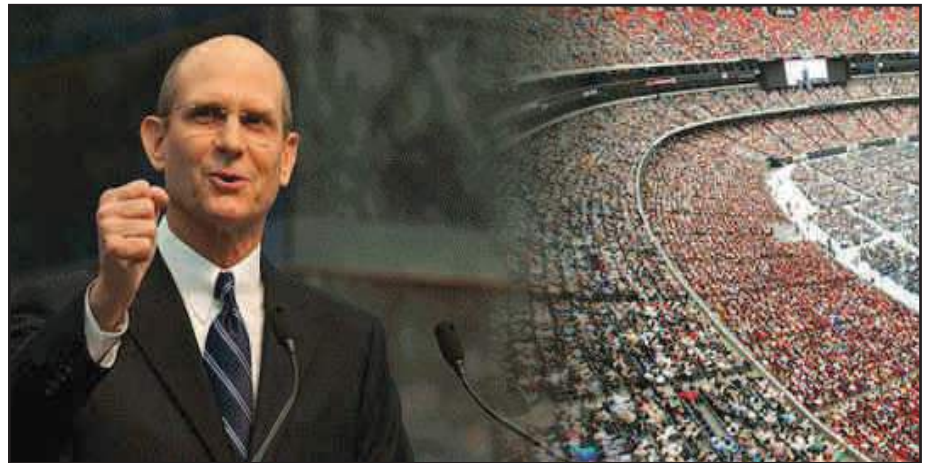

GC and Ministerial Meeting Report



Arise! Shine! Jesus is Coming! This was the theme of General Conference (GC) Session 2015, and the final challenge given on Sabbath morning by our newly re-elected GC President, Ted Wilson.

An estimated 60,000 church members from across Wisconsin, North America, and the world gathered last month at the Alamodome in San Antonio, Texas, to worship, learn, fellowship, and hold the 60th annual business session of the Seventh-day Adventist Church.

Three of the 2,566 delegates chosen to participate in the General Conference Session were from Wisconsin: Mike Edge, president of the Wisconsin Conference, Titus Naftanaila, pastor of the Madison church district, and Alyssa Palmer, an Adventist attorney from Oak Creek, Wisconsin.

First on the agenda the delegates re-elected Ted Wilson, president of the world church, for another five-year term. Pastor Wilson accepted the position and then presented three goals he has for the next five years: 1) to completely lift up Christ in all things, 2) to be faithful to God's Word, 3) and to involve as many church members as possible in witnessing and evangelism. Wilson, age 65, has served as the Seventh-day Adventist world church president since 2010. He and his wife, Nancy, have three married daughters and eight grandchildren.

Daniel R. Jackson was re-elected to serve as president of the North American Division for another five-year term. Pastor Jackson has served the church as a pastor, teacher and administrator. He and his wife, Donna, have three children and four grandchildren.

The motion on women's ordination stated: "Is it acceptable for the division executive committee, as they may deem it appropriate in their territories, to make provision for the ordination of women to the gospel ministry? The motion was denied with 58.4% voting no, and 41.3% voting yes. Following the vote, President Ted Wilson said, "Now is the time to unite under the blood stained banner of Jesus Christ....Now is the time to unify in the mission of the church ministry."

In the last five years our membership worldwide has risen by 1,556,081. Our baptism rate over the same time is at a rate of 2.2 members a minute. Our current membership at the end of 2014 was 18,479,257. Praise God for how He is leading.

Do you realize that in Jamaica there is one Adventist for every 11 people in the country? Did you know that in several countries where we have "work" going on, there are less than 50 members in countries where there are 3 million or more people?

As I reflect back on the recent General Conference Session I am proud to be a Seventh-day Adventist; proud that our church bases its teachings on the clear Word of Scripture, proud that we can peacefully work together to advance God's kingdom, and that we have been called to share God's last day message to a dying world. I am also humbled that God asks each of us, as imperfect Christians, to share the exciting news of Jesus's soon return to the world.

It's time to look forward. God has called us to let our lights shine. Recommit yourself to God. Be a witness for Him, reflect His character, and lead people to prepare for Jesus' soon return. May we each be willing "to go anywhere, provided it be forward."

GC and Ministerial Meeting Continued



Wisconsin Conference pastors, families and office staff who attended either or both the ministerial meetings in Austin, and the General Conference Session in San Antonio, Texas.

Over 4,300 pastors and their families from across North America converged on Austin, TX, for the first ever North American Division Ministerium meetings on June 28.

After only two days into the ministerium meetings, Nate Skaife, pastor of the Waukesha District commented, "This is a camp meeting put on for pastors instead of by pastors."

The Ministerium was a series of meetings and over 200 seminars designed to foster in pastors and their spouses, professional growth, spiritual refreshment, and networking with colleagues.

Of the 27 pastors in the Wisconsin Conference, 24 were able to attend. Expenses for the event varied, but routinely exceeded \$2000 per family. Fortunately the Lake Union assisted each pastor with \$500, and the Wisconsin Conference assisted with as much as \$1,000 each, plus 11 days of work time toward attending both the ministerium and GC.

It was such a blessing to our pastors. There have been numerous comments asking, "When can we do this again?" There is already talk of another ministerium prior to the next General Conference to be held in Indianapolis, IN, in 2020.

Clarified Creation Belief Number 6

"God has revealed in Scripture the authentic and historical account of His creative activity. He created the universe, and in a recent, six-day creation, the Lord made "the heavens and the earth, the sea, and all that is in them" and rested on the seventh day. Thus He established the Sabbath as a perpetual memorial of the work He performed and completed during six literal days that together with the Sabbath constituted the same unit of time that we call a week today. The first man and woman were made in the image of God as the crowning work of Creation, given dominion over the world, and charged with responsibility to care for it. When the world was finished it was "very good."

However, the one distinguishing feature that separates my professional experience from that of the GC nominating committee, is the calling for the Holy Spirit's guidance through prayer. Before every major vote or after a lengthy discussion, prayer was offered for wisdom and discretion.

FINANCIAL UPDATE

As of this writing, treasury has now closed the books for the month of June. Our tithe increase we had experienced in the early months of this year had disappeared by May. June however was a different story with substantial gains in both tithe and Wisconsin Budget. As a result we now have a year-to-date tithe gain of 3.99% along with an 8.43% year-to-date gain for Wisconsin Budget. Your continued support of the tithe and Wisconsin Budget is what makes camp meeting and summer camp programming possible.

Wisconsin Academy (WA) has just closed their books on another school year. The fiscal June 30 year-end unaudited statement is showing a respectable gain for WA. While the bottom line is still underwater, it thankfully is heading in the right direction. This was accomplished with a smaller subsidy from the Conference as well. Please keep the Academy in your prayers as we look toward next school year. Prayerfully consider how you might help sponsor a student who would like to attend the Academy this fall.

We are continuing to work on viable options to bring to the constituency for the new waste water treatment plant needed at WA. While we had hoped to bring these ideas to you at camp meeting, there were still some unfinished studies and plans. We continue to meet with the city of Columbus and with engineers looking at alternatives that will fit our needs and budget. We hope to have a special constituency meeting spring of 2016.

Have you ever been sure of something and then later learned you were incorrect? In my own life there have been times, more frequent than I wish to admit, that I have been confident I was right, only later to learn I was wrong.

As I have talked with families about sending their children to Wisconsin Academy, I have discovered there are incorrect perceptions resulting from inadequate information. One of the most common of these is that the financial cost of studying at Wisconsin Academy is not affordable. Without having all the necessary facts in hand, this conclusion is not surprising. So what are the facts on this matter?

Almost all students are eligible for and receive some form of financial assistance. Fortunately, through the support of loyal alumni and friends, there are scholarships and need-based student assistance funds available to help many families. In addition, we are proud to make known the Youth Educational Scholarship known as the YES program. Church congregations around Wisconsin are stepping up to provide financial assistance to families that is then matched by the conference and the Academy to provide three sources of support. Churches are encouraged to give \$2,000 which after matching can grow to a total of \$6,000 in financial aid. Students also work on campus to earn an additional \$2,000-\$3,000 toward the cost of their education. In almost all

cases, after bringing these revenue sources together, the remaining family commitment is attainable.
