It doesn't depend on whether we feel comfortable or not, or whether we have any other obligations.

There is always a place for individual acts of devotion in the context of our relationship with God. Still, nothing can replace the privilege and the sacred duty of corporate worship. David expressed his joy of being part of the worship service: "I was glad when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of the Lord'" (Ps 122:1).

Foreseeing spiritual and moral apathy at the end times, the apostle Paul is even more direct: "And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near" (Heb 10:24-25).

Collective worship encourages new converts and those who experience difficult times. As parts of the Body of Christ, we are called to edify each other and grow our faith by observation and role modeling. Worship is contagious and inspires even non-believers to dedicate their lives to God. Consequently, true believers always want to spend the sacred time of the Sabbath at the special place where God invites us to worship. Ultimately, collective worship on Sabbath anticipates the great gathering in heaven, where we will praise and worship God for eternity.

I love to worship on Sabbath with our Wisconsin church family. I am always looking forward to joining in praises, prayers, and responding to God's invitation to spiritual revival. I also invite you, and your family, to join us every Sabbath and meet Jesus, uniquely according to His promise: "For where two or three are gathered together in My name, I am there in the midst of them" (Matt. 18:20).

perishable food items and work virtually with any of the women interested in learning tips and tricks for healthier eating.

They have also created a Pinterest page and Families Eat Well YouTube channel with healthy recipes tailored for a pregnancy diet and information on ways to source low-cost healthy food. To check out their growing list of recipes at www.fewmadison.com.

To minister to the emerging food needs in the local Madison community, especially during the pandemic, the church's Pastor, Loren Nelson III, has started a free community garden. Plots are open to any individual who would like to grow their own food. Pastor Nelson believes the garden will help sustain a supply of organic produce to the ministry and provide access to those struggling to afford organic produce at the stores. Other church members and local farms have also volunteered to contribute produce to the ministry. This past growing season, through donations and the garden's supply, the ministry was able to donate boxes of produce to women in need.

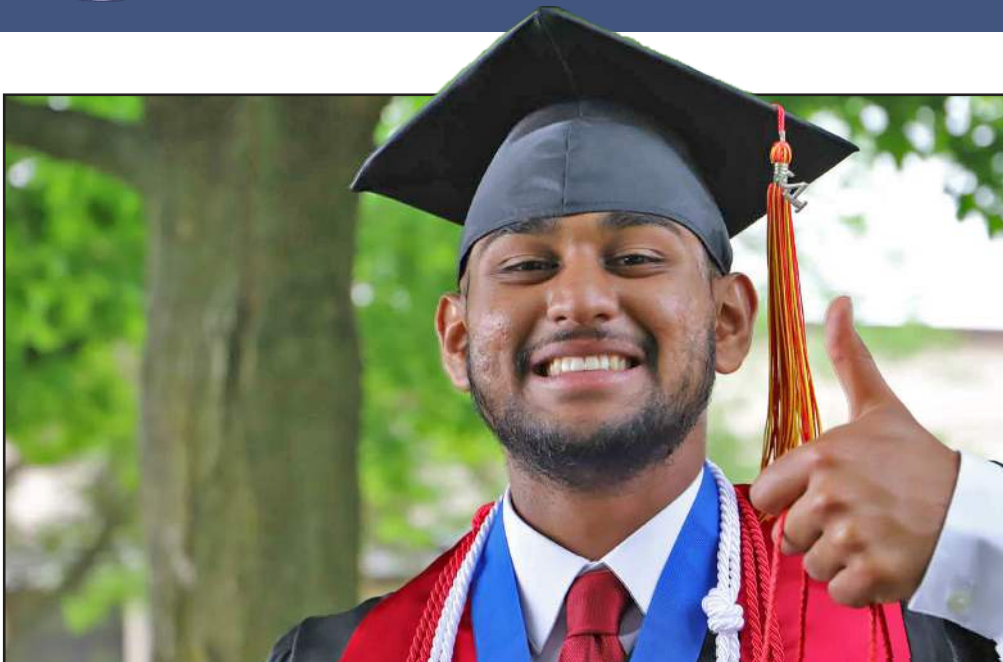
