## Guest Editorial

A FUNERAL AND A SCHOOL REPORT Last Tuesday I listened to a funeral service and an educational report and the two were strangely related. At the funeral service for my aunt, the minister built his message around that great triangle of I Cor. 13 -faith, hope and love. He told how this lady not only had had a deep love for her Lord, but also a burning desire to see her beloved church triumph, to have the Seventh-day Adventist message spread to all the world, and to have a strong educational program for the church's youth.

Her frugal lifestyle had provided funds that had been continually funneled into the church, and one of her last expressed desires was that she would not run up a large hospital bill. She wanted instead to have the money used to support the work of the church rather than to pay off a large medical bill. Her prayer was answered. She left nearly all of her estate to the church.

Later that afternoon, as I attended a K-12 board meeting at the Lake Union office, I heard Elder Minder present some statistical information that surprised and saddened us all. In the Lake Union Conference we learned that 30% of school-age children attend our church schools and 70% attend non-SDA public and private schools. As I pondered that shocking news, I first thought about the commitment and sacrifice of the parents that do have their children in our schools, but also couldn't help but wonder what is happening to us. Where is the commitment that we once had? Are we even aware that we're changing -- that other things have become more important to us than our children's spiritual preparation? Can it be that those good old church-loving Aunt Hulda's are a dying breed and that they are being replaced by a more casual, non-committed parent that does not see the eternal values of a Christian education?

Let us ask God to liberally apply that eyesalve from Revelation so we may clearly see those things that should be seen.

(An encouraging note is that Wisconsin has 11.5 students in church schools for every 100 church members. This makes it the second highest conference in the Lake Union. Our opening enrollment for last year was up about 10% from the year before.)
