James Hamilton Story

efore coming to Christ, really before coming to Wisconsin Academy, my goal every day was to live to reach age 21, and to not get caught. I had a drinking problem, a drug problem, and some family problems. I had, and still have, parents that love me and I consider that a blessing, but a divorce between them is hard to handle from the perspective of a kid who saw it all coming, and could do nothing to stop it

It wasn't a quick change, it was a drawn out and painful ordeal that left me far from stable and even farther from Christ. How can God, who uses marriage to symbolize Christ's bond with the remnant church, allow for my parents' marriage to go so awry? I had grown up around drinking, and as soon as I started I understood why it was so popular among my family and friends. It was a release, a getaway, and a temporary patch for the void left in my heart by pushing away Christ.

I also used a veritable buffet of drugs, made available by my desperate search for friends. I was homeschooled untill 6th Grade, then entered public school where I was socially behind and emotionally lost. I found friends there that acted outside the limits of the law, usually ones above my own age, and followed them into the swirling hazes of smokes and highs that ruled my life for several years. My parents being bogged down with their own problems, I managed to evade authority, pulling off mediocre grades throughout middle school.



James Hamilton, a Junior at Wisconsin Academy, was baptized March 12, 2018, and is currently a member of the Wisconsin Academy Seventh-day Adventist Church.

Then, a change came. I was presented with the chance to leave my spinning world, and go to a new world I had barely heard of. It was new and different, but I had a strange and powerful feeling that it was a world I needed to join. For once, I actually listened. The decision was last minute, made in the car on the way from one parent's house to the other, and I was enrolled at Wisconsin Academy.

I started classes, liked the teachers, and found interest in the spiritual influences present every day. I was clean at Wisconsin Academy, and because of that I knew how the withdrawals should have looked. However, they only lightly touched me, and I now see that as one

of the many ways God was helping me towards Him.

Sadly, I went home and went partially back to my old life. Since I was 10, I had struggled with depression and anxiety, and eventually thoughts and actions towards suicide. Before coming to Wisconsin Academy, I tried five times and somehow failed.

Since my enrollment, I have only tried once more, again failing. My sophomore year, I was back to being clean, but depression tore at me harder than ever. God kept pushing at my heart though, even through all the darkness I harbored, and He finally

As at a hospital our churches have protocols; sermons, programs, etc. that we do for people. But it is the personal touch that makes the most impact. It is our


intentional taking of time to attentively listen to the interesting, as well as the uninteresting. It is our giving of self, even when it is inconvenient, that makes lasting impacts.

Literacy experts among our teaching staff developed researched materials and resources to use in the evaluation of students' literacy skills in our Seventh-day Adventist schools. Students are tested in the fall and spring of each year.

Results are analyzed to inform professional development plans for teachers. Teachers have self selected professional learning communities to focus on the literacy needs of their students. We look for trends as we study the data. One observation was the



improvement in spelling, which we attribute partially to the emphasis on the annual conference spelling bee. We look forward to the full implementation of the new Bible Encounter curriculum in the elementary schools. This exceptionally engaging curriculum, with outstanding teaching strategies is helping students and teachers encounter Jesus as they participate in Bible study. This curriculum is loved by students and teachers.

s we find ourselves mid-summer we have just closed the books for the first half of our fiscal year. At mid-year the conference is experiencing a 5.12% tithe gain along with a 4.18% increase in giving to Wisconsin Budget. We give thanks to the Lord for this.

I also would like to bring you up to date on the special appeal for a full time special evangelist we have made both at camp meeting and in this article. Our goal was \$60,000. I am happy to report that we raised \$20,000 of that at our camp meeting evangelism offering appeals. In addition, churches have turned in through remittances another \$15,000 for Wisconsin Evangelism bringing us to a total of \$35,000 toward our \$60,000 goal.

We would very much like to fill this position by fall so our evangelist will be ready to go by the first of the year. With all working together I believe these funds can be in hand in time to fill this position by then.

Prayerfully consider giving to this need. As the Lord impresses you to give we ask that you use the line item on your tithe envelope marked Wisconsin Evangelism or write in "Conference Evangelist." You may turn your envelope in with your regular offerings or send it directly to the conference. Thank you in advance for making this a possibility. It has been over seven years since we have had a full time evangelist in this conference and

we would like to see this position restored at least for the next two or three years. We already have several good candidates as possibilities.

It won't be long before school will be starting up again. Preparations are already under way at Wisconsin Academy for the new school year. This summer a generous donation was given to the conference for the purpose of paving the parking areas at the boys and girls dorm of the academy as well as the parking lot and driveway at the lighthouse. This will bring a much improved appearance to the public as they enter our property for the lighthouse and the school. It also makes for a safer environment as well.

Again, thanks to all who support this conference with the many talents God has given. Working together, and with God's blessing, my prayer is that our efforts will bring many to a knowledge of our Lord and Savior so many may be ready to meet Him when He returns to take us home.
